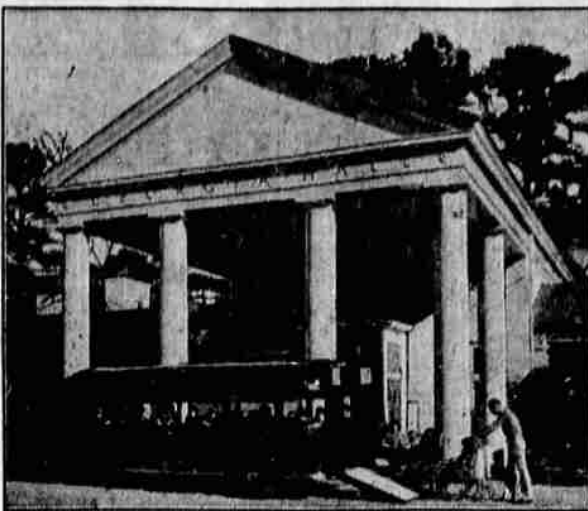
Funerals COLEY BALL

RIGID PROGRAM SENT DAIRYMEN

PORTLAND, Jan. 27. (AP)—A tentative program for rigid regulation of dairy production, the discouragement of new entries into the dairy industry, and an equitable allocation of surplus losses by formation of a pool, was submitted to about 60 producers and distributors of the Portland milkshed by the Oregon milk control board here today.

The proposal for production restrictions is designed ultimately to stabilize the entire industry. The producers and distributors who heard the plan today were said to have given almost unanimous approval. Possible modification will depend upon data submitted by interested factors.

Pugilist Fined on Game Charge

Antone (Tony) O'dell, prize-fighter, was fined \$75 in Justice W. B. Barnes court Saturday for illegal possession of deer meat. O'dell and two others were arrested by state police at a place near Topwy grade, on the Klamath river.

When brought into court Saturday, O'dell assumed entire responsibility for the offense, and "took the rap" for the others as well as himself. Pending payment of cash on the fine, he went to jail.

The other cases were dismissed, Justice Barnes announced.

administration made available for that administration \$400,000,000 of the appropriation of \$3,300,000,000 made by the fourth deficiency act, fiscal year 1933, for national industrial recovery.

"The funds available for these two activities will be exhausted early in the month of February, 1934, and it is essential that additional funds be provided to avoid an abrupt termination of this relief work."

"I am confident that the congress is in sympathy with the proposed continuance of these relief activities."

Hopkins, federal administrator, today directed civil works administrators in all states to throw their records open to public inspection. He telegraphed all offices: "I want to make it perfectly clear to all civil works payrolls and records of purchase of supplies are public records, and therefore open to inspection."

In contributing to the pledge made by the Klamath Falls women, residents of the city and especially the women who plan to play cards Saturday afternoon, are asked to bear in mind that already a large number of Klamath county children have benefited from the good work of Doernbecher Memorial hospital.

The value of free care given to boys and girls admitted to Doernbecher hospital from Klamath county alone during the year 1933 was estimated by Miss Phelps, superintendent at \$375.15 with those admitted to 1933 receiving free treatment valued at \$3,302.55 making a total of \$3,677.70.

It was also pointed out that 21 boys and girls from Klamath county have benefited from Doernbecher hospital.

With these figures to back their plea for support it will probably not be difficult to have reservations made by women throughout the city in the interest of the benefit Saturday.

THOUSANDS DROWN IN CHINESE FLOOD

SHANGHAI, Jan. 27. (AP)—Sensational Chinese reports claiming 10,000 men, women and children have been drowned, frozen to death or are missing Hopel and Honan Provinces along the rising Yellow river, appeared in vernacular newspapers today.

The dispatches, which relief organizations and other sources here considered exaggerated, said additional thousands were homeless in the inundated districts with freezing weather adding to their suffering.
