A CALL TO THE COUNTRY TO HAIL HER LEADER

This striking poster was painted by the famous artist, Howard Chandler Christy, when he heard of the national movement to observe President Roosevelt's birthday on Tuesday night, Jan. 30, by raising an endowment fund for Warm Springs Foundation for Infantile Paralysis at Presidential Birthday Balls given simultaneously in Klamath Falls and every community in the land. He gave it to the national committee as its official poster. Done in red, white and blue, the poster depicts Miss America at the left protecting two children who are looking up to President Roosevelt, shown above the capitol. The slogan across the top "America, to our President," was coined by Mr. Christy as a toast to Mr. Roosevelt from the nation.

HIGH OFFICIAL VISITS MOOSE MONDAY NIGHT

In the ritual, a degree staff of past dictators of the local lodge played an important part. They included Rinehart, Motzenbacher, George Ogle, Grant Dixon, Clyde Thompson, William Barron and E. E. Benner.

Adjourning to the ballroom, the Moose and their distinguished guest sat down to a dinner prepared by the local chapter of the Moose auxiliary. Sartori was welcomed by Barron, and Mrs. Claude Christiansen for the auxiliary chapter. Benner acted as toastmaster.

FORMER HEAD OF COMMISSION DEFENDS COSTS

PORTLAND, Jan. 23. (AP)—Declaring he was voicing the sentiments of most of the sportsmen of Oregon whose license fees go to perpetuate game and fish life, J. E. Cullison, former chairman of the state game commission, has filed strenuous objection to what he describes as "exorbitant expenses involving special legal services" for the commission.

Cullison called attention to a financial report issued by the game department indicating \$11,232 has been paid Chester E. McCarty, Portland attorney, for special legal services since March 1930.

He declared that in a closed session, members of the commission approved McCarty's last voucher calling for payment of \$546 for November services. The voucher is now in the hands of the state auditor. This expense was for preparation of CWA applications in connection with the \$120,000 rehabilitation program for hatcheries and game farms, violation cases in Union county, and for prosecution of Elk law. Chairman Matt F. Corrigan of the commission said the charges have been satisfactorily explained to the commission.

Heavy Storm Hits Cascade Summit

CASCADE SUMMIT, Ore.—Cascade Summit was visited by a snowstorm yesterday which left six inches of new snow. The snowstorm was accompanied by a high wind, but no damage was done on account of the wind.

Former Shakespearian Actor Directs Little Theatre Play

LEGION URGES DEATH PENALTY IN KIDNAPINGS

PORTLAND, Jan. 23. (AP)—Capital punishment for kidnappings in Oregon, and the suggestion that the payment of ransom be designated a felony, are urged by the law and order committee of the Oregon Department of the American Legion.

These recommendations were issued here Monday by the committee which adopted a four-point program for law reform.

"An attempt to remove the profit from kidnapping may appear heartless," said General George A. White, committee chairman, "but it is no more heartless than the conscription of 65,000 men taken from their homes under the head of public necessity."

The ten-vote jury conviction principle in criminal cases was recommended. The committee observed that public indifference which permits graft and incompetence is the real cause of lax enforcement of law and the miscarriage of justice.

Improved coordination of efforts of the several police agencies in the state, and honest and efficient handling of public business by elected and appointed officials was stressed.

Harold J. Sexton, sheriff of Wasco county, and a member of the Legion committee, discussed universal finger-printing as a method of reducing crime.

Reduced registration fees in some states open the way for increased state revenues through operation of the gasoline tax.
