GETS MEDAL, BUT HOW ABOUT A JOB?  
PORTLAND, Feb. 13. (AP)—"Medals are fine—They're great, but they don't get you a job," said Helmut B. Dewitz today. He had been told the war department had announced Thursday that after these many years the distinguished service cross has been awarded him for valor during the world war.

But of a job for more than a year, Dewitz sat with his young wife and three small children. "It's great," he agreed, "but it doesn't get me a job. I've been trying for a year. It's pretty tough, you know, with the family—pretty blamed tough."

It was about August 24, 1918, when Dewitz and another soldier routed out 70 Germans from a machine gun nest, took the machine gun and used it in blasting out another enemy group.

Long ago France awarded Dewitz the cross de guerre, and Italy presented him with a similar medal.
