

Coach Backs Change

Roland Park, Reinhart Student, Subscribes to Anti-Foul Movement in Basketball. Exhibition Game Planned. DeVora, Wolfe Offer Wrestling Contrast. Mikulak-Kitzmiller Team Wins.

Roland Park, young and aggressive coach at Malin high school, has joined those basketball instructors who seek a revision in the rules governing this energetic sport. Park, student and player under Billy Reinhart at the University of Oregon, subscribes to this recent and tumultuous movement to eliminate the epidemic of whistle-blowing.

Reinhart has conceived the excellent idea of disregarding fouls, with the exception of those interfering directly with the scoring play. They would count against the offending player but give no special advantage to the offended team. No free throw would be awarded unless an offensive player were fouled in the act of shooting.

The fouls, however, would be recorded in the score-book and as soon as four fouls were accumulated, the guilty competitor would be removed from the game.

Reinhart and Spec Keene, coach of Willamette university, gave the plan a practical workout. Oregon won, but the contest was acrimonious, even by Keene, as one of the fastest witnesses at McArthur court in Eugene. There was a minimum of official whistle blowing. The players, the fear of penalty removed, moved with more aggressiveness but with no more roughness.

Neither team had any opportunity to win the contest merely on free throws.

Before making any recommendation for the adoption of this plan into permanent rules, coaches of collegiate and interscholastic teams want to see an exhibition. Park, who has watched the idea in action, likes its description. Now he is seeking a chance to put the Reinhart program in play against one of Malin's county opponents.

The rule, apparently, is a progressive one, and the gathering support indicates it eventually will be incorporated into the national regulation.

No two wrestlers ever presented a fiercer contrast than Dr. Nap DeVora of Klamath Falls and Leslie Wolfe of Texas, the two main event athletes at the Legion hall Friday night. Wolfe is a care-free professional who takes his matches as they come, whether in victory or defeat. DeVora, a veteran who dwells particularly upon scientific wrestling, studies his opponents seriously. Whether he wins or loses, he analyzes his faults and works to eliminate ineffective tactics or improve the ones bringing the most results.

DeVora is a gymnast and a strong man. Wolfe is a naturally developed athlete who played football and basketball in a Texas college before he turned to professional wrestling.

Both are leading favorites here and have suffered few defeats. DeVora, perhaps, has the better record of the two. He held Karasick to a draw while Wolfe was defeated. The only defeat for the doctor came in his match against Harry Demaree of Chicago. An injury prevented him from continuing.

Mike Mikulak and Johnny Kitzmiller, Oregon's two contributions to all-American football in the last few years, won their opening basketball game at Corvallis last week. Mikulak, a fullback under Carlson, and Kitzmiller, halfback and captain for Captain John J. McEwan, are leading a group of ex-Webfoot football stars on a tour of the northwest. These players probably will be here early next month. No opponent has definitely been selected, but it probably will be the Waldorf combination.

Chiloquin stands out this week as a possible "B" league basketball champion. The Chiloquin youths have an excellent record for victory. Last year they defeated Bonanza for the title and then won the southern Oregon "B" championship at a tournament sponsored by Ashland Normal and Howard Hobson.

Oregon's victory over favored Oregon State last Saturday brings new complications to the northern division basketball battle. It was surprising, this victory, and lifts Oregon onto a par with Washington. Although Washington heads the league with an undefeated record, the Huskies have not yet played the Webfoots.

Oregon and Oregon State meet at Corvallis Friday night.

WALDORE READY FOR SON'S FIVE

ASHLAND COLLEGIANS WILL CHALLENGE RECORD OF KLAMATH TEAM.

Howard Hobson's Sons of Southern Oregon Normal school at Ashland will challenge the record of the Klamath Falls Waldorf basketball team here Tuesday night. The contest, introducing the first college team of the season, will be played at the Klamath Union high school gymnasium.

The undefeated Waldorf five, led by ex-Pelicans and independent players, were to hold its final practice Monday night. Despite the strong rating accorded the Sons, Waldorf was expected to give an excellent demonstration of the type of basketball played in Klamath county.

Waldorf Men Winners

Waldorf has gone through the season with a squad of eight players. The five regulars have changed off with the three reserves in all contests so often the attacking combination is never weakened when a substitution is made.

Ray Allen, floor captain and center, probably will be in his regular position. Jack Crawford, Dick Sheets, Woodrow Triplett, all former Pelicans, probably will start. Sharp, Peterson, Floetke and Wakeman, players of admirable reputation here, will fill out the combination and bolster the reserve ranks.

The contest will be the highlight of the season thus far in the year.

Sons Boast Stars

The 1933-34 Sons basketball team has, after a slow start, finally arrived and at present is a stronger combination than last year's sensational quintet, that did not lose a series. The team this year is large and fast.

Heading the list is Ward "Flagpole" Howell, giant 6½ footer who is for the second year writing basketball history for the Sons. Howell is one of the best basketball players on the coast and a much improved player over last year. He is stationed at forward this season, with another skyscraper, Harold "Or" Bradway, Eugene boy, taking over the center position.

Bradway is the same size as Howell and is bit inexperienced but has improved rapidly enough in recent games to break in regularly.

Teamed with Howell at forward, is Charlie Patterson, 6 foot 2 inches colored star who is about as finished as any college player when it comes to shooting and floor play. He was with the Sons as reserve last year and before that was a star under Hobson at Benson in Portland. Teamed with these three giants of the court, are two fleet footed sharp shooters of the very best, Len Yandile, veteran Sons star from last year, and ex-Klamath Club ace, and Bill Courtney, for three years Portland's best high school guard from Benson. Both boys are deadly on long shots and shoot left or right handed on the close ones. They are both natural left handers.

The greatest strength of the Sons this year probably is its strong reserves. Five men on the bench practically equal to the starting five are always available. Bud Lindley, 6 feet 3 inch Medford boy and Odd Hughes, brother of the football famous Bernie, also from Medford, are good enough prospects for any college outfit. They only recently joined the squad and are pressing the regulars hard.

Bob Braddock, a six foot speed merchant from Benson, is really a regular on the team but gave way this week to the fast coming Courtney. Braddock has everything—fine shot, fast and clever and very colorful. Another star with the team is Trux Foreman, all state star from Salem. Suffering a broken rib on the recent northern trip, he is just now breaking in again.

He is the best ball handler on the team and was a regular before getting injured. Lyle Reeder, Sons reserve last year, is another fine player but is out of the picture now with a badly sprained ankle. Marvin Pitzer, a new 6 foot 3 inch guard from Seattle, completes the squad.

Except for Reeder, the Sons will beat full strength against Klamath Falls Waldorf team Tuesday. Coach Hobson will bring his entire squad for the game.

DeVora, Wolfe Clash Friday in Main Event

Professional Grid Stars Beat Collegians, 26 To 7.

LOS ANGELES Jan. 15, (AP)—Football enthusiasts in Southern California who set much store by their college teams were pretty well convinced today the professional game as played by Chicago's Bears can hardly be rated lower than tops.

Twenty thousand of them jammed Wrigley field Sunday and saw the world's champions mete out a fancy defeat to an imposing array of all-stars from the Pacific coast 26 to 7, in a wide-open contest.

Red Grange Scores

When the affair was over and the announcer over the public address system asked if the folks would like to see another such game the reply was a hoarse but loud "yeah."

They had seen Harold (Red) Grange, the supposedly old and decrepit Illinois star, run 67 yards for a touchdown. They had seen this game galloping ghost of yesterday's deft time as he took a 14-yard pass from John (Bull) Doehring and run 30 yards to a touchdown.

A forward pass plus a triple-lateral executed smartly for a 42-yard gain was unrehearsed before their eyes. Cliff Battles raced 53 yards to a touchdown from behind a six-man mass of interference.

Team Coming Back

Single and double spread formations which opened up the defense wider than all out-of-doors were staged for the fans, and they liked it so well that the Bears probably will be back for a second showing against a re-informed all-star combination in a couple of weeks.

Grange put on his 67-yard run on the third time the Bears got their hands on the ball after the opening kickoff. He darted through a wide hole over the weak side, reversed his field, shooed his hips at Homer Griffith, playing safety, and dashed for the goal.

Before the first period was over Grange flashed again. He took Doehring's pass over his left shoulder on the dead run and kept going for another touchdown. Jack Manders faked a place kick for the extra point and then tossed a pass to Bill Hewitt, brilliant end, for the tally.

Saunders Goes Over

The All-Stars, with Russ Saunders, former University of Southern California star quarterback, doing most of the carrying, marched from their 25-yard line to their lone touchdown in the second period. Saunders ran left end from the five-yard line to score, and Jim Musick kicked goal.

The Bears came back promptly, massing in front of Battles to escort him on his 53 yard run for their third touchdown in the first half. Battles tossed a 16-yard pass to Gene Romani for the other score in the fourth period a play that was good for 55 yards.

Without question the most brilliant handling of a football seen in these parts in years took place in the second period, when Manders threw a ten-yard pass to Hewitt. The sturdy end was in full stride as he caught the ball.

Jack Chevigny

Appointed Coach at Texas School

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 15, (UP)—Jack Chevigny, former Notre Dame half-back Saturday was appointed head football coach at the University of Texas.

He succeeded Coach Clyde Littlefield, who resigned recently after a series of Longhorn defeats provoked alumni criticism. Littlefield remained here as track and field coach.

The new Texas mentor was regular right half-back during the seasons of 1927 and 1928.

Chevigny coached the Saint Edwards university team, champions of the Texas conference last year. His successful Saint Edwards team was developed in one year.

Willamette Wins Basketball Game From Columbia

SALEM, Jan. 15, (AP)—Willamette University won its first basketball game of the season here Saturday night, coming from behind in the closing minutes of play to defeat Columbia University of Portland 20 to 17.

The Irish were leading 18 to 8 at half time but Willamette started a second period rally which was concluded only when Eren Kiostra, lanky Willamette center, sank a follow-up shot after a free throw to put the Bearcats ahead with three minutes to play.

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Playing Managers Make Return to Major Clubs

CHICAGO, Jan. 15, (UP)—Playing managers returned to a majority in the major leagues with the signing of Bob O'Farrell to pilot the Cincinnati Reds in 1934 and 1935.

Only three National league teams will be managed from the bench next season. The American league becomes evenly divided between playing and bench managers.

When the 16 teams go south and west for spring training next month playing managers will be in the majority for the first time in several years. Last season there were but two player-managers in each league.

Late last season and during the winter four American and three National league clubs named managers. All three of richest men, Bob Swenson, who is players replacing non-playing pilots. Of the four junior circuit 1933 deposed managers, all of whom were bench managers, two were replaced by players.

Oregon Basketball Team Smashes O. S. C., 30 to 26

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 15, (UP)—University of Oregon basketball team snapped a season-long Oregon State college jinx by winning a conference game from the Beavers Saturday 30 to 26.

Four times last year, when the Beavers won the Pacific coast championship, the Webfoots went down to defeat at hands of their rivals from Corvallis, but they turned the table tonight by winning their first meeting of the 1934 season.

Oregon 2nd Place

Willie Jones was the big noise for Billy Reinhart's aggregation. He scored six field goals and four gift shots for a total of 16 points.

Oregon jumped into the lead at the start and held a 16 to 7 edge at halftime.

The Beavers came back with a rush in the second half, but couldn't quite muster the tying points. The closest they came was 27 to 25.

Oregon, the surprising dark horse of the conference race, went into second place as result of its win.

BERKELEY, Cal., Jan. 15, (UP)—The University of Southern California Trojans defeated University of California, 42 to 19, in their conference basketball game here Saturday night before 7,500 fans.

MOSCOW, Ida., Jan. 15, (UP)—University of Washington hung up its fourth straight victory of the season Saturday by defeating the Idaho Vandals, 34 to 30. The half-time score was Washington 22, Idaho 10.

The Tigers, like the Pelicans, are undefeated in interscholastic play, and one or the other will be removed from the charmed circle Friday.
