UPTON INVITED TO TALK HERE BEFORE LABOR

Representative Jay Upton of Bend, father of the state compensation law, has been invited to appear before the Central Labor Union Wednesday night, February 17, to explain provisions of the act in reference to the \$2.87 a day rate which the state industrial accident commission allows for hospital services. The rate, which is reduced from \$3.50 to \$2.87 for Klamath Falls in 1931, has caused considerable controversy between the commission and local hospitals. The Central Labor Union is continuing its investigation into the matter and will conduct an open meeting Wednesday, to which delegates from the American Legion, Moose and Eagles lodges and the Veterans of Foreign Wars, have been invited. J. H. Trenerry, secretary of the labor council, explained Friday that the commission is interested in raising or lowering the rate, but only attempting to determine whether or not it is sufficient to care for the hospital patients who come under the state compensation act. He explained that Klamath Falls was previously granted a \$3.50 rate because of its isolated location and inaccessibility, but that in 1931 the local rate was placed on a par with rates in other localities. Hospitals, according to Trenerry, claim that they feel that \$2.87 a day is inadequate to care for the patients properly. Hospitals in other cities have written to the Klamath labor council that their views are the same as those of local hospitals. A letter from the commission is printed elsewhere in this paper.

BEATTY, Ore.—When the townspolice were aroused last Thursday by the burning pool hall, conflagration was felt for the Red Top garage and other small buildings in the vicinity. The estimated loss was between \$3,000 and \$4,000.

At the time of the fire, Luke Chester was in charge of the business and he and his family were residing in the apartment side of the house. Most of their household furniture was saved, however.

John Hutchinson was constructed by the fire in 1920, and the date of its opening is an important memory in the minds of the local people, since influenza was spreading rapidly over the community at that time, and nearly everyone attending the dance contracted the disease and building houses, boxing matches and church services.

Mr. Hutchinson states that he may erect another building in the spring, however, it will be only a one-story structure.

Aggressive Fish, Game Policy Outlined By Chamber Commerce

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—The directors of the Lake County Chamber of Commerce have adopted the policy of the chamber for 1932.

The directors expect to spend \$3,015 on the various activities of the chamber. \$500 has been allotted to advertising, which in addition to the \$500 allotted by the Lake county budget committee, will prove ample to take care of advertising needs for this year and also Lake county's portion of the advertising expenses of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland association.

One of the projects for the year will be to circulate the American Legion posts through-out Nevada and California, in an endeavor to persuade their members to attend the national convention in Portland and to tarry either going or coming in the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland.

An aggressive fish and game policy has been outlined new fish and game activities through one of its committees. Recommendations in regard to game were recently made at the meeting at Klamath Falls with the members of the game commission. Recommendations concerning fishing are now being prepared and will be presented in Portland to the members of the game commission at their meeting on February 15.

The high lights of the plan are: one million fish planted each year in Lake county's 455 miles of streams and its seven lakes, with one-third of the streams closed each year. The chamber expects to spend \$250 of its own money during 1932 in fish and game activities in addition to contributions from sportsmen throughout the county who are not members.
