CHANGE IS SWEEPING, SUDDEN
Business Move is Praised

Harmony, Progress Hoped For

Out of chaos and disharmony that have prevailed in state highway affairs, there emerged today an entirely new highway commission. Governor Julius L. Meier put to rest rumors that have been rampant for the past week, when he announced the names of Leslie M. Scott, Portland, Carl G. Washburne, Eugene, and E. B. Aldrich, Pendleton, as the new members of the board.

Only one head fell before the governor's axe, however. Charles G. Spaulding, apparently was ousted from the commission. William Hanley and J. C. Ainsworth had already resigned, and it was understood the governor offered to reappoint them with a new member in Mr. Spaulding's place. It was Mr. Spaulding who was responsible for the disharmony that ruled the board during most of the tenure of the outgoing commissioners. We are left without an explanation of the reason Mr. Ainsworth and Mr. Hanley refused to return to the board in case Mr. Spaulding was removed.

It is in no way meant as a reflection on these men to voice our confidence in the abilities of the new members of the board. All are outstanding men. Mr. Scott, who will probably be chairman of the commission, is a capitalist of Portland, the head of the Oregon Tax Conservation League, a man well conversant with the needs of the state and of known business ability. Mr. Washburne is a prominent merchant of Eugene, a shrewd business man of high integrity. Mr. Aldrich is co-publisher of the Pendleton East Oregonian, formerly regent of the state college, and widely recognized as an authority on matters of practical importance to Eastern Oregon.

It is not without regret that we note the passing of the old commission. Its members, particularly Mr. Ainsworth and Mr. Hanley, had shown a sympathetic understanding of our problems in the Klamath country. It had become apparent, however, that the situation on the board had become intolerable, and some change was inevitable. The men who resigned from the board

Keep that in mind if you see "Five Star Final," which, as a film production, is gripping and effective.

Manhattan Mirrors

NEW YORK, Feb. 16, (U.P.)—Walter Winchell, the Broadway columnist who specializes in juicy bits of gossip, has been subpoenaed to appear before the grand jury and tell what he knows about the machine gun murder of Vincent Coll.

About four hours before Coll was shot the night of February 7, Winchell's column in the Daily Mirror contained the remark that gangsters had just flown from Chicago with a plane-load of machine guns for the purpose of "rubbing out Coll."

Two days later he predicted that one of Coll's men was "on the spot." And since that time he claims to have received a warning that he, too, is marked for death. He now has two detectives for a bodyguard.

The court was considerate today when Vincent Coll's young widow, the former Lottie Kriesberger, who had been married to the boy gangster only a few months, came up for trial on a charge of violating the Sullivan law, which prohibits possession of deadly weapons.

Last October, when police nabbed Coll and his bride in a hotel room, Mrs. Coll claimed possession of a pistol and a blackjack, shielding her husband from blame. Today, with Vincent's funeral barely over, she was summoned to court for the trial. The judge granted her a postponement until February 26.

Health Talks

When a baby is sick it must be bathed frequently. Sometimes, sadly enough, it is so ill that it cannot be bathed in a tub, but it has to be bathed while in bed. An experienced nurse knows how to do this. She first sees to it that the room is properly heated, that there are no drafts and that an hour has passed since the child has had a meal.

The fresh bed clothing, the towels and the wash cloth should be available at the foot of the bed. The utensils used in washing should be on a table by the side of the crib or bed.

When everything is ready, the bath proceeds as follows: The baby is covered with the blanket and undressed under the blanket. Its soiled clothing is placed either in a laundry bag or on sheets of paper ready for wrapping. A bath towel is spread under the head and neck of the patient, which are then washed with the wash cloth wrung out of water and with soap, if desirable.

After the face, neck, ears and upper arms are washed, they are dried with the face towel and the bath towel is removed from under the head. It is then placed lengthwise under the patient and the chest and abdomen are carefully washed. If turning does not hurt the child, it is turned to the side and the back washed while the bath towel is placed lengthwise close to the back.

Then the bath towel is spread lengthwise under each leg separately and the leg is washed and dried. The child must be well protected by being covered with the blanket during the procedure of changing.

After the bath is completed the child may be rubbed with alcohol, or, if the child is too young for this, powder may be applied generously. Then the child is dressed under the blanket in clean sleeping garments.

An experienced nurse can change the bed clothing with the child in bed without much trouble to the child, even though it is quite sick. An inexperienced person may have difficulty with the patient in the bed, and may find it necessary to lift the child carefully in order to make the necessary change of bed clothing.

If the child has been having much fever, cold cream should be applied to the lips in order to make it comfortable.

Fashion Tips

Exercising is a little bit like saving money. It is not the amount accomplished at a given

time that counts, but the day-by-day habit that accumulates something worth while.

I know a woman almost 70 who is as limber as most women of 30. She can stoop, bend, walk, dance with never a creak to indicate the brittleness that sometimes comes with age.

For over 40 years, this woman told me, she had done 10 minutes of exercise both morning and night. Just 20 minutes a day but she claims never to have missed a single day, except the few times she was flat on her back with illness, and those have been fewer in her life than the average.

She has always centered all her attention during exercising on that through-the-ribs area of her body. She stretches, bends, sways, shakes each leg a few times and draws herself up out of her hips by various exercises. The limberness of her spine testifies to the efficacy of her regime. But her daily application mustn't be overlooked.

After stretching morning and evening, the next step in exercising is to shake up the body from the hips. With your hands still holding onto each other above the head, swing your arms and shoulders first to one side, then to the other, so that you twist your body from the waistline. This is to grab your liver a kick. Most livers need it, like it and work much better for it.

Next, stand on one leg and lift the other, knee flexed, keeping your back straight, and try to touch your breast bone with your knee. The best way to do it is to grab your knee with your hands and help it up. Keep your mind on your back or you'll just naturally bend over to help yourself reach your knee. That is the wrong way to get this exercise done.

Hug each knee to your chest about ten times, always with the toes of the foot pointed down.
