Hog growers of Klamath county will meet this week in various communities to sign up hog control contracts as requested by the agricultural adjustment administration. A general educational meeting was held at Henley last week, covering the entire county.

Provisions of the plan were thoroughly explained to 50 hog producers from all sections of Klamath county. At this meeting Klamath county was divided into three districts for organization purposes, the first being that district east of Olene, comprising Poe Valley, Langell Valley, Horselly, Sprague River, Bonansa being the center. The second district comprises that part of the county lying south of the cast-west road, 11 miles south of Klamath Falls at Mac's Cash store. This road extends from Stukel Mountain weatward thrum Mt. Laki, Spring Lake, to Lower Klamath lake district. Headquarters for this section is Merrill, District No. 3 takes in the halance of Klamath county north of the East-West road described in District No. 2, Klamath Falls being the center.

The community meetings for District No. 1 will be held at Bonanza on Thursday, January 25, at 1:30 p. m. at the Grange hall. District No. 3 meeting will be held on Wednesday, January 24, at 1:30 p. m. at the Harry Beardsley ranch near the Lone Pine school. Mr. Beardsley's house is nearly half a mile off the highway south. District No. 3 meeting will be held at Klamath Falls, Friday, January 23, at 1:30 p. m. in the civil service room of the Federal building.

Hog producers of Kiamath county should plan on attending the meetings in their community. It seems at this time that the only possible way for producers to be reimbursed from the processing tax now in effect is to take full advantage of the government's benefit payment plan. Work sheets now in the hands of producers should be filled out so that contracts can be completed at the community meetings. Also, at these meetings it will be necessary for each community committee to elect one of their members to the county board of directors for the Hog Control Association. This committee of three from the three communities will comprise the county allotment committee.


