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F. R.'S RULE WINS TWICE IN CONGRESS

the democratic leadership, however, faced as it is with dissatisfaction over patronage.

On petition of 28 democratic congressmen, Representative Clarence F. Lea of California had to call a party caucus for late Monday for consideration of patronage matters. He heads the caucus committee.

Senator Harrison (D., Miss.), obtained reconsideration of the liquor tax bill and Murphy (D., Iowa), put over reconsideration of the disputed amendment.

The latter, who yesterday supported the proposition aimed at France and other non-payers of debts, explained he had changed his mind on being given to understand that this method would hamper the president in his "tariff reciprocity bargaining plans" to help American foreign trade.

Meanwhile, speculation over prospective new moves by President Roosevelt in his managed currency monetary program was revived as he conferred with Governor Black of the federal reserve board and arranged for a later talk with Secretary Morgenthau of the treasury and Attorney General Cummings together.

Silver advocates on Capitol Hill have expressed confidence that something new by the president to aid this industry in connection with his monetary program was in prospect.

Campaign Underway
In the house, the campaign of bi-metalism advocates to obtain support for silver remonetization legislation spread with the decision of the wheat belt states to name a co-operative committee.

The support given the move by representatives from Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska and the Dakotas was disavowed, however, by two Kansas republicans—McGugin and Gayer.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10. (AP)—The senate passed the House Liquor Tax 'til without record vote late today, after including an anti-administration amendment aimed at nations defaulting their war debts to America.

The intense resentment in congress against foreign debt defaulters smashed party lines and brought approval, 40 to 39, of an amendment by Senator Clark, Dem., Missouri, imposing a special tax of \$3 a gallon on wines and \$5 a gallon on spirits from nations not meeting their obligations to this country.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10. (AP)—The supposedly smooth running administration congressional machine developed knicks and jerks today as senators suddenly showed signs of having minds of their own.

The senate passed the administration liquor tax bill without change in domestic rates, but with an amendment providing for a special excise of \$3 a gallon on wines and \$5 on liquor imported from nations which haven't paid their war debts to date. Many democrats supported the amendment. It approved by the house.

At the same time, the Roosevelt plan to use foreign liquor import quotas as a means of increasing American sale of farm products abroad.

On top of that, Senator Wagner, democrat, New York, usually a staunch Rooseveltian, started a fight on the St. Lawrence waterway treaty which the President, in a special message, asked to have ratified.

A fight on the treaty had been expected, but it had not been expected generally that Wagner, chairman of the NRA labor advisory board and a key figure of the recovery program, would lead it.

The President sent two messages to Capitol Hill, the one asking Senate ratification of the St. Lawrence treaty, and one asking government guarantees of the principal of \$2,000,000,000 in farm loan bonds. The interest already is guaranteed. The
