# F. R. Birthday Party Plans to Be Made Sunday

A meeting of representatives of civic and fraternal organizations throughout the city has been called for Sunday afternoon at the Willard hotel to make plans for President Roosevelt's birthday party, to be held here on January 30 simultaneously with similar events throughout the country.

George Kincaid, general chairman, said Friday he had sent invitations to the organizations asking each to appoint one member to be present at the Sunday meeting. It has not yet been decided where the party will be held, but if the fairgrounds exhibit building is ready for use at that time, the event will probably be there. The exhibit building is now being improved under a CWA project.

Proceeds from the party will go to the Warrenton Springs Foundation for infantile paralysis. Kincaid said that appears probable the local event will be arranged in such a way that there will be no overhead and all receipts can be turned over to the foundation.

On the night of the party, a national broadcast on both radio chains is scheduled from 8:15 to 9:15 p. m. here. The local station will probably re-broadcast the program here, and arrangements will be made for reception at the place of the big party.

# CWA Request For Airport Project Sent

A request that the Klamath airport project labor quota be allocated outside of the county's CWA apportionment of 718 men, was sent from here Friday to Lieut. Basil B. Smith, department of commerce representative in Oregon.

E. A. Thomas, city engineer, and Will Baldwin, CWA manager, made the request. Thomas pointed out in his letter that because of other projects that have precedence, the airport job cannot get under way for some time unless men are put on outside the county's regular CWA quota.

Until the last few days, it was understood that the airport program of the department of commerce, while approved by CWA enterprise world, was unconnected with the regular CWA program in the counties and would not affect the county quotas. A reversal of this policy as regards the local airport was later reported.
