

COUNTY SETS ASIDE LAND FOR AIRPORTS

Klamath county has agreed to set aside 160 acres of land and to negotiate for another 320 for airport purposes at Crescent, as another step in the development of intermediate airports for an aviation line east of the Cascade mountains.

The intermediate port at Crescent will be built by the government as a CWA project. It is expected. The additional 320 acres not already owned by the county, can probably be acquired without involving cash, through a land exchange plan, it was believed.

The U. S. department of commerce, now indicating a keen interest in the east-side airway, is attempting to obtain land on the Klamath reservation at Sand Creek for the establishment of another intermediate field.

Approval has been granted for airport development at Chiloquin, which fits into the larger program. Bend is now building its port, and negotiations have been completed for a field at Madras. The Maupin field plan is not yet completed.

One or two ports south of here, between Shasta City and Klamath Falls, are also believed needed.

Secretary Earl Reynolds of the chamber of commerce, has been working on the airport program, with help from other cities which will be served by the route.

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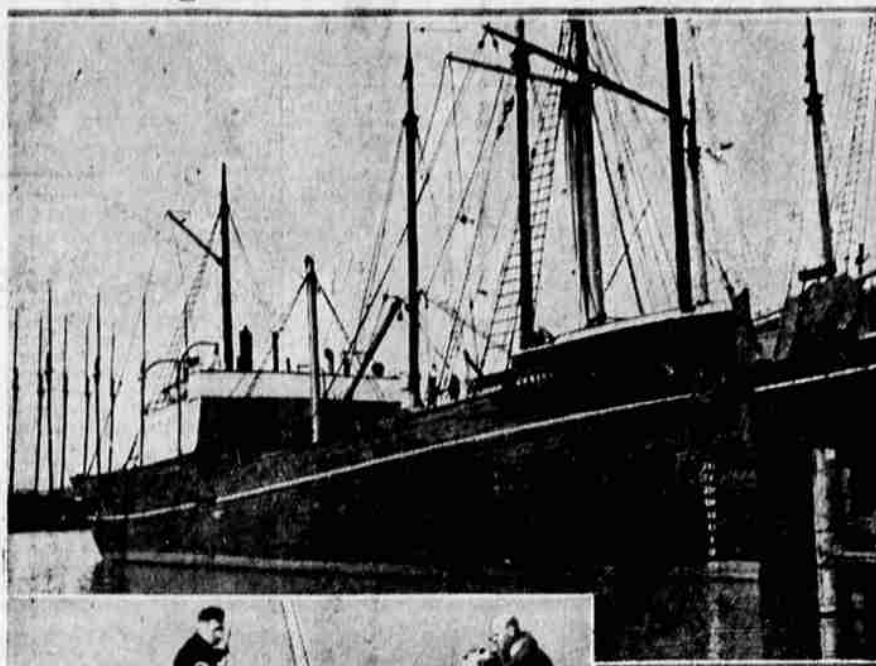

French Import Tax On Fruit Reduced

PARIS, Jan. 19. (U.P.)—French importers of American fruit said they had received notification today that the government agreed to reduce the import license taxes on United States apples and pears.

The importers said the decision should greatly benefit fruit growers in the United States, as it now will be possible to import the entire quota of 20,000 tons of apples and pears which France granted the United States last month, in exchange for an increase in the French wine import quota to America.

Local Contractor Gets California Construction Job

F. R. Hiatt, Klamath Falls contractor, has taken a contract to construct two and a half miles of water ditch on the Ellyptrohm placer mine on Trinity river, Humboldt county, Calif. It was announced Thursday.

Hiatt has just returned from an inspection of the property and is enthusiastic over values and general favorable working conditions, he asserted. The contractor will construct both dams and ditches on the Ellyptrohm, at a total cost of \$5,000.

These rich placers have only recently been opened to the mining world, according to Hiatt, and are adjacent to exceptionally rich yardage, which according to government statistics, has yielded over \$200,000,000 in gold.

Hiatt plans to start work on his contract within a few days, in order that active operations may be carried on during the present mining season.
