

FRAZIER RELEASED ON BOND SATURDAY

Dominick Frazier, arrested Friday evening by state police officers and charged with possession of liquor, was released upon bond of \$1,000 Saturday, after pleading not guilty to the charge before Justice of the Peace Dudenhoff of the Tulsa Lake district.

Ernesto Zambrini, arrested with Frazier and charged with the same offense, also pleaded not guilty and was released after posting \$500 bonds.

Sam Nelson, the third to be caught in a net spread Friday night by the state police, entered a plea of not guilty to possession of beer, and posted \$200 pending his trial.

Officers arrested Frazier and Zambrini at the corner of Mitchell street and Shasta Way, and said that a quantity of liquor was found in their possession.

Nelson was arrested at Frazier Court Apartments, where 157 quarts of beer were seized and destroyed by the state police.

GRAZING FEES IN LAKE COUNTY CUT

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—The Lake county board of equalization and the largest timber owners in the county have reached an agreement whereby the latter will lower the grazing fees which they charge stockmen for grazing upon their property. The meeting was held at the request of the timber men who were kind enough to visit Lakeview to talk over the problem.

No definite reduction in grazing fees could be stated by the timber men because of the large variety of agreements under which they have been doing business with the cattle and sheepmen, but it is understood that the reduction in rentals for some types of leases will amount to almost a third of the 1931 figure.

Present at the meeting were J. F. Kimball and C. S. Chapman of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company; R. D. Moore of Sherwin Hixon company; K. G. Cummings of Evanson Box company; B. V. Wright of the Gilchrist Timber company; and Richard Hovey, representing the Hovey interests. It is expected the sixteen other large timber owners in the county will follow the recommendations of the owners who were represented at the meeting.

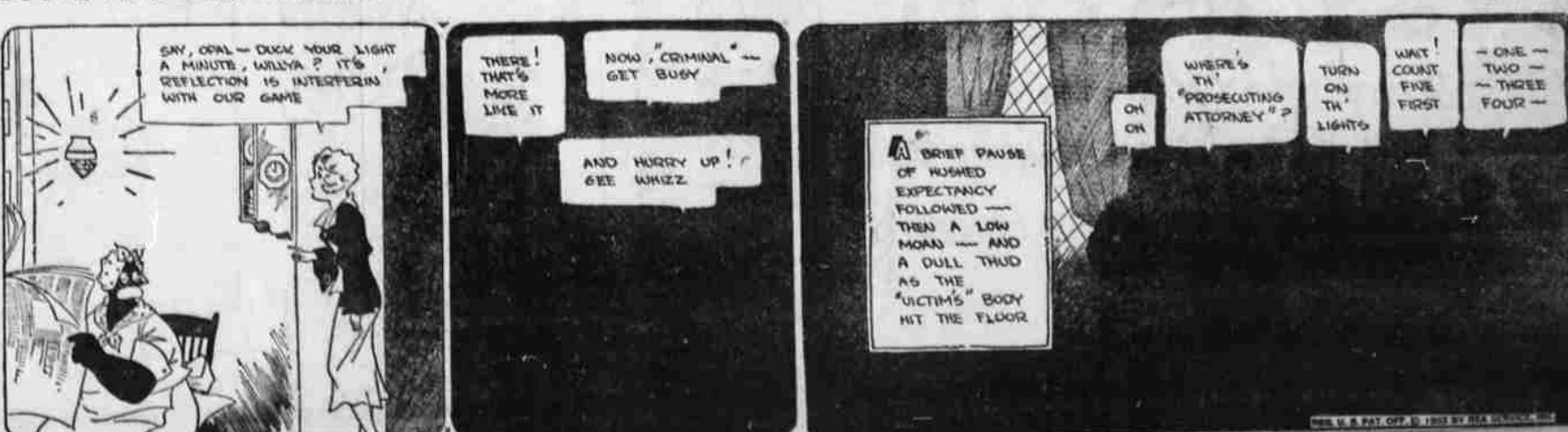
