In reply to quoted statements from the east, Governor Meier said he reserved the right to change his mind and that "there really is nothing to say on that point."

In a formal statement the governor remarked "in connection with the hearing (before the army engineers) there developed a lack of united front on the part of Oregon for the development of the Columbia—a sub-

"In Oregon we have not only more adequately met our unemployment and industrial problems than they have in the middle west and east, but we are more than a year ahead of these sections in our rearmament and tax reduction program."

support lines were half a mile to the rear.

In the international settlement there was considerable apprehension, and United States marines took up the heaviest burden in building additional sandbag barricades and barbed wire defenses.

The marines, guarding a line on a 16-mile front inside and outside of the international settlement, took up the heaviest burden of the defense of the settlement. The marines' line extended from the settlement's extreme western areas, along Souchow creek, the northern boundary, until it met the soldiers of the Thirty-first United States Infantry ten miles to the east.

Parts of this front faced directly on Chapei, daily scene of shelling, bombing and heavy machine gun fire. The Chinese troops faced the marines across Souchow creek, and the marines were kept constantly on the alert as the Chinese erected barricades, but relations between the two forces were described as "friendly as possible under the circumstances," and the marines were not worried.

The Chinese cavalry attack was reported to have occurred at Kiangwan, part of the Chapei battle front. The horsemen, the report said, rode against the foe with a dash not unlike that of their remote predecessors, the riders of the Mongol chiefs, wielding their sabers with vigor on the enemy in the face of the splitting machine guns.

They were finally driven off, according to the reports, but not until they had inflicted heavy casualties with their outmoded warfare.

favors a reduction in the size of battleships and the caliber of their guns, reduction of tonnage or airplane carriers, strict limitations of the use of all classes of war vessels, prohibition of air bombardments and of the use of poison gases and bacteria.

August Zaleski, Polish representative, presented a plan for "moral disarmament." He said Poland would offer a formal program under this head later and that Ambassador Hugh Gibson of the United States "forcibly reminded us yesterday the best guarantee of security consists in our neighbors' good will."

Signor Grandi's address brought three especially enthusiastic outbursts of applause when he said his country was willing to prolong the London naval treaty, to do everything possible toward bringing about actual disarmament, and to abolish many of the most important items on armament programs. He delivered the address without a single gesture, resting both his hands gracefully upon a table.

He said Italy rejected the French theory of security to precede disarmament. "Without disarmament," he added, "there can be no security. He accepted the German demand that other nations disarm in the same proportion as Germany is forced to do under the treaty of Versailles."

He said Italy was in favor of prolonging the Washington and London naval agreements at proposed yesterday by Ambassador Hugh Gibson of the United States. He said he viewed the present conflict in the far east, not with the tragic irony with which

Agent L. L. Graham left on train 6 for the scene of the snow slide Wednesday morning.

Two inches of new snow fell in Klamath Falls and vicinity in little more than an hour Tuesday night, and light snow flurries continued Wednesday morning. The flakes, which were light and fluffy, were piled into drifts by a strong wind, which reached highest velocity of 20 miles an hour between 2:00 and 3:00 o'clock this morning.

Average wind velocity from midnight until noon today was computed at 15 miles per hour by the wind gauge of the California Oregon Power company. The breeze blew from the northwest until about 5:00 o'clock this morning, when it shifted to the west. The minimum temperature of the day was 23 degrees.

Forecast Windy Snow.
The local weatherman gave a menu of brisk winds carrying flurries of snow and cooling weather as his forecast for the next 24 hours. The state weather bureau predicted occasional showers tonight in the western part of Oregon, with colder weather in the eastern section.

Snow flurries at Crown Point, mixed rain and snow at Carrolle, Wash., moderate snow at Winlock, Wash., and occasional snow in the Shalimar mountains were reported Wednesday by the Portland airport weather bureau.

Five inches of new snow was reported from Sun Creek mountain, according to the local office of the state highway department.

All highways are reported open, but motorists are warned that the light fall of new snow has added to the hazards of driving and chains are necessary.

Among them was Jack Houston, American, who won the two-man title in 1928.

LAKE PLACID, N. Y., Feb. 10.

Even Usterstrom of Sweden, world 50 kilometers champion today won the first of the Olympic ski events, the 18 kilometers race, in 17 minutes, 11 seconds.

Defending champion, John Grottenbraaten of Norway, who finished sixth and collapsed over the line. Usterstrom's time for the course, about 12 miles, was 1 hour, 25 minutes, 7 seconds.

Axel Wikstrom, also of Sweden, finished second, exactly two minutes behind Usterstrom, whose time was not considered fast, considering the rather easy course.

Usterstrom of Finland was third.

Shipping point quotations on potatoes sank to new low points Wednesday in the Idaho Falls and Stanes markets, while terminal markets were also weaker except at San Francisco, where Oregon stock held the highest position, according to today's marketgram released by the O. S. C. extension service, co-operating with the U. S. L. A. bureau of agricultural economics. The trade was weak in Los Angeles and Chicago, but prices were unchanged.

Terminal—The principal terminal carlot markets for U. S. No. 1 Netted Gem potatoes were reported weaker today. Chicago market weak on western, dull on other; quotations unchanged. Los Angeles market slightly weaker; quotations unchanged. San Francisco market steady; quotations unchanged.

Shipping—The principal shipping point carlot markets for U. S. No. 1 Netted Gem potatoes were reported dull to lower. Idaho Falls

market dull and rather unsettled; quotations lower to 55c and 45c. Yakima market dull; quotations unchanged. Maine (Presque Isle) market for U. S. No. 1 Green Mountains was weak with quotations lower at 40c and 45c.
