MILK DEALERS GET EXTENSION FOR LICENSES

PORTLAND, Jan. 16. (AP)—An additional week in which to obtain permits for milk resale has been granted hotels, restaurants and stores. It was announced today by the state milk control board. Midnight last night had been originally set as the time limit for getting such licenses. All milk dealers in Oregon must be licensed, according to word from E. G. Harlan, chairman of the Oregon milk control board.

"To make it easier for the milk dealers throughout the state," says Mr. Harlan, "temporary arrangements have been made for local chambers of commerce, and city officials to handle the application forms which must be in our office in time for the licenses to be issued before the fifteenth of January or the dealer will not be permitted to handle milk."

Application forms in Klamath Falls may be procured at the chamber of commerce, and dealers should make immediate arrangements to get a license, fill it out correctly, and mail it to the office of the Oregon Milk Control Board, 317 Mayer Building, Portland, Oregon.

Following is a brief explanation of the law: A "milk dealer" is defined as "any person who purchases or handles milk within the state for sale in this state, or who sells milk within the state, except when consumed on the premises where sold." A producer who delivers milk only to a milk dealer shall not be deemed a milk dealer.

Application for a license to operate as a milk dealer shall be made within 30 days after the law is in effect. The law went into effect December 15, 1933; so applications should be made at once. All applicants for licenses shall pay the following license fees: "All stores shall pay an annual license fee of \$1.00. (Each separate place of business at which milk is sold by all stores shall be deemed a separate store for which a license must be obtained and a license fee paid.)"

"All other milk dealers shall pay a license fee determined as follows: 1/4 of 1c on each pound of butterfat contained in milk received and delivered by license, commencing with the effective date of this act."

COURT REVERSES KLAMATH VERDICT

The Oregon supreme court Tuesday reversed the lower court in the case of Ethel Gray against J. A. Mitchell and Spicy E. Mitchell in the case to recover on a promissory note following recovery of property on mortgage by plaintiff. The suit was appealed from Klamath county.

Ethel Gray sought recovery of a note of \$500 alleged remaining due on real property after she had taken possession of property because of delinquent payments on the mortgage by the defendants. The opinion by Justice Harry Belt, reversing Judge W. H. Duncan, stated:

"It would be manifestly unjust for plaintiff to rescind the contract by recovering possession of the property under the forfeiture

clause, retain the instalments paid by the vendee, and recover the balance due on the purchase price."

The original trial of the case was completed in the Klamath county circuit court last April 29. W. C. Van Emon represented the Mitchell interests and A. W. Schupp represented Ethel Gray.

Sample Appointed Purchasing Agent

George Sample, formerly in the office of the Pelican Bay Lumber company, has been appointed civil works purchasing agent for Klamath and Lake counties, according to word received by Fred Peterson, who has been handling the purchasing work on a "gratis" basis.

Sample some time ago applied for the job of CWA auditor, and was recommended by the local committee. Then he was talked

for the managership, which went to Will Baldwin. His appointment came Tuesday on Peterson's recommendation.

Klamath, Lake Service May Be Centered Here

Centering of re-employment service activities in Klamath Falls for both Klamath and Lake counties, is in prospect, according to information printed in the Lake County Tribune. The work would be under the direction of Nelson Reed of this city, manager of the local re-employment office.

The Lakeview paper says that an effort is being made there to retain the office records at that place in order to facilitate the Lake county civil works program. No information was available at the local office about the possibility.
