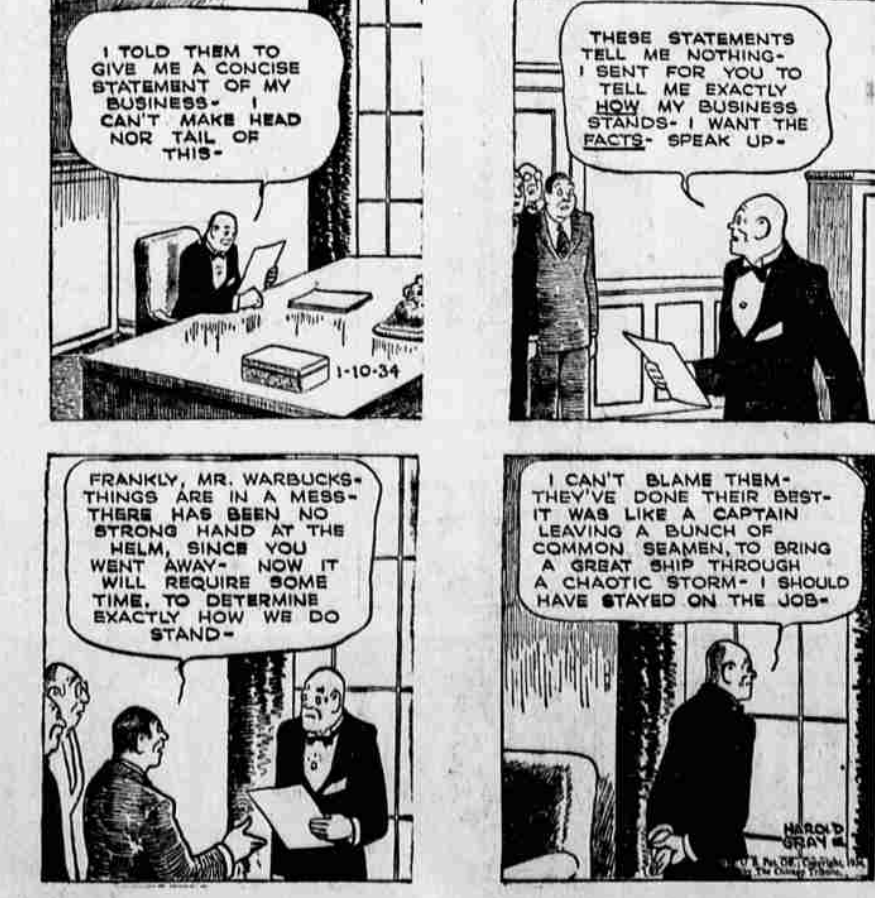

National, Local Markets

SELLING PRICE OF EGGS CUT 1 TO 2 CENTS

PORTLAND, Jan. 10. (AP)—Effective at once local co-ops announced a cut of 1 to 2 cents dozen in the selling price on eggs here, a seasonal affair. The elimination of the large size from the market and quality was also seasonal and usually occurs at this time.

Market for butter continued more or less steady character. Late receipts and churning have been somewhat decreased with resulting gain in cold storage movement. Butterfat was firm.

Chicken Mart Steady
Chicken market was holding steady with practically no change in established buying prices although recent premiums were no longer available for light weights.

With the fight for turkeys still waging at southern Oregon points where the chief source of current offerings was, there has been no setback to the price. Locally there was so much competition for freezing that values were also held up. Little consumptive call here.

Further advance in the price of hot-house tomatoes has resulted from the extreme scarcity of offerings together with a famine of ripe Mexicans. A small shipment of Florida stock was due within a day or so.

Apples In Demand
Strong tone continued in the market for country killed calves with sales up to 8 1/2c generally on the street.

There was an acute shortage of quality country killed lambs and this was reflected in prices. Ewes at 4 to 7c pound show one of the highest price ranges here for a number of years past.

Increasing demand for apples has caused a general advance in the price. All northwest primary points are asking more money for packed stock.

Artichokes were holding firm. Cranberry demand and price continued favorable.

Small oranges were higher. Greater supplies of cauliflower and an easier tone was shown. Cabbage retained good demand for carload lots.

Potatoes were about steady. Alaska King salmon offered here 17c with head on.

Smelt were higher with the Columbia strike still on. A few crabs were arriving from the Oregon coast.

Hot-house rhubarb offering \$2 for choice, \$2.50 for fancy and \$3 for extra fancy.

OREGON SUPPLIES 33 POTATO CARS

Eight hundred and seventy one carloads of potatoes were shipped in the United States Tuesday. Oregon shipped 33, Washington 14 and Idaho 151. Main shipped 222 cars and Nebraska 48. At Presque Isle the market was about steady, with demand slow. No. 1 Green Mountains brought \$1.35 to \$1.45 a hundred, sacked, in carloads f.o.b. shipping point.

At Idaho Falls demand was good and the market slightly stronger. No. 1 Russets brought mostly \$1.05 a hundred, sacked, in carloads f.o.b. cash track.

In the Twin Falls-Burley district demand was good and the market slightly stronger. No. 1 Russets brought mostly \$1.05 a hundred, sacked, in carloads f.o.b. cash track. At Yakima growers continued to hold for higher prices. Offerings were very light. No. 1 Russets brought \$30 to \$31 a ton, sacked, in carloads f.o.b. cash track, same as Tuesday.

BUYERS EXCEED WHEAT SELLERS

CHICAGO, Jan. 10. (AP)—Something akin to buoyancy pervaded the grain market today, with supply and demand conditions at least on an enlarged scale, and with buyers much more numerous than sellers.

Reports of mills coming to terminal markets for supplies of wheat were stimulating influence. The trade expected farm reserve holdings of wheat to be officially reported this afternoon as around 100,000,000 bushels less than last year.

Wheat closed firm, 10c to 11c above yesterday's finish; corn, 8c to 9c up; oats, 1c to 1c advanced, and provisions varying from 2c decline to a rise of 7c.
