

COUNCIL VIEWS LICENSES FOR FOOD HANDLERS

Requirement of a physical examination for all persons handling food in commercial establishments here was discussed by the city council at Monday night's meeting, and the city fathers will meet as a committee on the whole later in the week to make a final decision on this matter.

A. Baile, president of the Culinary Alliance here, addressed the council on the desirability of an adequate physical examination for those handling food in restaurants, such as cooks and waiters. Extension of the plan to all persons handling food, such as grocery clerks, was suggested by Councilman Thomas.

Fee Discussed
Baile said that a fee of \$2 for the examination would probably be adequate, but Dr. C. H. Hartman, dairy and food inspector, said he doubted if that would pay for the test. Dr. A. A. Soule, city health officer, said the plan in his mind was to send blood samples to Portland for test, where it could probably be done for the \$2 fee. The street committee reported that the proposed sidewalk on Main near the Southern Pacific tracks is impractical, particularly in view of the possibility of an underground crossing there.

Councilman Hosking of the fire and water committee said that he would approve painting the fire station if it can be done under CWA. E. A. Thomas said he believed such a project would qualify under the government works program.

Van Camp to Leave
Councilman Van Camp was granted a leave of absence. He said he expects to undergo an operation.

A communication was received from the Elgon Brokerage company, asking for a refund of beer license money paid. The council denied the request.

The Acme Motor company was given permission to hang a cloth sign across South Sixth street. Milk producers' licenses were granted to A. Pincell, J. A. Hushong, Raymond Dairy, G. A. Hushong, and Electric shop was granted a license on filing of application with proper bond. Barber shops and restaurants that applied last week for licenses were granted permits upon favorable report of the proper officials and committees.

Other license applications were held up for action by committees or until the council decides what it will do about a license revision plan.

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Airport Project Of Chiloquin Is Approved Monday

Notice of approval of Chiloquin's airport project was received Monday morning by Mayor Will Baldwin of the CWA. Chiloquin asked for \$5000 to be spent in clearing and leveling a field which the city is acquiring for airport purposes. The notice from Portland did not contain an authorization as to when to start the work.

Klamath's airport program is expected to get under way Tuesday. More than \$10,000 is to be spent here, largely on runway improvement.

Both projects received the approval of the United States department of commerce, through Lieut. Basil B. Smith of Portland.

Federal Land Bank Selects Local Auditor

Leland H. Haines, certified public accountant of this city, received notice Monday of his appointment to the position of federal land bank examiner for the Pacific northwest.

Haines, who has been closely identified with the audit of a number of public books, will make his new headquarters in Berkeley, Calif., and his territory will include Los Angeles, the bay district, Salt Lake City, Spokane, Portland and Seattle.

Enumerators Will Make Survey Here

Four enumerators are to be named in Klamath county to conduct a business census, planned by the federal government through CWA.

Dan P. Dacey of Bend is in

charge of the census in nine counties, including Deschutes, Crook, Jefferson, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Lake and Klamath counties. The headquarters will be in Bend.

The national re-employment service will employ the enumerators. All establishments engaged in retailing, wholesaling, amusement establishments and hotels, are included in the survey. To facilitate the work, a questionnaire with eight questions has been made up.

Dacey urged business men to cooperate with the enumerators in the survey.

FRENCH GOVERNOR DIES IN ACCIDENT

PARIS, Jan. 16. (AP)—Governor General Pasquier of French Indo-China and nine others were killed last night in a crash of the tri-motored monoplane Emerald, returning to Paris from Saigon, in the Orient, from her maiden flight to the far east.

The Emerald, flagship of the France-Orient air mail line, crashed at Corbigny, in the department of Nievre, about 25 miles southeast of Paris.

Tanks Explode
The super-plane's fuel tanks exploded as it struck the earth, and burst into flames. Most of the dead were charred beyond recognition. They were trapped inside the great cabin of the air liner.

The wreck today was the second in which the Emerald was involved on the return flight from French Indo-China. She crashed on a forced landing at Guadard, Beluchistan, a week ago Sunday, but Pasquier and the others on board were only badly shaken up then.

The air liner left Saigon for Paris on Thursday, January 4, seeking to set a record for the flight linking France with her far eastern colonial possessions. The ship was due to arrive here a week ago today.

Reception Expected
The Emerald carried Pilot Launay, a mechanic and a radio operator, Pasquier and six other passengers.

The crash came at 7:45 p. m. and cast gloom over the reception in Paris for the French army fliers who recently completed a 16,000 mile aerial cruise over French possessions in north Africa.

Hundreds of thousands of citizens massed along the Paris boulevards to watch them fly over the capital in formation.

Governor General Pasquier was 67 years old. He gained fame in Indo-China by saving the country's rice industry during 1930-33 by using drastic reforms comparable to President Roosevelt's farm recovery program.

Appraisals for Home Loan Being Rushed Through

An average of 25 or 30 appraisals for home loan applications are coming into the district office daily, according to Edward B. Ashurst, district manager.

A total of 38 appraisals has been received in less than a week, Ashurst stated, since his conference with J. P. Lipscomb, state manager. Lipscomb has ordered this office to rush the appraisals through and to close all loans as early as possible.

Sam Mothershead, district appraiser, is sending out recommendations for orders of appraisal, at the rate of 20 per day from the local office at the present time, Ashurst asserted, within the next two weeks, every loan in Lake county will be closed.

More than 30 local loans, ranging from \$1500 to \$5000 will probably be closed within the next week or 10 days, Ashurst announced.

Appraisals for other counties in this district have been coming in at the rate of 25 a day in addition to those for Klamath county, the manager stated.

Precinct Boards To Be Appointed

Judges and clerks for voting precincts of Klamath county are expected to be selected this week, according to announcement Monday of Mae K. Short, county clerk.

Two boards, each consisting of two judges and three clerks are expected to be named in each of the 58 county precincts. The appointments will be for a two-year term.

Anyone wishing an appointment on their precinct board is requested to mail an application to the county clerk's office immediately. The appointments are expected to be made and approved by the county court at its regular meeting Thursday, according to Mrs. Short.

K. D. Company Moves Office

After occupying a downtown office for the past two years, the Klamath Development company has moved back to the old K. D. building at 1405 Main street.

The K. D. company occupied the original building for 27 years before moving down town. "We did pretty well in that

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old building for those 27 years," declared R. H. Hesse, local manager for the Klamath Development company, "and I guess that we can do the same thing for a while longer."

Rear Admiral of Navy Killed in Accident Monday

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16. (AP) Rear Admiral James A. Raby, commandant of the Charleston naval yard and also commandant of the 6th, 7th and 8th naval districts, was killed in an automobile accident near Savannah, Ga., yesterday afternoon, the navy was informed tonight.

Admiral Raby, whose home address is 101 Pine street, San Francisco, was under orders to transfer soon to the command of the 12th naval district in California.

The accident occurred on the Coastal highway 20 miles south of Savannah, the navy was informed by his aide, Lieut. E. P. Abernathy.

Admiral Raby was awarded the navy cross for services in the World war. He was a veteran navy aviator and formerly commanded the naval air station at Pensacola, Fla.

Mayor Returns From Portland

The state liquor commission, which is reported to have set February 10 as the date when liquor stores would be set up in the state, is giving plenty of time for a decision on the constitutionality of the Knox bill, according to Mayor W. P. Mahoney.

Back from a business trip to Portland, Mahoney said it is generally believed the supreme court will have a decision on the Knox bill around February 1, and certainly by February 10. Mahoney said he does not believe the liquor commission would go ahead with establishment of liquor stores until it is certain of the outcome of the Knox bill litigation.
