HOG MARKET SEES INCREASE MONDAY

National, Local Markets

OREGON GETS BUTTER FROM POINTS SOUTH

PORTLAND, Jan. 23, (AP)—For the first time in years there have been receipts of butter from California in Portland. This unusual condition was not due to the supply of local stock being shorter than demand, but to the arbitrary quotations listed on cubens on the produce exchange here.

There was no change in the price listed for butter on the exchange for the week's initial session but the undertone of the trade was somewhat easier all around.

Price Unchanged.
With Portland prices among the highest in the United States, quality considered, butter was being drawn to this market from practically all points along the coast.

The receipt of California butter here has created much interest inasmuch as there has been much talk in recent years of Oregon butter being used in increasing volume in the south.

There was no change in the price on butterfat.

Market price on eggs refused to stay put with secret and open shading on all sides and with retailers selling lower than what was being quoted as wholesale figures.

Potatoes Firm.
Erratic trade trend was continued but the net change in values appeared nil. Light and medium Leghorns were up 1c one day and down a similar sum the next.

Rise of around a half cent was being received for country killed calves up to 8-8 1/2 lb. Hogs of quality were about steady at 8c top with lambs scarce and firmly priced.

Indications point to a general flight against the sharp advance of 15c named in retail prices for ice cream by the state code. They claim that this will force a very sharp decrease in demand which is not what producers need.

Supplies of fresh crabs have almost stopped from Oregon. Washington coast points on account of continued stormy weather.

Yakima is now so excited that it was practically impossible to purchase carloads of potatoes there even at an advance in price named last night by holders. Local trade was firm but no higher.

Portland produce exchange was now quoting egg after a lapse of many years. No trading was reported and no price has been named by the organization as yet.

SHEEP: Receipts 11,000. Fat lambs slow, asking steady and stronger compared Monday's full advance; good and choice medium weights held upward to \$9.50 and above; indications steady on aged sheep, or around \$2.50-4.00 on natives.
