Loads Lightened

The increased speed was believed due to the lessening load of gasoline, enabling the big planes to race as they neared the finish of the flight, and favorable winds.

The flight began yesterday at 2:23 p. m., (P.S.T.), from San Francisco bay.

HALFWAY AT DAWN

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 11 (AP)—Flying steadily through the night the six United States navy sea planes making the first squadron flight to Honolulu were well past the halfway mark shortly before daybreak today.

At 6:30 a. m. (P.S.T.) the squadron was 1314 nautical miles (1513 land miles) from San Francisco and had been in the air more than 16½ hours since starting through the Golden Gate.

One Ship Separated

Fair weather and helpful tail winds were promised over most of the remainder of the course.

The planes left San Francisco at 2:22 p. m. yesterday with a bright sun shining on their silver tip wings but at 8:45 last night they ran into a heavy fog during which one of the craft, the 10-P5, piloted by Lieutenant John Perry, became separated from the others for a time. It rejoined the squadron only to drop behind about midnight. It swung into formation once more shortly before 2 a. m.

Ship Stations Passed

The mine sweeper Sandpiper, first of the six navy ships stationed along the route to Hawaii, was passed by the squadron at 5:52 p. m. yesterday, 300 miles out. At 9:15 they flew over the destroyer Schenck, 600 miles out. The searchlights of the destroyer Breeze at the halfway mark, 1050 miles from land, were sighted at 2:20 a. m.

A few minutes before 5 a. m. (P.S.T.), the giant flying boats passed the mine sweeper Whippoorwill, 1220 miles from San Francisco.

Welcome Prepared

Shortly before the halfway point was reached Admiral A. W. Johnson, base commander of the air force, started preparations for greeting the fliers at the conclusion of the longest over water mass flight ever made.

Admiral Johnson, on board the aircraft tender Wright, 600 miles from Honolulu, sent orders to the navy base at Pearl Harbor to dispatch three planes to meet the squadron. The escort was directed to welcome Lieutenant Commander Kneifer McGinnis and his men in the vicinity of the mine sweeper Avocet, 15 miles north of Moakai Light, Hawaii.

If the rate of speed maintained since the start of the flight was continued the six officers and 24 enlisted men making up the crew should reach Honolulu about noon (or 2:30 p. m. Pacific Standard time) approximately 24 hours after their start.

GASOLINE FIGHT HITS PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Jan. 11. (AP)—Portland motorists today were able to buy first structure gasoline for two cents a gallon less than they have been paying. The price was dropped late yesterday from 22 cents to 20 cents at a number of service stations.

The move brought an immediate statement from Harry W. Brown of Portland, manager of the Oregon State Petroleum committee—code authority that the 22-cent price, though not a set one, "is accepted as one that gives a fair margin of profit."

Reduction to 20 cents was a violation of NRA principles, Brown declared.

FUNDS FOR U. S. SCHOOLS SOUGHT

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 10. (AP)—Horace E. Walters, assistant manager of the Oregon branch of the Home Owner's Loan corporation here, resigned from office and was en route by airplane to the national capital tonight.

Walters telegraphed his resignation to John H. Fahey, chairman, of the Home-Board at Washington, D. C. Then he boarded an airplane and will report to Fahey's office—presumably for an interview—Friday.

Ashurst Returns

Protests were reported being wired James A. Farley, postmaster-general and head of the democratic patronage, against a purported communication from Chairman Fahey to J. P. Lipscomb, Oregon Home manager here, ordering the dismissal of "anyone not doing as Lipscomb wished."

"I am going back there in an effort to get this Oregon Home Loan office straightened out so it can give the people service to which they are entitled," Walters announced before he left.

Edward B. Ashurst, local branch manager of the corporation returned Thursday evening from Portland, where he was called by the state officials of the organization Monday.

Ashurst stated he was assured Klamath and the southern Oregon districts would receive more prompt action on applications for loans.

LABOR TROUBLES RISING IN SOUTH

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 11 (AP)—A rash of reputed labor discontent broke out over southern California today, affecting, besides the milk industry which has been the subject of attacks for a week, the citrus regions, lettuce areas, the bakery industry and even the ranks of civil works administration employees.

Trouble among milk workers, which was supplemented several days ago by outbreaks in the lettuce field of Imperial Valley, burst into violence again. Eight milkers at the Devries dairy near Hynes were beaten severely with hammers, clubs and pitchforks by a dozen men identified as agitators.

Hall Appointed to NRA Office
