Liquor Ads in Utah Are Banned

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 26. (UP)—(UP)—Attorney General Joseph C. Clegg today ruled that magazines and periodicals containing liquor advertisements cannot be sold by Utah news stands.

The ruling was made for Harry Gould, president of the American News Company, distributor of periodicals.

The Utah law, Clegg said, provides for a maximum penalty of six months in jail or a fine of \$200 for dealers violating this law.

Auto Industry

Spurred Ahead By New Orders

DETROIT, Jan. 27. (UP)—Spurred by an avalanche of orders far exceeding the most optimistic expectations, automobile and allied industries today set production schedules ahead, added increases to workmen's pay envelopes and saw big profits in 1934.

An anticipated production of more than 3,000,000 units, an increase of about 50 per cent over 1933, and with 325,000 employees already at work in the motor area, brought a hum of activity almost in tire, body and parts factories.

"Not only are the men returning to their old jobs daily at automobile factories but in the plant of the NRA," John L. Lovett, general manager of the Michigan Manufacturers association, said today.

"The automobile industry should absorb nearly all of its idle workers for the next five months," the industry probably will produce between 3,000,000 and 3,500,000 cars this year."

Estate of Paul Bern Is Sought

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 27. (UP)—Half of the \$37,000 estate of Paul Bern, film executive who committed suicide shortly after his marriage to Jean Harlow, platinum blond actress, was sought today on behalf of the late Dorothy Millette, who was described as Bern's common-law wife.

The petition was filed by attorneys for Herman Koch, public administrator of the Sacramento county, who took charge of Miss Millette's estate after her body was found floating in the Sacramento river.

Bern shot himself to death Sept. 5, 1932, in the Hollywood "chicken coop" he occupied with Miss Harlow during the three months of their married life. Within a short time of the suicide, Miss Millette left her San Francisco hotel, boarded a Sacramento river boat and at night leaped to her death.

Germany Rejects American Attorney

BERLIN, Jan. 27. (UP)—The appeal of Leo Gallagher, Los Angeles attorney, to be permitted to remain in Germany was rejected today, and he was ordered to leave the country by January 31. His activity as counsel for Georg Dimitroff, one of the three Bulgarian communists recently acquitted in the Reichstag fire trial, caused the order for his expulsion.

National, Local Markets

BUTTER DROPS BELOW PRICE OF WHOLESALE

PORTLAND, Jan. 27. (AP)—There may be a code regarding the selling of butter below established prices but some weekend retail offerings were being made even below established prices in the wholesale trade.

Practically a steady situation was shown for eggs with the bulk of the sales 1 to 2 cents below the prices established by the Pacific Co-ops some days ago. Retailers were generally offering no higher than what the Co-ops are quoting at wholesale.

A further advance in colored roasters on the produce exchange for the late season brings to the fore the higher prices that have been recently offered on the open market even by members of the exchange.

In every line, the market for country killed meats showed a firm tone along the wholesale way. Lard and mutton are so considered higher, they were of nominal character.

Higher cost of meats and the scarcity of chickens have added to the demand for turkeys and in spots fractionally higher prices were reported in a small way. The general tone however, was 18 cents a pound.

Most of the resales of onions here were of No. 3 grade on account of the rather good quality of such stock for immediate use and the big differential between them and No. 1's.

Stock Market

Quotations

NEW YORK, Jan. 27. (AP)—Activity of Aircraft issues was the only feature of today's rather dull stock market proceedings.

Some so-called leaders milled about indecisively. There was some further profit-taking apparent, but, on the whole, the market was without any great difficulty. The close was slightly irregular. Transfers approximated 4,150,000 shares.

The flying field drew the largest number of speculative adherents. The interest here was attributed partly to the expectations of large army and navy orders. Grain, cotton and other commodities were fairly firm, but trading in the staples was quiet.

The dollar reacted in foreign exchange dealings as the gold-selling activities of the federal reserve attracted attention both at home and abroad. Bonds improved mildly.

Shares of Wright Aeronautical jumped 28 points, and then dropped the major portion of the gain. The issue is closely held, but, aside from this and renewed hopefulness for the aircraft industry, traders could give no specific reason for its activity. Several others of this group advanced fractionally to a point or more.
