TEST REPORT FOR JANUARY IS ANNOUNCED

Earl Gardner, Klamath county cow tester, Monday released the January report of the Klamath Cow Testing association showing that 14 herds, with 379 cows, were on test for the month. Ninety-four of the cows were dry.

Total production was 204,182 pounds milk and 8,746.2 pounds fat. Sixty-five cows made 40 pounds fat or better. Average production was 519 pounds milk and 23.1 pounds fat. High herd over 20 cows belonged to Leonard Lewis, 23 cows giving an average of 879 pounds milk and 34.6 pounds fat; high herd, 12 to 20 cows belonged to J. C. Wright, 16 cows giving an average of 849 pounds milk and 34.6 pounds fat; high herd under 12 cows belonged to U. E. Reeder, 10 cows giving an average of 469 pounds milk and 22.3 pounds fat.

High cow for the month was Novena, a Holstein belonging to E. T. McLaughlin, giving 2,759 pounds milk and 96.6 pounds fat; second high cow was Rose, a Jersey owned by Earl Mack, giving 1,590 pounds milk and 72 pounds fat. These are both mature cows. Next two cows making over 60 pounds fat were Ruth, a Holstein owned by Leonard Lewis, making 68.4 pounds fat and 1,801 pounds milk; and Maggie, a Holstein, owned by Leonard Lewis, making 1,690 pounds milk and 62.5 pounds fat; four-year olds, five highest making 45 pounds fat, were Skinny, making 1,156 pounds milk and 60.1 pounds fat; and Speck, making 1,324 pounds milk and 54.4 pounds fat; both Jerseys owned by Russell Fox; Gladys, a Jersey, owned by U. E. Reeder, making 855 pounds milk and 52.1 pounds fat; Babe, a Holstein owned by A. R. BUILDING GROUP CHAPTER TO BE ORGANIZED HERE

Organization in Klamath Falls of a chapter of the Oregon Building Congress is the purpose of a meeting called for the city council chamber Tuesday night, at 8 o'clock. It was announced Monday by O. G. Haugson, organizer of the state group.

Representatives of all lines interested in the building industry, from the architect to the laborer, belong to the Oregon Building Congress, Haugson explained.

He urged that every firm and every individual interested in building construction be represented at the session.

Chapters of the Oregon Building Congress have been organized in Portland, Astoria, Corvallis, Eugene, Roseburg, Marshfield, Salem, Albany.

The organization, Haugson said, gives its support to 823 movement designed to induce people to build. It is particularly interested in promoting interest in building to relieve the unemployment situation at this time. It is also interested in building codes.

In Salem, he said, \$110,000 in new work has been promoted through the building congress. Corvallis, which has just started its program, has lined up \$15,000 in new building. Portland expects to reach \$5,000,000.

GRAIN PRICES DROP.
CHICAGO, Feb. 8. (AP)—Domestic wheat prices dropped today on a bearish construction placed upon Washington reports suggesting a world surplus of 370,000,000 bushels of wheat, all grain prices went lower today.

A decrease of 452,000 bushels in this week's domestic visible supply of wheat was ignored. One feature of wheat trade was selling of futures here against purchases at Winnipeg.
