

AIRWAY ROUTE FOR KLAMATH GIVEN FAVOR

PORTLAND, Jan. 17, (U.P.)—Oregon airplane pilots were "given a break" in a plan outlined here late today by Marshall C. Hopkin, regional supervisor for the CWA in charge of airports for nine western states.

Opening of Oregon's scenic, recreational and hunting spots to the airplane user and operator by placing airports in the areas, and another north-south airway from The Dalles to Klamath Falls are included in phases of the plan.

Projects Commended
The airport system of the state would be increased to 50 major fields and landing strips, according to Hopkin, who was here looking over the airport development thus far in the state.

Most of the detail consists of data compiled by W. W. Hardinger, Seattle engineer, who spent six months investigating the company for the commission.

His estimate of the reproductive cost of the telephone company in Oregon was \$31,544,532 as against the company's estimate of \$33,496,724.

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Mdivanis Face Grand Theft in Court Tuesday

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 17, (U.P.)—Princes David and Serge Mdivanis, whose martial adventures made them famous, heard their business adventures unfolded yesterday when they went to trial charged with grand theft.

It was a new experience for the "Marrying Georgians," since their previous legal difficulties have consisted mainly of divorce and separate maintenance suits.

Despite efforts of the brothers to obtain an all-woman jury, the panel finally selected was composed of 10 middle-aged women and two men, with two more men as alternates.

Thereupon testimony was started by the state in its effort to prove charges that the titled Russians took \$24,000 belonging to the Pacific Shore Oil company, now in receivership.

Rolph Considers Nudists Invitation

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 17, (U.P.)—The tumultuous political career of "Sunny Jim" Rolph, governor of California, neared another apex tonight as he laid plans to carry his campaign for re-election even into a nudist colony.

In the midst of his scurrying hither and thither by airplane, automobile and train, the governor signed pardons and communications, denied others, appointed a chiropractor to the state osteopathic board and cocked a weather eye on a trainload of possible opponents.

He revealed that a nudist colony at Elnore, in Riverside county, had invited him to visit there on his statewide campaign trip next spring.

Undaunted by the fact that he recently survived an attack of pneumonia by a hair-breadth, the governor indicated he might accept.

KNOX COMMISSION INTERVIEWS BERRY

W. E. Berry, local business man mentioned as a possible recipient of a position as district supervisor with the state liquor commission, returned Wednesday from Portland, to where he was called for an interview with the commission.

No announcement as to appointments by the commission have yet been made.

It is understood there will be a representative of the commission here within a few days to interview applicants for the position of local manager. Information received here indicates the salary of the local manager will be in the neighborhood of \$150 a month.

Latest information received here is that there will be one store in Klamath Falls, with a manager and about three assistants.

Touhy Gangsters Enter Trial for Kidnaping Factor

CHICAGO, Jan. 17, (U.P.)—Roger (The Terrible) Touhy and three gang followers went on trial today in a half-filled courtroom on charges of kidnaping John (Jake the Barber) Factor.

The experience of playing to an unfilled house was a new one to the gangsters. Judge Michael Feinberg saw to it that there was no jostling crowd by ruling that no one could be admitted unless he had business in the courtroom.

The gangsters pleaded not guilty as their trial opened on the same floor of the Criminal Courts building where the sensational Wynekoop trial is in progress.

At the end of the first session two jurors had been accepted tentatively. They were John C. Banks and Herbert Brownell. Both said they had no scruples against inflicting a death penalty.

SNOWMAN'S HILL CARNIVAL SET

MOUNT SHASTA, Calif.—In spite of the fact that almost everywhere in California the past winter has been like spring, there is plenty of snow at Snowman Hill, Mount Shasta, where the third annual professional ski jump will be held on next Sunday, January 21, starting at 2:00 o'clock.

Lars Haugen, seven times national champion, arrived in Mount Shasta last Sunday and after inspecting the hill announced that conditions were extremely favorable for good jumps and stated that he expected to see jumps of more than 200 feet made at Sunday's show. The hill has been reconstructed by the Mount Shasta Snowmen, and

is believed by many to be one of the most spectacular in the nation. Since the Shasta-Lassen highway has been taken into the state highway system, parking conditions have been improved and there will be no chance for a tie up. Besides the professional jumps there will be amateur jumps in all classes.

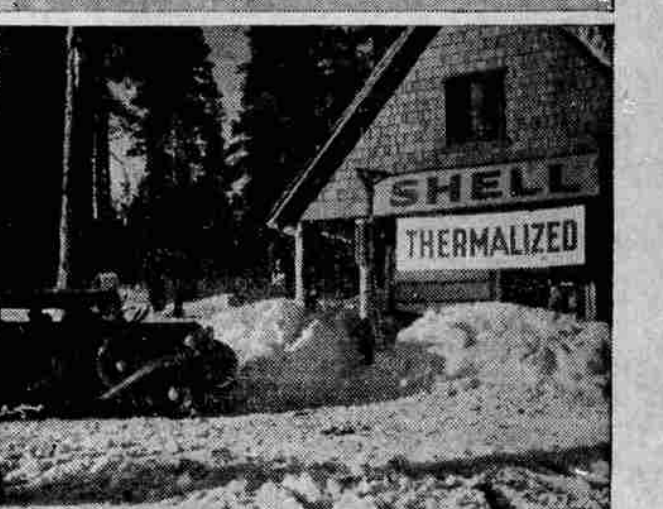
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
