### TIGERS SEEK VICTORY HERE

#### Klamath, Chiloquin Play Medford Friday and Saturday.

Avenging Tigers of Medford high school move the basketball battleground of southern Oregon into Klamath county this weekend.

The disturbing memory of a two-point loss to Dwight French's Klamath Pelicans here last year has aroused the Tigers, defending champions of their own district. Medford expects quite definitely to send the Pelicans to their first intercollegiate defeat of the 1934 campaign at the high school tonight.

#### Play At Chiloquin.

Hostilities will be transferred to Chiloquin Saturday night. Here again the Tigers recall an upset from the old season, and hope earnestly to brush aside this Klamath county "B" team that scored such a surprising victory twelve months ago.

The Pelicans were up to reasonable strength for tonight's contest. Howard Scroggin, a leading attacker and a strong defender, will be out of the lineup. Klamath trimmed Bend in a two-game series last week without Scroggin and French, head coach, optimistically considers the success can be duplicated.

#### Tigers At Peak.

Darwin Burgher, Medford coach, will send his full strength against Klamath tonight. The reserve team will start the game against Chiloquin but will remain in the battle only as long as it maintains a lead.

Klamath's combination has been shuffled considerably since Medford was here a year ago. Some of the old stars have been graduated, but French has mustered a new team that will carry the Pelicans into their third successive state tournament competition.

Darrell Miller, tall and an accurate shot, has succeeded Ray Allen at center, and will start tonight. Ed Wakeman, a man who moved against the Tigers last season, will not start tonight and in his place will be Wayne Perry, forward. This will be Perry's final interscholastic contest, and he hopes, his best.

#### Pastega Back.

Johnny Pastega, forward, will get into the fight. Pastega, just recently recovering from a football injury, aided the Pelicans in defeating Bend last week. He, too, played against Medford in 1933.

Big Nello Gioanini, football and basketball ace, will start with Carl Egelhoff in the guard positions. Gioanini has had experience against the Tiger squads but this will be the first test for Egelhoff, a transfer from Benson Tech at Portland.

The Medford-Klamath game will be preceded by a preliminary between the Klamath Wildcats and the Butte Valley Bulldogs from Dorris. The main game will get underway at 8:00 o'clock.

### POPULAR STARS MEET TONIGHT

#### Dr. DeVora Will Oppose Les Wolfe in Main Event Match.

Athletes of the grunt, groan and grimace—the wrestlers—take up the battle once more tonight at Legion hall.

Temporary elimination, at least, for one of two popular professionals will come in the main event, when Dr. Nap DeVora of Klamath Falls defends what claims he has offered to the county supremacy. The undefeated doctor will oppose an aggressive man from the Southwest, Leslie Wolfe of Texas, in the one-hour top match.

Wolfe, back in Klamath Falls Thursday after a three-weeks' trip into Texas, expects to resume his activities here where he dropped them last December. The young man with the effective leg scissors has had four matches since he left, and each one brought him a victory.

DeVora, however, has progressed far since Wolfe last saw him in action. The muscular Frenchman outpointed Al Karasick, the Lion of Portland, and held him to a draw. A week later he defeated rugged Billy Burns of Denver.

No other Klamath wrestler has enjoyed the popularity of Wolfe and DeVora, and the Legion hall will be definitely divided when the two appear tonight.

Bob Myers, airplane specialist from Tillamook, will introduce the card at 9:30 o'clock. After he moves against young Leo Jensen of Seattle in the one-hour preliminary. Mack Lillard, promoter, looks upon this match with as much favor as the main event. Jensen has developed the Sonnenberg tackle to a high degree. ### LEVINSKY MAY MEET CARNERA

#### Garden Officials Drop Negotiations With Max Baer.

NEW YORK, Jan. 19. (AP)—If Madison Square Garden promotes a heavyweight championship bout in June, the chances are just about ten to one the challenger won't be Max Baer. But it might be King Levinsky.

Finding it impossible to tie Baer up to a contract to fight for the Garden in the event he won the championship, Col. John R. Kilpatrick, president of the big arena, and his matchmaker, Jimmy Johnston, have dropped all negotiations with Baer, his manager, Auel Hoffman, and promoter Jack Dempsey, and turned to Levinsky instead.

#### Building Up King.

In their first move to build the talkative ex-fish peddler into the status of a title contender, the Garden's directors have booked him for two matches, one against Charley Massera, young Pittsburger, the other against Walter Nussel, blonde puncher from Germany, on February 9 and March 2, respectively.

If the Kingfish can get by those two hurdles, he may be asked to agree to one more tune-up before getting a shot at Primo Carnera in June, always assuming the mammoth Italian succeeds in beating Tommy Loughran in their 15-round bout in Miami February 22.

Coincidence may have a good bit to do with this big shift in plans. If Levinsky, his alter-manager, Lena, and a delegation from the Chicago Stadium hadn't been in town in an effort to arrange a Levinsky-Max Schmeling battle, the Garden might never even have thought of the Kingfish.

Since he was in town, and especially since he got nowhere whatever in a conversation with Joe Jacobs, Schmeling's manager, it was only natural for the King to drop around at the Garden. One thing led to another and he soon found himself slated for two matches and with a possible title bout in sight.

There was no particular stress laid on the fact that Carnera already has whipped Levinsky once. That was in November, 1931, Primo earning a ten-round decision at Chicago. The King has improved since then, of course, but so has Carnera.
