

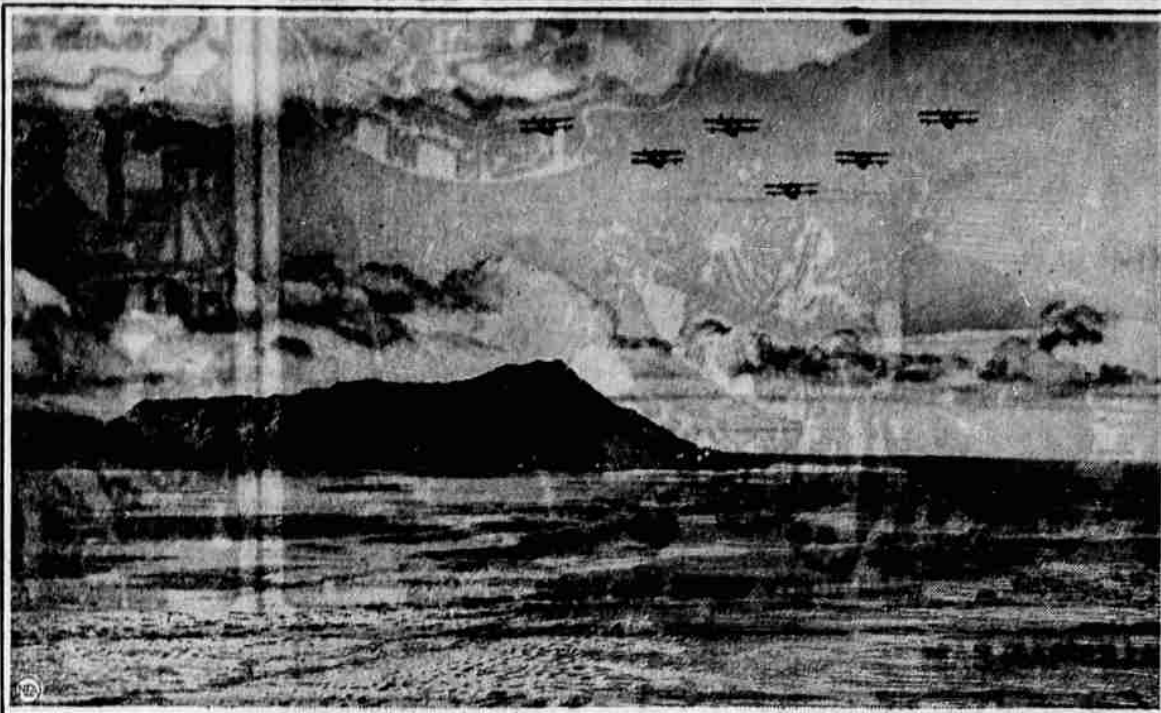

Diamond Head, lumbering Hawaiian volcano, shown here silhouetted against billowy clouds, is the majestic landmark for which U. S. naval aviators will scan the Pacific as they near the end of their hazardous mass flight from San Francisco to Pearl Harbor. Diamond Head, long extinct, rising above famous Waikiki beach at the southern tip of Oahu, is within sight of Honolulu and near Pearl Harbor, goal of the flight—longest over-water mass flight in history.

"Richest Girl" Finally Poses



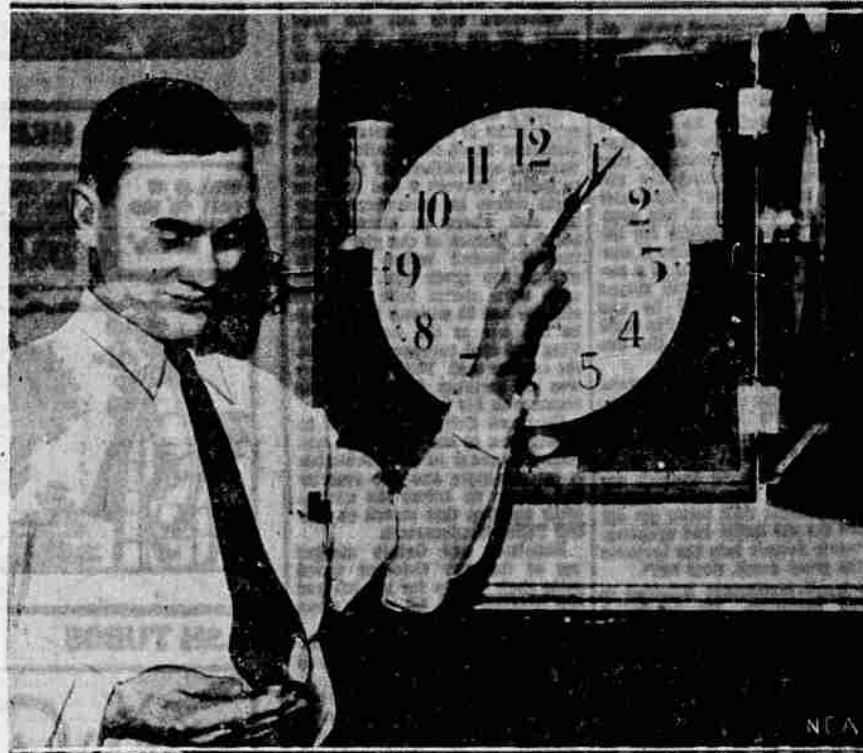

Three New Senators Get Garner's Greetings



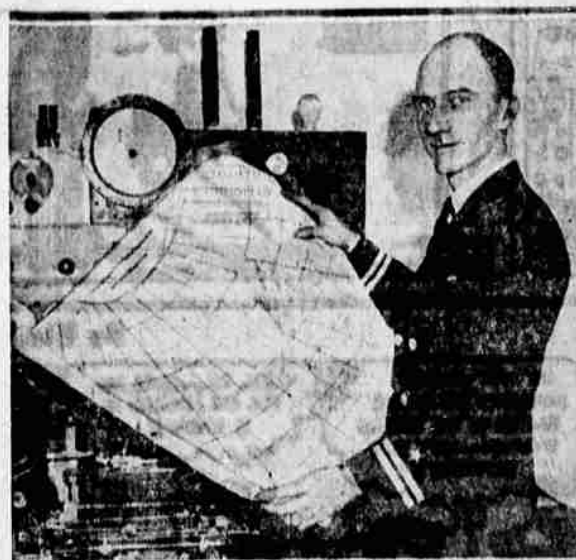

Billings, Denied Parole, Philosophical Still



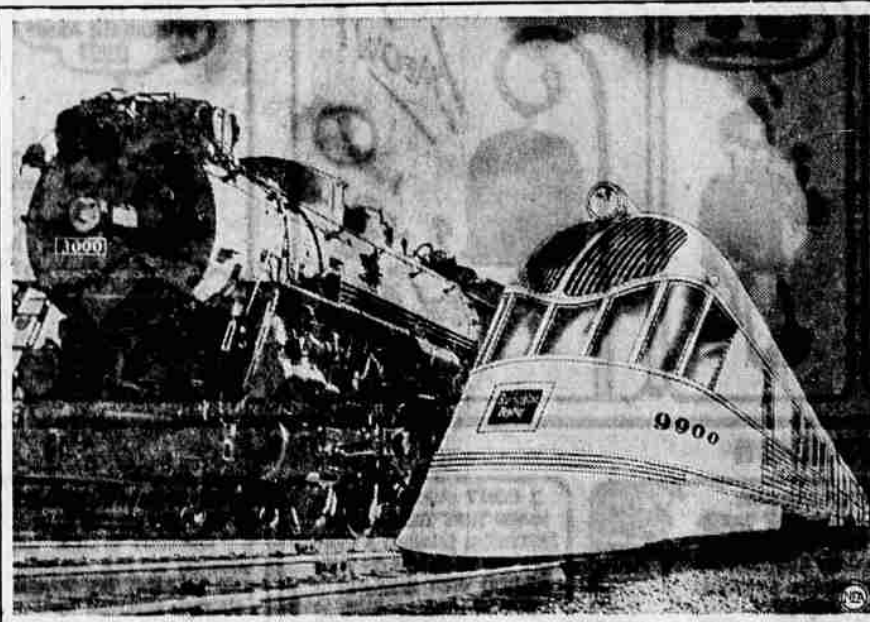

Motorized Flyer Threatens Steam King's Reign



Another revolution in railroading is pictured here—an aristocrat of steam whose reign is threatened and its rival, the Burlington Route's first stream-lined stainless steel motorized train, capable of two miles a minute speed. The "Zephyr" is nearing completion in Philadelphia shops and will tour the east before going into service. The "Aristocrat" now pulls a crack Chicago-Denver train on the Burlington. The "Zephyr" complete weighs only 85 tons; the "iron horse," with tender, weighs 359 tons.

Simplifying the Puzzle of Uncle Sam's Budgets

TREMENDOUS increase in governmental expenses outlined in President Roosevelt's budget message is strikingly shown for the busy reader by these charts and figures, which give actual expenditures for the fiscal year of July 1, 1932, to June 30, 1933, and estimates of expenditures for the fiscal years ending June 30, 1934, and June 30, 1935. They show that the cost for 1934 is nearly double that of 1933 and that expenditures, though greatly reduced in 1935, still are at a high level.		THESE tables do not include President Roosevelt's extra budget requests of \$1,166,000,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1934, and \$2,000,000,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1935. The great drop in the estimates for 1935 as compared with those for 1934 is due largely to the RFC item. More than three billions is allotted for RFC in 1934; in 1935, there is a credit item for RFC of \$480,436,000, representing loan payments contemplated for next year.
