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BUTTER TRADE TONE STEADY AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Jan. 11. (P)—Trade in the butter market reflected a steady tone. With some of the cash stores making a specialty of firsts because of the very low price, this grade was perhaps the strongest of all.

During the late session of the produce exchange there was no change in the quotation on cubes and butterfat values were considered about steady.

Trading in the egg market was considered about steady. Recent open cuts in quotations have left the established price cutters in a position where they can do little damage here.

Market for lightweight hens was weak here as a result of the lower prices established in Washington sections that affected the trade here.

Slight showing of strength was suggested in the market for potatoes at Oregon-Washington sources even though the snap was not enough to create excitement.

**TRADING IN GRAIN
HITS LOWER PRICE**

CHICAGO, Jan. 11. (P)—Despite a show of strength at the outset today, the bulk of later trading in grain was at lower prices.

Comparative dearth of aggressive new speculative buying became manifest, and the government report on farm reserve supplies of grain had little effect except at the start.

Wheat closed unstable, 1-1 1/2 cents under yesterday's finish, corn 1/4-1/2c down, oats 1/4-1/2c off, and provisions varying from 12 cents decline to 7 cents gain.

BOSTON WOOL
BOSTON, Jan. 11. (P) (U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Greasy combing domestic wools were moderately active on 58s, 60s, 3/4 blood and finer quality grades. The principal call was on French combing 64s and finer territory wools at 81-83 cents soured bases. Medium quality greasy combing domestic wools were mostly quiet with quotations unchanged from last week. Several lines of spot combing foreign wools received a fair demand at prices showing a decided advance over previous sales but considerably under current replacement in primary foreign markets.
