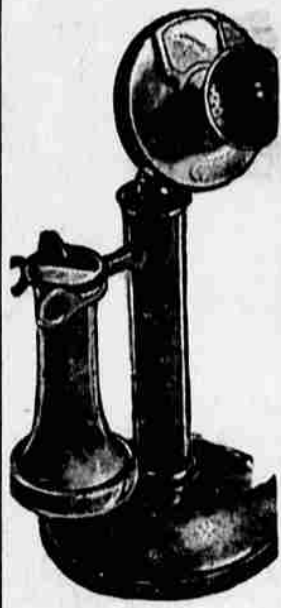

British Cabinet Will Safeguard Against America

LONDON, Jan. 16. (AP)—The cabinet at tomorrow's regular session will consider drastic steps to safeguard the British empire from the effects of President Roosevelt's devaluated 60-cent dollar. It was learned today.

The United Press was informed that British authorities, highly perturbed at the Roosevelt dollar program, will seek to prevent the empire's trade from being hard hit by possible "dumping" of American goods on world markets, due to the cheap dollar.

The English will seek close cooperation of all other units within the British empire in combatting the effects of the dropping dollar on Britain's already depreciating trade.

The United Press was informed by persons close to the Bank of England that the British reaction generally was gloomy, foreseeing sweeping intensification of the United States' foreign trade competition.

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National, Local Markets

CUBE BUTTER RISES SHOW STEADY TREND

PORTLAND, Jan. 16 (AP)—Advances in the cube butter market on the produce exchange during the last session, first alone being excepted, suggested gradual improvement in the demand here as well as diminished supplies.

While there has recently been quite a fair increase in churning by centralizers, there has been an even greater volume lost in the arrivals from other points.

Egg Market Steady

Indicating that the situation was not as keen as some would suggest was the fact that butterfat values did not advance.

Market on eggs was steady aside from continued underbidding reported by outside interests. Demand for eggs was increasing rapidly. Some so-called extras were reported sold down to 16¢ with the general market 18¢.

Chicken trade was soft in spots here but in general was little changed as to price. Demand was slowest for the light weights which were arriving in increasing abundance.

Turkeys in Demand

There was a good shipping demand again showing for turkeys but available supply in Oregon was reported as practically nominal.

Strength was permeating the entire country killed meat trade. Hogs, lambs, veal and beef alike were showing a keener call.

Recent advance of \$2 net to growers for onions at country points has put a complete stop on the receipt of carload orders here. Leading operators report an entire lack of business. Buyers were securing their needs elsewhere, and for less.

Stronger tone was showing in the market for potatoes at Pacific northwest sources and especially at Yakima. For awhile the interest was chiefly in 2s but new inquiries for 1s were forcing higher prices. In the Deschutes prices were also held firmer. No change here.

European Markets Bid for Prunes

PORTLAND, Jan. 16 (AP)—Some betterment in Oregon prune prices has been observed in the past few days as European and domestic interests continue bidding for the remaining supplies of 1933 Oregon. It is generally estimated that not more than 2,000,000 pounds of all sizes remains in all hands.
