

Klamath Wants Repetition

Wrestling Fans Unsatisfied With Result of Becker-Achui Sensation. Sandahl and Ray Display Power.

The gracious manner of the Oriental personality still shines brightly to Walter Achui, Chinese wrestler, despite his rough barnstorming road over the racket of American professional athletics.

Cleanliness—thorough sportsmanlike—was the keynote of popularity as Achui defeated that other right-popular athlete of Klamath Falls, Pete Becker, at the Legion hall Monday night.

Achui was by no means happy over the sensational victory. Like Becker, he too knew the unfortunate accident strangling Becker senseless in the arena ropes opened an easy path for victory in a third fall which followed closely behind two previous falls evening one of the most grueling middleweight mat matches promoted in Klamath Falls.



When the battle was over, the Chinese said to say to Pete Becker:

"Becker was the strongest middleweight I ever met. I even doubt whether I could have won if it had not been for that unhappy snarl in the ropes. If I beat Becker on the holds, he won from me in strength."

Those who actually saw the match and those who have heard of it cordially unite with Herb Owen, promoter, to bring Becker and Achui back to the Legion hall. Those who think the Chinese was superior, want him to have a chance to wipe out the shadow of doubt. Those who believe Becker was about to win the third fall just before the accident, hope he will be given another opportunity.

If you don't think Becker was in a pitiful mess when the tautly drawn ropes were wrapped around his neck just lay a hand on those powerful cords and consider how dangerous it might be to dangle by the neck with the weight of a 157-pound body intensifying the tension on the throat.



The Legion hall fans haven't limited their invitation to Becker and Achui. There's a serious Bill Sandahl, whom many believe was the hold-up Tom Ray last fall just as the first round of their match ended. Those two heavyweights, canny after a long career on the mat, moved about with the strength of giants and almost the speed of lightning.

There are four men Klamath Falls wants to see again! Louis Miller, the Reno wrestling partner of Jack Dempsey, will stop off in Klamath Falls, February 15. Louis wants to work in here again, and there is a challenge standing against him from Bill Sandahl.

Miller—you couldn't forget it—was the gentleman who pulled up Roy Anderson and broke that Norwegian preacher's monotonous theft of the main event attraction.



More than one excellent wrestler has Klamath Falls as a headquarters. Much has been said about the popularity of Pete Becker and Bill Sandahl, but Roland Warren of the power company, will come in for more than a brief honor when he gets his place on a promotion here.

Owen used Warren in Eugene 19 days ago, and the Klamath Falls man won his match in brilliant fashion. At Medford Wednesday night, Warren will take on this same Walter Achui in a preliminary to the Ray-Al Karasick match.

U. S. BOBBLED TEAM SETS NEW WORLD RECORD

LAKE PLACID, N. Y., Feb. 10, (UP)—Striking down the dangerous, icy track at breakneck speed, the United States bobsled team captained by Hubert Stevens set a new world record of 2:04.27 yesterday to establish itself as a favorite for the Olympic title.

With two more heats to be run on the mile and one-half track, Stevens' team was only 4.23 seconds behind that of Heto Cappadriat, Swiss captain, which ran the first heat in faster time than the Americans.

Stevens' total for the first two heats was 4:11.57, compared with 4:13.09 for Cappadriat's. The U. S. A. No. 1 required 2:13.19 for the first heat when it was the first to take the chute and found the track slow. By the time the No. 2 American team had gone down the trail was pretty well broken in and the run several seconds faster.

Ranking behind the two leading teams at the midway mark was the N. S. A. No. 3, with a total time of 4:22.53.

Tunney Puts Skids Under Idea That He May Return to Ring

NEW YORK, Feb. 10, (AP)—The boys who have been building up the pleasant fiction that Gene Tunney contemplates a fighting comeback may just as well knock down the structure of their imagination.

On the authority of Tunney himself, the former world champion has never had and will not entertain now the slightest idea of returning to the ring.

"When I retired from the ring, I meant it," he told me today. I reminded him of stories that had been printed and recently repeated, predicting that circumstances might dictate otherwise, or that he might yield to some pressure.

"Yes, I know all about that," he replied, "and of course I cannot stop any one from making a suggestion in the newspapers as to what I may or may not do. Nor do I take them seriously."

"The way I feel now is that I have my own life to lead and work out. I have my private interests. I am happy in what I am doing. I enjoyed writing my life story, yet I am surprised that so much interest is shown in it."

Physical Fitness Question In Dempsey's Ring Return

CHICAGO, Feb. 10, (UP)—The biggest question mark in connection with Jack Dempsey's contemplated comeback is his physical condition.

The question in words is: "Is Dempsey physically fit to fight again?"

Neither Dempsey nor anyone else can supply the final answer to that query at this stage of his exhibition tour. By April or May Dempsey should know whether he can sharpen his strength and fighting equipment enough to make a whole-hearted and sincere attempt to regain the heavyweight title.

Excellent Chance Right now there is enough evidence to state that Dempsey has an excellent chance to get himself in as good condition as he was when he fought Gene Tunney and Jack Sharkey in 1926 and 1927.

Dempsey is positively not a washed-up fighter. He is a fine specimen physically in the opinion of two competent medical men and is slowly and surely fighting his way back into condition.

Youthful Physique The most authentic opinion of Dempsey's present physical condition is supplied by an eminent surgeon connected with one of the foremost clinics in this country who rigidly examined Dempsey recently.

"The musculature of Jack Dempsey is that of a man 25 years of age," said the surgeon whose name cannot be publicly revealed because of the code of ethics of his institution. "He has no physical defects and no superfluous flesh on any part of his body. His heart, lungs and other vital organs are in perfect condition."

The question of his legs has caused considerable comment. As far as the structure of the leg muscles is concerned and their present condition, there is not a defect.

Dr. R. O. Brunkhorst of Milwaukee, physician of the Wisconsin state athletic commission, who examined Dempsey before his exhibition in Milwaukee last night, found the former champion in splendid physical condition.

Dempsey will be 27 years old June 24, and he has been out of the ring from September 30, 1927, when he failed to regain the title from Tunney until August 19, 1931, when he opened his exhibition tour in Reno, Nev.

CHICAGO, Feb. 9, (UP)—Jack Dempsey departed tonight for Cleveland where he will continue his exhibition tour by meeting Meyer (K. O.) Christner, Akron, Ohio, heavyweight, in a four-round bout Thursday night.

Christner, who is a year younger than Dempsey, has fought practically all the leading heavyweights of the past three years, including Jack Sharkey, Ernie Schacht, Paulino Uzcudun, Jim Maloney, Young Stribling, Johnny Rikko, Primo Carnera, Max Baer and others.

BILLY PETROLLE SIGNED UP FOR THREE FIGHTS

NEW YORK, Feb. 10, (UP)—

Jimmy Johnston, manager of boxing at Madison Square Garden, rushed to the telephone tonight and gleefully announced that he had "closed" for Billy Petrolle, the Fargo Express, to fight three 15-round "naturals."

The smashing welter from North Dakota will meet Bat Hattalino, former featherweight champion, in mid-March; Jackie Fields, welterweight champion, in April, and Tony Canzoneri, lightweight champion, in May. Johnston said all bouts would be staged at the Garden, and the Fields and Canzoneri contests would be title affairs. He said he had completed negotiations tonight with Jack Hurley, Petrolle's manager, and that manager of the three other fighters had accepted the bouts.

The New York state athletic commission today formally reinstated Max Schmeling, world's heavyweight champion, and his two managers, Joe Jacobs and Billy McCann. They had been suspended since September, 1930. Schmeling's reinstatement carried with it an automatic recognition of his championship by the commission.

The three had been suspended in their respective capacities, because they had refused to comply with the commission's demand for a return title bout with Jack Sharkey of Boston. In a bout at Yankee stadium in June, 1930, for the then vacant heavyweight championship, Schmeling won on a foul. The commission considered it an unsatisfactory ending and demanded a return bout. Recently Schmeling agreed to a return bout with Sharkey in June.
