EGG DEALERS UNDERSELLING FEDERAL PRICE

PORTLAND, Jan. 18 (AP)—While the federal law in regard to the leasing of products at less than cost was reported in effect, sales of eggs were being openly made 1 to 2c below retail prices below the reported wholesale costs. The quotation on fresh extras was generally placed 13c dozen here but some retailers were actually selling such supplies at 17c or even a fraction less.

Values Shaded
Reports in the trade suggested that wholesalers were shading values 1 to 2c dozen with sales of extra down to 13c but this was generally denied by those reported as participating in the price cutting holiday.

Consumption of eggs was still expanding and was taking care of fresh arrivals.

Trading in the butter market was good here and at recently advanced prices. Consumption continued to gain with the chief call for the standards and prime first offerings. Butterfat was held firm.

Cheese Price Up
Further gain in strength was suggested by another fractional boost in the price for cheese on the produce exchange here, which has been one of the chief beef factors in the market for an extended period.

Considerable strength was showing in the market for country killed meats and in spots higher prices were reported. Hogs were generally up to 8c for top blockers with heavy sorts up to 9c lb.

Local demand for turkeys was reported as rather limited. The demand was chiefly for large birds. Buying price was as high as 18 1/2c lb.

Loss of 1c was forced here in the buying price on light and medium weight hens despite the fact that California buying prices have recently shown an advance in these lines.
