KLAMATH READY FOR BEAR FIVE

Pelicans Oppose Strong Rival Tonight At High School.

An exciting basketball game is likely to be presented to the public when the Bend Lava Bears invade the Pelicans nest for a two game series to be played tonight and Saturday at the Klamath high gymnasium.
Johnny Pastega will start at forward, according to a statement coach French made today. Pastega, a star in the opening games last year but declared ineligible before the district tournament, has been unable to play so far this season because of a broken arm suffered in the Klamath-Bend football game.
Bend Man Experienced
Opposing Pastega will be Marshall of Bend, who is an experienced player. According to reports from the northern city, Marshall has been showing up well and Johnny is expected to have his hands full taking care of him.
Darrell Miller's ankle is healing rapidly and he will start against the Bears. Klamath will put Miller against Wilbur Smith. Smith is a small but a fast and heady player and is rated one of the best jumpers for his height in central Oregon.
Rivalry Resumed
Two guards, Nello Giovannini of Klamath and Red Strom of Bend, will resume their football rivalry and, according to rough brand of basketball displayed on the home floor so far this season, some of the tactics used in football will not be unexpected. 64 Qualifiers Start Rounds on Bay Region

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 12. (AP)—Golf stars from all sections of the country, 64 qualifiers from a field of nearly two hundred starters, teed off today in the opening match play round of the annual \$4,000 San Francisco national match play open championship.
The eighteen hole matches brought together as representative a field as ever assembled for northern California's richest links event.
Professional club swingers predominated but enough crack amateur players survived the qualifying test to make the tournament one of general interest.
John Rogers, long driving pro from Denver, claimed the first share of prize money. He won medal honors yesterday with a score of 70, two under par for the Lake Merced course. The pace-setting feat returned Rogers \$50.

Godwin, claimant of the southern championship of his class, failed to land a single solid punch on Rosenbloom during the 12 rounds.
Maxie's slaps made a lot of noise but his blows obviously failed to cause his opponent any discomfort either.
The crowd of 1200 met the decision with laughter. Three weeks ago another crowd here had vigorously booed a decision that called the last meeting between the two fighters a draw.
Godwin had appeared to have the best of it that night, but last night he was ineffective although the more aggressive of the two.

Two wrestling rowdies, Al Karasick of Portland and Pat Reilly of Boston, clash tonight in Mack Lillard's weekly main event at the Legion hall. The athletes head an all-heavyweight card that sends Bob Stone of Chicago against Rocky Burke of Victoria, B. C., in the one hour semi-wind-up.
Karasick, co-holder of the Legion "championship" for 1933, returns to Klamath Falls still disgruntled over his failure to defeat popular Dr. DeVora. DeVora held the undefeated Russian Lion to a main event draw.
Reilly Heavyweight
Corrected weight figures indicated this afternoon the Boston Irishman would hold a ten-pound weight advantage. Karasick, however, has been successful in defeating larger men than himself and is not expected to be at any serious disadvantage against Reilly.
The Bostonian will weigh 202, and Karasick about 192.
Both men have established reputations for toughness, and the match tonight probably will be a rugged one.
Stone Favorite
Bob Stone stood out this afternoon as a favorite over Rocky Burke, a newcomer. Stone, young and promising, has won one match and lost one in his two exhibitions here. He lost to Ted Thye two weeks ago, and then came back last Friday to defeat Billy Newman of Seattle.
Ray Fribble of Medford will referee both bouts.

UPSETS LIKELY IN HOOP RACE

Three Games in North Should Indicate Title Powers.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 12. (UP)—Three games on this week-end's slate should give a strong early-season indication of which direction the pennant winds will blow in the northern division, coast conference basketball race.
University of Washington, leading the pack with two victories and no defeats, plays Idaho Friday and Saturday at Moscow.
Oregon State, conference champion, and Oregon, 1933 tail-enders and 1934 dark horse selection, clash at Eugene Saturday night.
Vandals Throated
Washington's two victories were gained over Idaho, though a singular point of that series was the fact that the teams were tied in aggregate number of field goals scored in the two games. Washington had a one-goal edge in the first contest and Idaho the same margin in the second. Conversion of free throws decided the issue in favor of the Huskies.
"We were too excited about our chances of beating Washington," was the way Rich Fox, Vandal mentor, explained the double-loss. "My boys are now confident we can defeat Washington."
Fox's team included many sophomores. The Vandals play a short passing game. In the excitement of the Seattle series they threw several long passes which were intercepted and converted into valuable Husky points.
Washington faces a severe test in its eastern invasion. After playing Idaho twice the Husky boosters must tackle the tough Washington Staters in a pair of games at Pullman. Dick Mer-rin, Husky center, was promised plenty of action as Clyde Wagner, other center, has a sprained ankle.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 12. (UP)—Joe Demaggio, the 19-year-old outfielder who broke the Pacific Coast league record for consecutive hitting last year, today signed a new contract with the San Francisco Seals—or rather his father Joseph, fisherman, signed it for him because Joe is under legal age.
Joe and his brother Tom—one of five brothers who with four sisters added to the Demaggio family list—brought a dozen crabs to Seal Headquarters and made a feast out of the signing.
Demaggio, playing in his first year as a professional last season, hit in 61 consecutive games. He drove in more runs, 189, than anyone else in the circuit. He hit .340, played in 187 games (all except two of those played by the Seals), led the league in assists from the outfield with 32, and had a fielding average of .983.
