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lie officials have to decide a few things for themselves. "If all the things they are reported to have said about me at Tuesday night's meeting are true, I would be in jail."

The other comment on the situation came from District Attorney T. H. Gilenwaters. "Grizzle is silent."

"I consider this in the same light as previous recall attacks from the same source. In case of trivial importance, in my case, it is obviously vindictive because I am leaving the office this year."

County Judge Grizzle had nothing to say about the matter at this time.

Information at the courthouse is to the effect that the recall petitions must carry enough names to represent 25 per cent of the county vote for supreme court judge in the last election. An official estimate is that will require over 2000 names.

It is understood that once the recall is filed, the officials at whom it is directed have five days in which to resign. The election then proceeds, and if the recall carries the officials are vacated and are filled in the same manner as they would be if the official died or resigned.

Candidates Rumored. In the case of county judge or district attorney, appointment would be by the governor. In the case of a county commissioner, it would be by the remaining members of the court.

For the moment, the recall talk has stolen the spotlight in the political situation. There are, however, some other developments.

Emil Dreher is a new name mentioned as a possibility for county commissioner. Fred Duke is said to be thinking about the county assessorship.

Henry Perkins has been mentioned as an aspirant for state representative. Perkins says he is tired of being mentioned for offices he has no intention of running for, and if it isn't stopped he is going to get belligerent about it.

Denials Made. Arthur Prialux of Chiloquin is reported to have said he is not in the representative race. Earl Mack, grange leader, has made a similar statement. Earl Mack is also mentioned by some as a possibility for county commissioner. He is a democrat of influence.

Thus far, D. E. Fletcher is the only formally announced candidate. He wants Circuit Judge Duncan's seat. Hardin Blackmer and U. S. Ballentine, district attorney aspirants, are other sure-fire candidates. Others are watching for straws in the wind.

Dollar Restored to Gold Standard

The action of the president in authorizing the treasury both to buy and sell gold at \$35 an ounce, in the opinion of foreign exchange experts, may largely solve the problem of stabilizing

the dollar, particularly insofar as the gold countries are concerned. It is therefore possible that the stabilization fund may not have to devote much attention to the international money market, and may concentrate upon domestic problems.

Positions Similar. The problem of the dollar's adjusting itself to its indicated international value is complicated by two factors. First, there is the possibility of a large influx of fugitive domestic capital now abroad, and the return of the normal foreign investment in American securities, which might reach proportions unmanageable in the foreign exchange market. Secondly, there is the unknown quantity of what action foreign authorities may take to defend their positions.

The new position of the dollar places it more closely to the old gold standard than the present position of sterling is, foreign exchange authorities say. The old gold standard, permitting the sale or purchase of international gold at a fixed price, places the parity of exchange in terms of the current currencies under automatic control. For instance, if the dollar holds well above its new gold parity, it will be profitable for banks to ship gold from Paris to London. This would theoretically continue until enough dollars were sold and francs purchased in paying for the movement of gold, to lift the ratio of the franc to the dollar so close to the parity that the operation no longer would be profitable. In case the dollar should decline below its parity with the franc, the federal reserve might sell gold for export until the reverse took place.

If the flow of capital toward the United States becomes extraordinarily large, it may much more than absorb the offerings in the London market, and make such inroads into the reserves of the bank of France that the bank would cease to sell gold freely, which would be tantamount to quitting the international gold standard. In the belief of some monetary authorities, that would cause such international monetary chaos that it would quickly bring an international stabilization agreement.

DEVALUATION BOOSTS STOCK, BOND MARKETS

Stocks in the New York stock exchange pushed up \$1 to more than \$4 in some of the most active trading since July, and scores of issues penetrated new high ground since 1931.

Bonds were strong, and commodities mostly advanced moderately. Wheat gained about 1 cent a bushel at Chicago, and cotton some 50 cents a bale at New York.

Wall Street bankers were awaiting clarification of treasury regulations before placing heavy orders to buy gold in London and Paris for shipment to New York, an operation made highly profitable by the premium commanded by the dollar.

GOLD JUMP FORWARD. NEW YORK, Feb. 1. (P)—Reckoned on the new gold value of the dollar, the world supply of monetary gold has jumped from some \$20,000,000,000. The United States monetary gold supply becomes about \$6,800,000,000, in contrast to roughly \$4,030,000,000, on the basis of the old dollar. American gold remains about one-third of the total world supply.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. (P)—The United States gold supply was announced at the treasury today to comprise \$4,092,988.86 on the old dollar basis. This was the value of the nation's monetary gold to which the government took title on Tuesday, but does not represent the increased dollar value resulting from President Roosevelt's revaluation of the dollar at 59.06 per cent.

Effects Feared. "Only a loose and ineffective coordination was attempted thru the federal reserve board," he continued. "The result has been chaos and internal dissension."

"Dissension and vacillation will continue to have deadly effects as long as the (federal reserve) system continues to lack system. It has been tried and found wanting. It will now be lucky if it escapes destruction altogether or absorption by the government."

The pending proposal for a monetary authority, he said, "seems to be the best available compromise permitting the system to survive intact so long as the management of the dollar is put in new hands."

In his first press conference since President Roosevelt's devaluation proclamation, Morgenthau answered a number of questions about the new money situation but declined to say anything about operation of the stabilization fund.

"I will never answer any questions about the fund," he declared.

He declined to say whether gold purchases made to the treasury by the New York Reserve Bank would be paid for out of the fund.

Roosevelt Lauded. Asked whether abandonment of the gold standard by France would mean a world embargo on gold shipments, Morgenthau's only reply was that such developments would be taken under advisement.

Testifying to the house committee, Professor Fisher contended a permanent monetary authority would be "far superior to permanently vesting the control of the dollar in the hands of the president or the secretary of the treasury."

"This is said not because of any lack of confidence in either of the present incumbents of these offices," he explained. "On the contrary, they are better fitted than any other existing officials for this great function, and I rejoice that the bill which became law yesterday temporarily conferred on them and no one else some of the powers needed for such control."

"But we need to build for the long run, and we can not expect that all future presidents and secretaries of the treasury will be as fitted for such a special function as are President Roosevelt and Secretary Morgenthau."

Fisher held too that "it is conceivable, even in the immediate future, that the bankers and the president should wage a war."

"If the bankers should attempt to dump the securities they hold, it would be difficult for the president to counteract the deflationary influence of such action," he asserted.

The monetary authority, he contended, would have the "requisite controls" to use in such an emergency.

Morgenthau said the advisors in guiding the dollar would be a "flexible, shifting group."
