DEMAND FOR WOOL SHOWS QUICKENING

PORTLAND, Jan. 31. (AP)—An accelerated demand for wool, with initial contracts at from 20 to 25 cents a pound, has become apparent in Oregon and Washington producing sections, the Journal said today.

The activity suggests, the paper said, that "some mills are quite anxious to obtain their probable needs before the fleece is off the sheep's backs."

There is a suggestion that almost twice last year's volume will be available for the open market, it was pointed out, inasmuch as banking facilities in the producing areas have been strengthened, whereas comparatively little wool was available on the open market last year because of the loans held by the government.

The latest survey of the trade here is said to practically confirm the sale of between 40,000 and 50,000 pounds of lamb wool in Oregon and Washington for spot delivery at 30 cents a pound.

National, Local Markets

BUTTER PRICE AT PORTLAND RISES TODAY

PORTLAND, Jan. 31. (AP)—Firmness in the eastern sector due to weather conditions along with no appreciable surplus of fresh stock at any point in the country, caused a further advance in the price on butter here. This was a reversal of the trend expected in view of recent California weakness, which was later followed by strength and advances.

Advances on the produce exchange for the late season were in line with the betterment at other points and especially along the Pacific slope.

Eggs Lower

The advances were having the effect of throwing considerable demand from the cheaper sorts into oolomargarine. Advances for the season were 1 cent except for firsts which were up ½ cent a pound. Butterfat was advanced 1 cent a pound.

Egg market trading was at the lower prices first named yesterday by the Pacific Co-ops and later followed nominally by the produce exchange which made its initial former price range.

In general there was no change in live chicken prices for the day. All sorts were in call and receipts continued on a very limited volume basis. Turkey call was unchanged.

Potatoes Quiet

Shortage of country killed meats was continued along the wholesale way. The shortage of mutton and lamb was suggested by arrival of more goats for the lower grade trade.

Both potatoes and onions continued with a quiet trading tone at the source and locally. Potato shippers were asking full prices but were securing little movement.

Local market on household rubbers was weak with northern interests battling here for control of the trade. Top for choice 16's here is now 60 cents a box. Offerings were increased with a sprinkling from the home sector.

KLAMATH SUPPLIES PORTLAND SECTION

The Klamath Falls and Willamette Valley districts continued to supply practically all the shipments into the Portland district in the week ended January 29, according to the U. S. department of agriculture.

In general, northwest markets were slightly easier. Growers offerings continued fairly heavy and for the most part in excess of the slight demand. U. S. No. 1 alfalfa was quoted at Portland, January 29, at \$15 per ton, with oat hay from the Willamette valley selling at around \$13.50 per ton.

Portland reported receipts of 13 carloads out of 17 carloads of all hay received, in the week.
