This column could have spared itself a lot of trouble had it discovered—as it finally has done—that there is a man named O. C. Lightner whose hobby is collecting hobbyists. Mr. Lightner also is editor of the magazine, "Hobbies," which is read by collectors of virtually everything.

Collect Your Thoughts! Paul Perussina, a San Francisco police officer, has probably the largest collection of prize-fighters' pictures. P. A. Belanger goes in for dictionaries of postage-stamp size, while George Heinemann prefers tiny Bibles. Russell K. Neville collects caves;
