Captain Van Vactor is in receipt of a communication from Major General George E. Leach, head of the militia bureau of the war department, listing those units which received the highest rating which the government confers.

Captain Van Vactor stated that the excellent rating is a high honor to be accorded a military unit, and that to be the only unit of its kind in the state to receive that honor brings great credit to the local battery and Klamath Falls.

and high civic ideals no one will question.

"But our splendid highway system and its maintenance on an efficient and economic basis are above and far more important to the people of the state than are individuals or personal disagreements."

Commenting further on the appointments, the governor mentioned that just before leaving on his recent trip to Washington, D. C., he "met informally" with Ainsworth and Hanley in Portland, "to discuss economies and efficiencies that might be introduced into the highway department."

Meeting Recalled

It was agreed at this meeting, the governor said, that there should be a 30 per cent reduction in the administrative expense of the department; that the commission should recommend to the next legislature a 25 per cent reduction in motor license fees, and that arrangements should be made for the federal bureau of roads to survey the highway system to ascertain whether additional economies and efficiencies might be introduced.

"To my surprise," the governor declared, "on my return from Washington I found that the program agreed upon had not yet been put into execution, but on the contrary was hung up apparently on account of personal dissensions among the commissioners."

"A situation thus was created," the governor continued, "which jeopardized the whole economy program, demoralized the work of the highway department, and threatened a movement for a motor vehicle license fee so low that the burden of meeting our highway bonds would be imposed on the already over-taxed property owners of the state."

"Because of the methods employed by Commissioner Spaulding, the result, I believe, of unwise counsel," Commissioners Ainsworth and Hanley resigned, and on the eve of the adoption of a constructive economy program for the benefit of taxpayers and the relief of motorists, I find myself confronted with the unenviable task of reorganizing the commission so that a retrenchment policy may be carried out."

The new commissioners, Meier said, "are known throughout the state, and their high standing as citizens and successful business men gives assurance that the affairs of the commission will be administered with the highest ability and the greatest efficiency and economy."

JAPS RAID U. S. SCHOOL THIRD TIME

acks on Chapel and withdraw or there would be a military engagement of major proportions.

Last night the Japanese military commander said the disposition of his troops on the Woonung and Chapel fronts constituted a warning to the Chinese to withdraw. He indicated that the warning would take more definite form before the Japanese went into action.

SHANGHAI, Feb. 16. (AP)—Japan's army of 25,000 turned the ordinary peaceful mill district of Shanghai in which it is quartered into a scene of feverish military activity late today, leading to a belief that the long-expected big battle was about to begin, ending a situation which had become a shifting game of checkmate.

Infantry columns marched here and there and cavalry and artillery units dashed about. Columns of artillery lined the roads, well-groomed horses hitched to the big guns. Groups of officers rode ahead of the artillery units and foot soldiers tramped behind the pieces.

Headquarters Silent

Motorcycles skidded through the cavalry and infantry formations, although no one seemed to know where they were going. Headquarters officials kept a close-mouthed silence and one's observation was hampered everywhere by sentries who frowned on prying eyes.

Long trains of brown army trucks moved up and down the roads from the Japanese wharves, completing the unloading of military supplies from the transport ships in the river. Each truck was under a heavy guard, carrying unloading rifles. They hauled bedding, food, cooking outfits, tents, clothing, fuel, ammunition and other war supplies.

Smartly uniformed officers rode restless horses and were surrounded by staff men and guards. Motorcycles, each bearing three men and a machine gun dashed through the milling traffic.

Aviators Busy

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filled the bomb racks with bombs.

At the same time Russian and Chinese laborers continued leveling the new runways of the field. Around the edges of the airfield thirty planes glistened in the brilliant sunshine. Some of them were bombers and some pursuit planes. All were a bright metallic color, with flaming red tails and they bore the rising sun emblem of Japan on their sides.

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
