"A moderate business with demand chiefly for the finer wools is reported in the wool market this week. Prices kept generally steady throughout the list.

"The first wools out of Arizona have come to Boston dealers at about 45 cents clean basis landed Boston for good French combing fine and fine medium clips.

"The manufacturing position is without material change. Dress goods are still moving fairly well but men's early lines are rather quiet.

"The foreign markets are all firm. Japan and England are the heaviest buyers in the primary markets.

"Mohair continues dull. Prices are without material change. Kid hair being in occasional demand at steady rates."

CREAMERIES COMPLAIN.

PORTLAND, Feb. 12. (AP)—Complaints are being made by creamery interests regarding the non-enforcement of the state butter

grading and branding law. Complainers of butter makers are that they are being subjected to unfair competition by reason of the undergrade butter wrapped in packages that are branded a higher grade. The practice of branding standards as extras and prime first as standard butter has become so general that the trade is being hurt to a very considerable degree. Those that want to obey the state law are being forced into irregular practices because others are taking their trade away from them with the higher branding than the actual butter content.

TONE STEADY.

JACK DEMPSEY SCORES K. O. AT CLEVELAND

By GEORGE KIRKSEY CLEVELAND, Ohio, Feb. 12. (UP)—Jack Dempsey scored the 28th knockout of his exhibition tour here last night when he stopped Meyer (K. O.) Christner, Akron, Ohio, veteran, after two minutes 33 seconds of the third round of a scheduled four-round exhibition bout.

A crowd of about 10,500 paid approximately \$27,000 to see Dempsey floor Christner three times before he finished him with a left hook to the jaw. Dempsey weighed 195, Christner 204. Both fighters used 10-ounce gloves.

Dropped in First—Dempsey dropped Christner with a left hook to the jaw in the first round, and the battle-scarred Akron fighter was barely able to stagger to his feet at the count of nine just before the bell sounded. Christner was in bad shape, bleeding from the mouth and nose, and had to be led to his corner by one of his handlers. Christner came back courage-

ously in the second round, and actually hit the former champion with a right and left to the head. Dempsey was very tired at the bell. He wobbled slightly as he walked to his corner.

After knocking down Christner this time, Dempsey had to walk from his own corner across the ring to Christner's corner while Referee Matt Hinkle counted out the Akron veteran.
