The conventional automobile body has less wind resistance when moving backward than when moving normally.

THREE MILLION PERSONS VIEW FORD DISPLAY

Evidence of an awakening interest by the American public in automobiles is graphically portrayed in a report by the Ford Motor company that approximately 3,500,000 persons—the greatest attendance for any similar event in American history—have visited the Ford Exposition of Progress during its showing in New York and Detroit.

In New York the exposition brought a total attendance of 2,295,023, and it was necessary to extend the showing for one week to handle crowds that thronged the Commerce building at the rate of over 100,000 a day.

In Detroit the exposition, held during the latter part of October, was extended two days to take care of visitors who jammed into Convention hall to see the vast display depicting the evolution of the automobile over the past thirty years. More than 1,200,000 persons attended the exposition in Detroit.

The attendance indicated to Ford officials a pronounced interest in automobile purchasing, as well as a growing public realization of the close alliance of hundreds of other industries throughout the nation with the automobile factory.

Scores of costly exhibits portrayed vividly to the vast throng of exposition visitors how farms, factories and mines in all parts of the United States and in many foreign countries contributed to the manufacture of the motor car.

Petitions Out For Larger Dam Locks
THE DALLAS, Jan. 10, (UP)—Petitions which would require the government to construct locks at Bonneville large enough for passage of ocean-going vessels were being prepared for circulation in the northwest today.

Action followed word from Senator Steiwer of Oregon that a request for a review of the proposal by army engineers probably would be refused.

Preston plans call for locks large enough to allow barge operation.

It was said here Governor Meier will be requested to present the petition to President Roosevelt.

35 Years Sentence Given Oregon Man
OREGON CITY, Jan. 10, (UP)—Earl Gordon Morrison was en route to Salem today to begin serving a 35-year sentence meted when he pleaded guilty to two statutory counts involving a 10-year-old Portland girl.

A third charge of child stealing was dismissed as the deed was committed in Multnomah county and not Clackamas, where the case was tried. Morrison was arrested late the night of December 31 by State police who halted his car to investigate his lack of a tall light.

NEW YORK REPORTS BUYING INCREASES

NEW YORK, Jan. 10, (AP)—An influx of buyers to the local wholesale markets, setting a 4-year record and exceeding the same period of 1933 by 35 per cent, was reported by the New York Times today for the week ended yesterday.

The buyers registered during the week totaled 1,346, the highest number since the week of January 29, 1930. The 1929 peak was 1,743 for the week of February 5. Only 992 were registered a year ago.

"All indications are that the totals reported will be exceeded next week," the Times said. "With the possibility that a new record for arrivals will be set at that time."

Relief Employees Stage War Upon Strike Inciters

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 10, (UP)—Civil works administration relief employees today turned against alleged communists who incited them to strike.

The relief workers beat several alleged communists and then wrecked communist headquarters.

The fighting started when the agitators attempted to pass out literature to CWA workers. The pamphlets urged a strike. After fists had been swung and the agitators routed, the angry relief workers organized a march on the communist headquarters.

They force their way in, broke furniture and generally wrecked the place.

A half dozen alleged communists were injured, none seriously. No arrests were made and no repetition of the disorders was in view.

Wife of Notorious Gunman Released

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 10, (UP)—Mrs. Wilbur Underhill, wife of the notorious killer and robber, was released from jail here last night so that she could attend her husband's funeral.

Mrs. Underhill, who has been charged with harboring a criminal, her husband of only two months, was released on \$2500 bond.

She said she would leave tonight for Joplin, Mo., where Underhill is to be buried tomorrow.

Holman Advocates Sterilization of Insane in State

SALEM, Jan. 10, (UP)—Sterilization laws for Oregon were advocated by State Treasurer Rufus C. Holman today.

"The growing number of insane and feeble-minded who are reproduced in proportionately greater numbers than normal offspring, demands the state pass sterilization laws immediately," Holman said.

His statement followed a report that patients at Fairview feeble-minded home number 393—the largest number ever quartered in the state institution.

The total at Fairview represented an increase of 20 persons since November 30. Of the total of 393, 265 are under 16 years of age.

"Numerous nations and more than 20 states in this country have adopted this wise measure to prevent a startling increase in underbreds," Holman said. "Germany is now sterilizing 400,000 persons."

There are 2,191 patients in Oregon state hospitals for insane, of which 150 are small children. For Fairview alone, it was pointed out, it required \$132,888.25 to care for inmates last year.
