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honor Franklin D. Roosevelt, and to further the work he has inspired in the treatment of infantile paralysis by the Warm Springs Foundation.

Two Million Taken
On the basis of a survey made late today by the United Press, it was estimated that at least \$2,000,000 would be raised for the foundation, which had its birth through the president's visits to Warm Springs, Ga., where the waters did much to restore the vitality and energy which he has since employed in his work of leading a nation out of economic paralysis.

Figures from 27 states and the District of Columbia, assembled shortly before the multitude of functions were to start, showed 2,042 parties were being held in those states, with an estimated attendance of 1,495,000 and approximate gross receipts of \$1,425,000.

Stores Contribute
These figures include, in the main, balls and parties which had been planned with elaboration and publicized, and do not take in the many private functions held throughout the country in honor of Mr. Roosevelt. The financial figures, moreover, are exclusive of other methods used to raise money for the Warm Springs Foundation.

In New York, Chicago, San Francisco and other major cities, for example, some department stores contributed a percentage of their day's receipts to the foundation.

In Chicago more than 2000 saloons hung up large pictures of President Roosevelt and every person drinking a toast to him in those places was assured that a percentage of the money he paid for his drink would go to the fund.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. (UP)—President Roosevelt in a brief birthday address last night called on the nation to become active in the fight being waged against the ravages of infantile paralysis.

The chief executive at the same time delivered a message of thanks to the thousands of persons throughout the country who selected his birthday as the day on which to raise funds for the Warm Springs Foundation.

"All of you know," he said, "that the work at Warm Springs has been close to my heart because of the many cases of infantile paralysis which have been treated there. It is a fact that infantile paralysis results in the crippling of children and grownups more than any other cause."

Sends Thanks
The president thanked the country for the wide recognition of his birthday, adding:

"No man has ever had a finer birthday remembrance from his friends and fellows than you have given me tonight. It is with a humble and thankful heart that I accept this tribute through me to the stricken ones of our great national family. I thank you but lack the words to tell you how deeply I appreciate what you have done and I bid you good night on what is to me the happiest birthday I have ever known."

Lumber Companies Increase Scales

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basic wage scale would be increased step by step, to bring the income of employees to higher and more acceptable standards of living.

"In its meeting of January 24, 1934, while the board recognized the present slack demand for lumber and also the penalty of lower wage scale competition from non-Four-L operations and from other lumber sections in which the Four-L is not organized, it felt that the anticipated movement of lumber in the spring justified its carrying out its pledge to improve wage conditions and voted to raise wages effective February 1st, 25 cents per hour, or to a sawmill rate of 45 cents in all Four-L member operations in the fir and western pine districts.

"And furthermore it resolved that even though the present minimum code base in the fir and western pine territory is high as compared with other lumber producing sections and other basic industries, yet it is not sufficient to sustain employees and their families on the American scale of living; therefore, we, the Four-L board of directors, shall make known these facts to the lumber code authority and/or the National Recovery administration, and shall make application for a minimum base of 50 cents per hour for the western lumber divisions and other sections proportionately."

Postal Officials Put Ban on Liquor

PORTLAND, Jan. 31. (AP)—The postoffice department here today announced receipt of a regulation prohibiting the sending of liquor through the mails.

The order authorizes the postoffice to open packages and destroy the contents when alcoholic beverages are detected. It also is illegal to import liquor in the international mails.

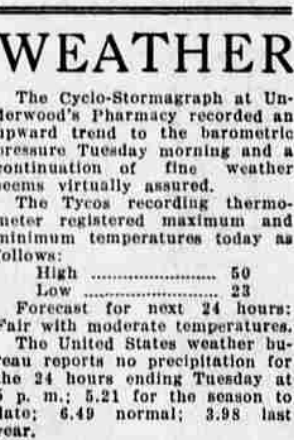

Crater Lake Park Roads Are Cleared

Both the Medford and Klamath national parks are now open, according to announcement of David Canfield, chief ranger, Tuesday.

"The roads are narrow and icy and may be closed with another snowfall, so motorists are cautioned in traveling to the lake," Canfield said. Eight feet of snow fell at the lake during the month of January, which is comparable to the 21 feet 4 inches which fell during the month of January in 1933. Five and one-half feet remain at government camp and seven feet at the rim, according to reports from Canfield Tuesday evening.

The total precipitation in the park during the month of January was 11.41 inches. The highway is open at the time of the year for the first time in the history of the park.

CHAMBER NEUTRAL IN RATE DISPUTE

The San Francisco chamber of commerce will not intervene either for or against parties to the hearing to be held in San Francisco by the Interstate Commerce commission on the proposal to equalize freight rates on canned goods shipped in fibreboard and wooden boxes.

This was stated in a letter received by the Klamath county chamber of commerce from George J. Presley, executive vice-president of the Bay City chamber.

Presley said that the interests wanting the hearing are the Dried Fruit association, the Canning League, and the fibreboard and wooden boxes.

It was explained, however, that the state reserve embraces a great deal of public domain—sage brush land which has never been taken up, and that sheepmen have grazed their flocks on this property to such an extent that little food has been left for the wild game. If the land was designated as a federal refuge, no grazing would be permitted, nor would the shooting of firearms be permitted under any pretext.

There is now no federal game refuge in Oregon, although Nevada has such a reserve for winter ranging of antelope. The game commission said there is considerable migration.

It appears likely the league discussed the question as to how many officials should be made subject of a recall attack. COMPLIANCE HOPE FOR NRA PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. (AP)—Hugh S. Johnson told the newly chosen state directors for NRA and the emergency council today that success of the recovery administration and the entire recovery program depended wholly on their ability to obtain real compliance with the codes.

In an extended explanation of what NRA has done and still has to do, Johnson told the men that the enforcement question was "the proof of the pudding."

Young Roosevelt's Former Wife Hurt

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 31. (AP)—Mrs. Elizabeth Donner Roosevelt is recuperating from injuries received in a fall from a horse last Sunday, it has been learned here.

The former wife of Elliott Roosevelt, son of the president, received a broken nose and other injuries while the guest at a house party on Long Island. Her home is at Ithaca, near Philadelphia.

Members of Mrs. Roosevelt's family declined to say where the accident occurred.

ROOSEVELT SETS DOLLAR VALUATIONS

Mr. Roosevelt took the step of devaluing the dollar at a conference with financial advisors and made the public announcement at a press conference crowded with newspapermen.

The White House explained the president desired the action to be known just before the American gold market closed for the day so that if any benefit accrued by this first move under his new money powers it would be enjoyed by United States citizens.

The gold devaluation proclamation makes available a dollar profit to the government of more than \$2,600,000,000, of which \$2,000,000,000 will form the huge stabilization fund with which President Roosevelt will seek to manage the dollar's foreign exchange value to the benefit of American trade.

Supply Ship Reaches Byrd

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weeks ago. She carries a number of essential supplies for the expedition.

The flagship of the expedition today continued its desperate struggle to finish the discharge of stores, continuing a bit and run game with crumbling masses of ice.

After cruising and drifting within the bay for 61 hours, vainly seeking a safe berth, she came alongside the ice yesterday afternoon and her weary crew commenced to unload. She was able to hold that position only five hours and cast off when wide cracks opened to the south.

No Rest for Crew.
At 4 a. m. today she was again driven off and for a few minutes it appeared the vessel would not escape undamaged.

She had made a second berth alongside the ice at 7 o'clock last night.

The crew immediately began unloading operations, summoning dog teams and tractors from Pressure camp.

Coal was passed out of No. 4 hold in cargo nets.

The men—although they had gone without sleep for 24 hours in their battle to get supplies into the permanent camp—were put to work carrying quarters of beef on their shoulders from the ship to the ice.

CWA Officials Favor Crossing on Main Street

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Thomas Will approve the program. C. A. Dunn of the city planning commission also spoke in favor of it.

Materials Needed.
Members of the committee pointed out that the project called for more materials than are usually supplied by the government on a civil works project. Approximately 40 per cent of the total cost would be for materials, with a local contribution of \$1500. It was also stated that the city would have to concentrate its civil works quotas on this job, if approved, in order to maintain a fair share of the laborer quotas in other municipalities. This the city representatives agreed to do.

County School Superintendent Fred Peterson pointed out the possibility the old high school building may qualify for CWA work, and that this will also call for considerable labor in the city.

S. F. May Help.
The committee decided to approve the project, and Engineer Thomas and others will take it to Portland. Ultimately, it is believed, the Southern Pacific railroad may be willing to aid in financing the job.

Renovation of the city fire station was approved as a CWA project.

The committee authorized procedure with the city library and predatory animal control programs as civil works service projects. Employment of another county nurse on a temporary basis is also authorized as a CWA plan. These projects will give work to four men and three women.

Baldwin Authorized.
Manager Will Baldwin was authorized to begin work on the re-roofing of the courthouse and construction of an annex at Mills school, if and when additional appropriations are made and the quota of men will permit.

It was decided to write to Lieutenant Basil B. Smith to find out when to start work on the Chilquin airport project, which has been approved.

Guy Merrill, county roadmaster, presented a project for cleaning cemeteries throughout the county. This was approved and sent to the state committee for action.

Archie Rice of the Central Labor council informed the committee the council is appointing a committee to investigate CWA employment complaints.

Losses of \$1.00 to \$3.00 a share were numerous at the close. The list appeared wearied by yesterday's efforts of pushing dozens of industrials to new highs since 1931, and trading slackened somewhat, the day's turnover aggregating 3,000,000 shares, or more than 1,000,000 less than yesterday's.
