WHITE HOUSE DOOR SHUT TO HARD LIQUORS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29. (AP)—A statement that no distilled liquor will at any time be served in the White House, but that "there will be no fixed rules as to the serving of wine," was issued today by Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt.

When wines are served, Mrs. Roosevelt said, they will be simple wines, "preference being given to American wines."

Mrs. Roosevelt's complete statement follows: "By the 15th of February, it will become legal in the District of Columbia to serve wine. No distilled liquor will at any time be served in the White House. There will be no fixed rule as to the serving of wine but when served there will be, of course, simple wines, preference being given to American wines."

Mrs. Roosevelt, giving out her statement in the White House at a press conference, commented there would be no problem this year about serving wines at state dinners, since repeal does not go into effect in the district until February 15. The White House social program then will have been completed.

"The decision of Mrs. Roosevelt not to serve distilled liquors in the White House, despite their legal status," said a statement by Gustav Pickett, the White House director of temperance, prohibition and public morals, "is most gratifying as it indicates an appreciation of the serious social problem arising from their general use."

"I am very sorry that the example of abstinence apparently is not to be set at the White House," was the view of Dr. E. C. Dinwiddie of the national temperance bureau, in an interview.

COPCO PROBE MAY RESUME ON FEB. 20

SALEM, Jan. 29. (AP)—A tentative date of February 20 was set for the hearing in Klamath Falls of the California-Oregon Power company in the resumption of investigations of charges and services of that company. Commissioner Charles M. Thomas informed Mayor Willis E. Mahoney of Klamath Falls.

Mayor Mahoney late Saturday called upon the public utilities commission to request the investigations be resumed as soon as possible. Probe of the company, it was stated, was started more than a year ago and progressed up to the time the entire engineering force was put onto the telephone investigations which are now nearing completion.

Thomas assured Mahoney the matter would be rushed, and he set the hearing for February 20 subject however, to conditions arising in the telephone situation. Mahoney's visit with the judge was less than a quarter hour in length.

Mayor Mahoney returned Monday from Salem, and said he had received assurance from Thomas the local Copco investigation would proceed, with the next hearing about February 20.

"The matter seemed to have come to a stop," said Mayor Mahoney, "and I thought it well to find out the reason. I feel satisfied now the program will be pushed through."
