PASTOR ANNOUNCES SUNDAY SERVICES

"Is Evolution God's Way?" or "Is Science and Christianity Incompatible and in Endless Conflict?" is the subject announced for Sunday evening by Rev. John B. Coan, pastor of the First Methodist church. This is the third of a series of evening addresses on several of the themes which are creating large controversy among certain schools of religious folk.

In speaking of his interest in both scientific subjects and in theology, Mr. Coan stated that he had qualified equally for a science degree and the arts and divinity degrees, both of which he holds. INTERESTING FACTS TOLD IN LETTER

Interesting information about the life of Mrs. Clara Anderson, who died here a few days ago, is contained in a letter received by The Herald and News from John B. Griffin of Medford. It follows:

"The death of Mrs. Anderson deserves more than a passing notice, as her father, James W. Collins was one of the very first settlers in Rogue River valley, having come here in 1852. He took up a Donation Claim about half way between where the towns of Jacksonville and Phoenix

are located, and built the first house that was built in the valley out of rustic or dressed lumber. It used to be called the half-way house, and was used for over 70 years before being torn down. It is now known as the Gordon Ranch and no doubt some of that lumber can be found there now.

Mr. Collins sold out later and bought the old Brotherton place in Sams Valley, where he lived for many years, and then moved to Phoenix, where he spent the balance of his life. Clara Collins Anderson was born at the ranch in Sams Valley in 1857, and therefore was one of the oldest native daughters in Jackson county. She was married to Quinton Anderson in 1874, a native son of this county and afterwards, moved to Klamath county and settled on a homestead near Bly, and engaged in the stock business for many years, and finally came back to spend their remaining days in the Rogue River valley, where Mr. Anderson died several years ago.

When they first settled in Sprague River valley, it was rather an isolated place, and neighbors were few and far between, and had to depend on each other for help in cases of sickness or deaths, etc. Mrs. Anderson was one who was always ready to go and was a mother to the young people of that locality, and many cowboys who are now past middle age will hold her in loving remembrance as long as they live, and their hearts will be sad when they learn of the death of Ma Anderson who was a mother to them in Early Days.
