The Japanese planes were out early, a few minutes after 3 o'clock this morning, to begin the thundering attack on Chapel again. Six of them followed up a bombardment which was begun by Japanese howitzers in the fog and mist.

The bombing guns and bombs shook the city as it had not been shaken since fighting began two weeks ago. When the Japanese cleared away the planes could be seen, swooping down to release their loads of destruction and death.
