National, Local Markets

BUTTER PRICE AT PORTLAND LEADING COAST

PORTLAND, Jan. 20 (AP)—Portland and Seattle butter prices were the highest along the Pacific slope at the weekend.

Recent artificial boosts in values here have been held by main force on the produce exchange while in California prices have been easier and in spots lower.

Supply Increased
Indicating that the local markets were quoting butter higher than other points was the increased supply of stock from outside points, much of which normally moves to San Francisco and Los Angeles.

There was no change in local cut or print prices for the weekend.

The trade here was somewhat amused over recent resolutions taking the cities to task for consumption of oleomargarine while a former survey shows that population considered, the country consumed more oleo than the city.

Potatoes Stored
Despite the holding of printed prices to 13c for extra eggs, much of the sale of that grade was being made down to 16-17c dozen locally with retailers frequently selling at cost.

There was a change in the price on chickens for the weekend with some betterment recently shown in the California list on lights and mediums. Prices here were recently lower. While there continued a good shipping call for dressed turkeys, local trade was a trifle slow. Shipping demand continued chiefly for large toms. Country was offering quite freely considering the cleanup.

Trading in the potato market was being forced through continued movement into storage and starvation of the markets. The trade fears that the movement into consuming channels will be delayed too long.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Jan. 20, (AP)—Stocks waded through a large amount of profit taking in today's brief session and emerged with only a few relatively important casualties. The steels and alcohols displayed the greatest resistance. The turnover was the heaviest for a Saturday since last July, transfers approximating 1,900,000 shares. The close was irregular.

Trading was at a fast pace throughout the session. Moderate gains predominated until the final twenty minutes when prices of a number of the leaders sagged. The dollar was up more than 2 cents at noon in terms of sterling and was firm in relation to gold currencies. Grains, cotton and other commodities followed narrow grooves. Bonds were spotty under realizing.

Shares of U. S. Steel were firm, holding a gain of about a point. American Commercial Alcohol got up 2 and Schenley and Standard Oil of California retained advances of about 1 each. Smaller gainers included National Distillers and United Aircraft. Armour preferred lost more than 2.

Despite the expanded trading of the past few days, various commission houses said the public had not yet become a large buyer of equities. Today's closing prices follow:

New Airplane Speed Service To Start Today

CHICAGO, Jan. 20, (UP)—A new airplane service with giant ships flying 208 miles per hour will be inaugurated Saturday between St. Paul and Minneapolis and Spokane, Wash. Northwest Airways announced tonight.

The first ship will leave St. Paul at 7:15 a. m. and reach Spokane at 3:30 p. m. Another ship will leave Spokane at 8:45 a. m. and reach St. Paul at 5:45 p. m.

The ships of the new line will have a top speed of 230 miles per hour and a cruising speed of 208 miles per hour.

The ships will make close connections with ship bound for Seattle, Tacoma and Chicago.

Lava Bear Caught By LaPine Trappers

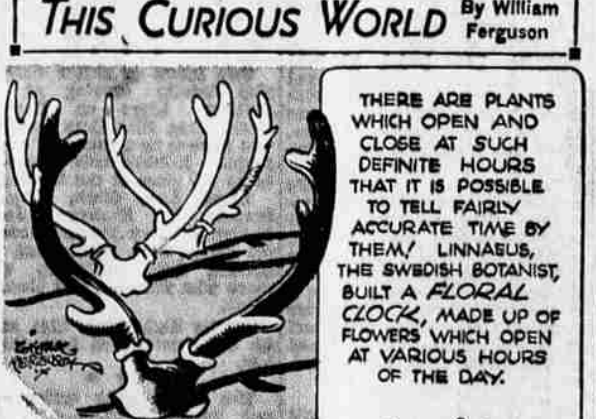
