STUDENTS DEFEAT DEPRESSION ERA

A group of college boys in North Dakota have fooled the depression. Sons of farmers who have not been receiving notoriously high prices for their products in recent years, these boys faced the prospect of having to postpone their pursuit of a higher education until better times. Then someone figured out a scheme to take the depression into camp. How they did it is told by C. N. Christopherson, Great Northern railway general agent here.

Six unwanted cabooses were obtained from the railway company. These were hauled over to the campus of the University of North Dakota, remodeled and joined together in a quadrangle. Four were converted into sleeping quarters, one made into a combination kitchen, dining room and washroom, and another into a study room. Electric lights were installed and steam was piped from the university heating plant.

The colony of 31 students are able to board and room themselves for \$3 a month per student. Instead of paying rent they put in four hours a week working for the university.

The students call their quarters "Camp Depression" on the strength of their success in taking the depression into camp. As a matter of fact, they enjoy practically all the comforts and conveniences of modern dormitories, and the six cabooses which in their prime underwent leishure by the Great Northern system are now ending their days in the cause of higher education.

CRESCENT CITY PLANS BEFORE ARMY EXPERTS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. (AP)—presented to the board of army engineers had advised him of a decision to visit northern California in March to make a personal investigation of proposed developments for Crescent City and Humboldt harbors.

At the same time, the board of engineers entered an unfavorable notice on the proposal to deepen Crescent bay for deep water transportation. Lea said, however, that the unfavorable notice did not mean rejection of the plan, but merely a postponement of final decision until after the inspection trip.

Oregon Man Present.
The fact that the board also plans to inspect Humboldt harbor, Lea said, would indicate no decision on that project would be made until after the inspection. Hearing probably would be held on the proposal to deepen Crescent City's port either in California or Washington later, he said.

James Twoby, of Grants Pass, Ore., representing the California and Oregon coast railroad, conferred with Lea today on the proposal to extend the road from Grants Pass to Crescent City. The proposed railroad and the proposed harbor development have been linked together since it is not the policy of the war department engineers to improve a harbor which has no easy means of communication with adjacent inland territory.

Railroad Problem.
"If we do not succeed in obtaining a deep sea harbor at this time," Lea said, "it is probable that we can get a start on the work."

It is not too much to say that some day there may be a transcontinental railroad with a terminal at Crescent City. An east-west line tapping the inland regions and terminating at Crescent City would be of prime importance to the development of southern Oregon and Idaho, an area at present isolated from a port.

SEASON'S SNOWFALL FAR BELOW NORMAL

A check of snow at four mountain guard stations was made Monday by Hugh A. Ritter, forester in charge of the Klamath district, who announced the following results: Pelican guard station, no snow; Cherry Creek station, not enough snow to measure; Seven Mile station, eight inches, and Anna Creek station, 10 inches.

A check of the same stations at the end of January 1933, gave these figures, according to Ritter: Pelican, 23 inches; Cherry Creek, 50 inches; Seven Mile, 76 inches and Anna Creek, 80 inches.

Although there has been an unusual amount of rain during the current season, Ritter predicts an early spring when there is no spring snowfall.

There is no snow in the mountains to sustain flow of streams into reservoirs, and the run off is more rapid he asserted, than when a heavy snow gradually melts and is carried into the lakes.

The situation is saved from being critical, according to the ranger, by the fact that the ground was not frozen when the heavy rains fell and each drop of moisture was soaked into the ground, which therefore will dry out slowly.

ACCIDENTS OCCUR IN FOREST WORK

Three hundred and ninety-seven non-fatal accidents occurred in the work of the U. S. forest service in Oregon and Washington during the calendar year 1933, according to report just issued by the regional office at Portland, Oregon.

Most of the injuries were caused by the men falling, slipping, lifting or pulling; the improper use of tools, and the falling of trees and other objects.

The largest number of injuries were to the hands and fingers—85 in all. Next in order are 40 foot, heel and toe injuries, followed by some form of injury to 31 eyes, 29 knees, and 18 hands. The complete list of injuries reads like an anatomical catalogue, it is said, but only one insect bite and 5 cases of poison oak and ivy are recorded. Largely because of the more favorable fire season, 1933 showed an improvement over 1932, during which 2 deaths and 503 non-fatal accidents occurred, according to the report for the North Pacific forest region.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Jan. 31 (U.P.)—Don Miller, right halfback of Notre Dame's "F. J. Hornsamen," has agreed to a 2-year contract to coach the St. Xavier college prep football team, school officials announced today. It was reported Miller will receive \$2500 for three months work each season. Miller formerly coached the Ohio State backfield, but has recently been practicing law in Cleveland.

Temperance Play Recalls Old Days in Klamath Falls

To those who can send their memories back through the "good old days," the play "Ten Nights in a Bar-Room" will bring forth vivid recollections of a near-forgotten era. For those who were yet too young to witness a strange and startling picture.

The theme temperance, and the hints of barmalms and saloons have awakened queries concerning the old saloon days of Klamath Falls.

From occasional stories and yarns told by the old timers, Klamath Falls boasted a background as picturesque as a Zane Grey setting. In the beginning of that golden age it was Linkville, down by the river, one of the last vestiges of a disappearing frontier. It was a dusty, or sandy, little pioneer village with hithing rails, watering troughs, swinging doors and six-shooters; not to mention bad men, city slickers, heroes and Indian wars.

A bar, a bottle, and perhaps a glass or two sufficed the well-equipped bartender. Silver cocktail shakers and frosted glasses

would have been eyed with scorn and loud guffaws. Quantity, simplicity and rapidity was the keynote of pioneer tipplers.

Later, as Linkville emerged into a prosperous town, saloons became more pretentious, with the famous back rooms for gambling, Saturday night "orchestrated" and free lunches. The bartender was every one's pal, and the saloonkeeper's checkered vest and gold nugget watch chain were eyed with envy.

We all have listened in wonderment when the old timers tell about the snake epidemic, when the board sidewalks and gutters of Klamath were alive with big black, wriggly snakes, but here is a new one.

One local bartender who regularly conveyed himself to his bar on a bicycle, remembers the time when he had to carry the bicycle to work, all the while stepping gingerly over large families of green frogs. Apparently, the story goes, the frogs decided to move from lower to upper lake.

Oh well, perhaps the man who wrote "Pink Elephants" was merely reviving historical fact.

WORCESTER SPEAKS TO KLAMATH SCOUTS

Wild life pictures, depicting a cougar hunt and the ravages of duck disease, were shown to the Sea Scouts of Klamath Falls Tuesday night by Hugh Worcester, U. S. game protector.

The cougar picture showed government trappers hunting the predatory animal with dogs and finally catching him. Worcester said that the female cougar in a year's time kills on the average of from 60 to 65 deer and the male cougar 30 to 35 deer.

The duck picture showed how thousands of wild fowl die yearly from a bacteria which they eat in the water. This germ seems to be in shallow water and mud flats and where lake water has backed up and flooded new ground, Worcester said. The government has finally found a cure for the disease after experimenting with pigeons.

After the showing of the pictures, the starboard crew of the scouts served the port crew with a feed.
