Battery of Eyes Is Centered on Death Case Defendant



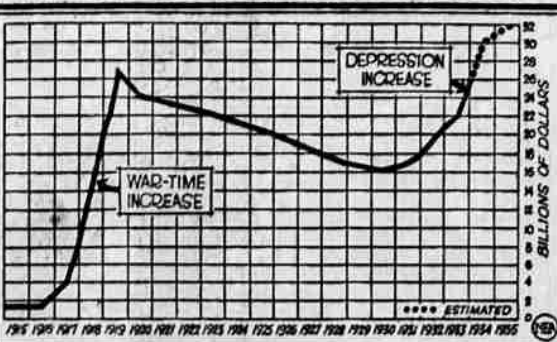

Trend of U. S. National Debt



Spending on the vast scale planned by President Roosevelt for 1934-35 will raise the national debt in 1935 to an all-time high of approximately \$22 billion, as shown by this chart, giving the course of the debt since 1913. An unprecedented peak was reached on Aug. 31, 1919, few months after close of the World War. When the debt was \$26,594,000,000. Then it fell, until on June 30, 1930, it had dropped to \$16,185,000,000. Then came the new climb, in which it has soared far past the high mark of the immediate post-war period. From 1908 to 1915, it was almost stationary, around the one billion mark.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (AP)—President Roosevelt was urged today by Representative Pierce of Oregon and Knute Hill of Washington to sanction the construction of locks in the Bonneville dam, large enough to transport ocean-going carriers.

Commission Sets Liquor Salaries for All Employees

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 17. (AP)—Liquor commission salaries will range from \$175 monthly upward, it was indicated today.

Members of the commission serve without pay except for per diem allowances.

George Sammis, liquor control administrator, will receive \$4,800 annually. His three deputies will get \$250 monthly.

Managers of liquor dispensaries will probably receive \$200 a month and their assistants \$175.
