

Full Week of Sports Due Here

Basketball, Boxing and Wrestling Present Six Major Events. Lillard Has Difficulty Making Rematches. Sons May Play Multnomah Club Here. Klamath to Receive Test Against Medford.

A full schedule of athletic activity will break up the monotony of the winter sport season next week. Six events in basketball, boxing and wrestling will occupy the people of Klamath county from Tuesday until Saturday.

The week's events: Tuesday—Southern Oregon Normal school basketball team vs. Waldorf at Klamath Union high school.

Thursday—American Legion boxing card at Merrill Community hall.

Friday—Wrestling at Legion hall. Medford high school basketball team vs. Klamath here. Klamath Wildcats vs. Dorris of northern California here.

Saturday—Klamath Wildcats at Henley.

One of the major difficulties of promoting wrestling, Mack Lillard has come to know, arises from the impossibility of making rematches. There have been some excellent heavyweight bouts since Lillard arrived in Klamath Falls, but no two wrestlers have been brought together for a second bout.

The best matches, according to public taste, are the wild-ones, and no wrestler likes to repeat a rough battle. Lillard has tried to bring athletes together for a second match, but each time the wrestlers refused.

Les Wolfe, returning to Klamath Falls for a match next Friday, probably would be willing to meet Karasick. Wolfe lost to the lion several weeks ago. Karasick, however, had so much trouble winning he already has told Lillard he won't meet the lion.

It's possible Lillard will match Wolfe against Dr. DeVora, the man who held Karasick to a draw.

The Klamath promoter has developed the bad habit of misspelling wrestlers' names. When a new athlete arrives he immediately protests the manner his title has been twisted. Here are a few examples of the matchmaker's affronts:

Dr. Nap DeVora who was first introduced to Klamath Falls as Dr. Nap Devore. Frankie Schroll. He objected to Frank School. Rocky Brooks. He dialed Rocky Burke.

Jack Kogat, not Jack Kugat.

Howard Hobson, always eager to bring his Southern Oregon Normal school teams to Klamath Falls, is considering a new series here after he meets the Waldorf team on Tuesday night. Hobson believes Klamath people would enjoy watching the Multnomah club in action.

The Sons, possibly because they were a little too strong last season and upset the University of Oregon in three games, have had trouble in scheduling college basketball teams. The Multnomah club, however, is as near a college team as possible. Some of the outstanding players from both Oregon and Oregon State have found positions on this combination, and their strength in the northwest is indisputable.

Klamath's contest with Medford next Friday night will be the highlight of the basketball season. No other game is so important to the Pelicans as this annual clash with the Tigers.

Klamath slipped over a victory last year, but comparative strengths indicate, there is no assurance of repeating the achievement this season.

If Dwight French, head coach, can reduce his injury and sick list, then perhaps the Klamath youths will win.

Dern Defeats Strangler Lewis

Teams Meet Again Tonight In High School Gymnasium

With both teams breaking fast and the referee calling close for holding the ball too long, the game was speeded to top pitch. Strom of the Bears had three personal fouls called in the first five minutes of play and the Bend coach took him out. Strom did not enter the game again until the third quarter.

Marshall of the Bears scored the first point after five minutes of speedy play on a set up shot. A few seconds later Miller tallied two points for Klamath.

Miller consistently out-jumped the Bend center on the tip off. In the first half, 14 personal fouls were made by players on both sides but in the latter part of the game there was little or no fouling by either side. It was the cleanest game played on the home court this season.

Pastega, returning to the Klamath line for the first time this year, played an outstanding game and made 10 points for the Pelicans. Miller showed his regular brand of good basketball and was high point man with 11 tallies. Wakeman began to click for the first time this season and ran up 10 points on his own account.

Marshall, Crites and Strom started for Bend.

The two teams will meet again tonight at the high school at 8 o'clock.

NEW YORK, Jan. 13 (AP)—One snappy interview between Jack Dempsey and Col. John Reed Kilpatrick seemed to have changed the entire heavyweight situation today and left a strong probability of a title meeting between Primo Carnera and Max Baer in June.

After Col. Kilpatrick, president of Madison Square Garden, has chatted with Dempsey and Ancil Hoffman, Baer's manager, it is indicated that the prospect of a Baer-Carnera bout were not so dismal after all.

Col. Kilpatrick seemed satisfied that an arrangement could be made even though Carnera now is tied up with the Garden and Baer with Dempsey.

It was regarded as extremely improbable, however, that Dempsey would be taken into a Garden partnership in order to "make" the bout. Garden officials regard that as a bad precedent to set.

Carnera already is signed to defend his title against Tommy Longhran at Miami, Feb. 22, and Baer may return to the ring shortly for one winter appearance, perhaps against Steve Hamas. The June battle, of course, would hinge upon the outcome of these two matches.

Locatelli Wins From Kid Berg

NEW YORK, Jan. 13 (AP)—Cletio Locatelli, who was to meet Tony Casoneri in a return bout last night, today had established himself a favorite to beat the former lightweight champion when they finally do get together two weeks from now. Casoneri injured in training, was unable to fill the engagement so Cletio filled in the time by administering a thorough beating to Jackie Kid Berg before a scanty crowd of 6,000 at Madison Square Garden.

Locatelli patted him about the neck at will but failed to land the finishing punch and was booted occasionally for his failure.

Berg weighed 139 pounds, Locatelli 137 1/2.

Bailey Prepared to Resume Play

Grant of Atlanta Defeats Shields

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 13.—(UP)—Bryan Grant of Atlanta, the little "giant killer" of tennis, provided the first big upset of 1934 by eliminating Frances X. Shields of New York, first ranking player in the United States, in a semi-final of the Miami-Biltmore tennis tournament. The score was 4-3, 2-6, 6-1, 6-4.

AL KARASICK, BURKE TRIUMPH

Two Rough Matches Excite Capacity Crowd at Legion Hall

Seven hundred persons lost themselves in mob excitement last night as they witnessed four mad wrestling bouts at the Legion hall. Al Karasick and Rocky Burke, the wildest athletes of the quartet, left the ring victorious.

Karasick, opening his 1934 season in Klamath Falls, defeated Pat Kelly of Boston in the main event. Burke, a newcomer from Victoria, B. C., smashed his way to a one-fall triumph over young Bob Stone of Chicago.

Police Stop Fight

The first match, Stone against Burke, probably exceeded the main event in thrills. The most stirring piece of wrestling occurred after Pete Belcastro, referee, had left the ring. Stone and Burke then tore after each other and were not separated until the blue coats of the Klamath police department appeared.

The Russian Lion defended his claims to the co-championship of Klamath county by taking the last two falls from slugging Pat Kelly. Kelly stepped into the lead in 16 minutes and 33 seconds by downing the Russian with a body slam. The fall came after the athletes had punched, kicked and kneeed desperately for a quarter of an hour.

Boston Crab Wins

The favorite hold of the Lion evened the match in 12 minutes and seven seconds. Karasick trapped Kelly in a Boston crab hold after the wrestlers had duplicated their almost unprecedented roughness.

A body slam gave the Lion the match just as he appeared to be slipping into defeat. Karasick had been dumped to the floor with a slam and then suddenly reversed the situation. He lifted Kelly into the air and heaved him to the floor. The Bostonian was unable to arise from the pressure of Karasick's weight.

Burke took the first and only fall from Stone in 16 minutes and four seconds. The fall came surprisingly, for Stone was holding his own.

Referee Leaves

For 44 minutes the wrestlers struggled through the remainder of the windup bout without a fall, and when the bell rang they were both out of the ring and still wrestling.

Belcastro separated them and brought them back to the arena. The referee then left for the dressing room, and Stone and Burke started the scrap that demanded the presence of the chief, a sergeant and two officers.

Monmouth Normal Beats Willamette

SALEM, Jan. 13.—(P)—Oregon Normal school defeated Willamette university 22 to 24 here last night in a basketball game featured more by rough play than by smart basketball.

The teachers held a lead of 17 to 6 at half-time and were still ahead 22 to 19 midway through the last period. Shortly afterward with a brief rally Willamette cut the lead to five points but could not hold the pace.

Bears, Cards Win.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 13. (P)—First battles in the southern division, Pacific coast conference, basketball race put the University of California Bears and Stanford Indians out in front today.

The Bears stepped out to beat the University of Southern California 36 to 30 in the season's opener at Berkeley last night and will meet the Trojans in a second contest tonight.

Stanford invaded the south and romped over the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins 45 to 26. The two teams will meet again in Los Angeles tonight.

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Freeman And Howard Lead Merrill Card on Thursday

Johnny Freeman, San Francisco welterweight, and Russell Howard of Klamath Falls will introduce the boxing season at the Merrill Community hall next Thursday when they clash in a 10-round main event.

The matches, promoted by Frank Miles of Klamath Falls, will be held under arrangements with the American Legion post of Merrill.

Tut May Referee

King Tut, California welter who at one time or another has challenged Jimmy McLarin for the championship, is expected to be here to referee.

Red Brittan of Klamath Falls has been matched against Harry Aurbach of Vallejo, Calif., in the semi-windup. This preliminary will go the six-round limit, or less. Aurbach comes to Merrill following a victory over Tom Patrick, well-known heavyweight in California.

A special four-round bout will send Charles Martin of Klamath Falls, a middleweight, against Jimmy Best of San Francisco.

Two Enders on Card

Ernie Enders, Klamath Falls, meets Carl Butler of Santa Rosa, Calif., in one of the other preliminaries. These boxers will weigh around 125 pounds.

In the curtain raiser Sunny Enders, Klamath Falls boy fighting at 146, will clash with Walter Gravens, Beaton.

College Team Plays in City Tuesday Night

The first college basketball team to play in Klamath Falls since last season will try its luck against the Waldorf combination Tuesday night at the high school. Arrangements for the contest were completed Friday.

The Waldorf five, composed chiefly of ex-Klamath high players and stars from the county and city leagues of last year, has been undefeated. The team rates as one of the strongest in the county.

Players developed last season by Howard Hobson, Ashland coach, have moved on to conference competition. The stars on the University of Oregon team this year were men who played for the Normal in 1933. Coach Hobson, however, has gathered together a second group of players who make up a combination just as effective as the one of a year ago.

Dick Sheets, Ray Allen, Jack Crawford, Peterson, Sharp, Floetke, Wakeman and Tripletts will share the major work for Waldorf against the Sons.

HUSKIES DOWN IDAHO, 39-29

Washington Holds Lead in Northern Section; Cards, Bears Win.

During the game he tossed in five field goals and one free throw, for 11 points. In the three games between the two teams he has scored 36 points, for a 12-point average per game.
