

**Austria Rejects Germany's Reply To Interference**

BERLIN, Feb. 1, (U.P.)—A re-valuation of charges of internal interference in Austria by Germany is made in the German government's reply to the Austrian regime which was delivered tonight.

The note said that Germany refused the charges after careful investigations, and emphasized that the problem of Nazi influence in Austria does not permit of handling through international bodies.

**VIENNA, Feb. 1, (U.P.)**—A cabinet communique tonight rejected Germany's reply to charges of interference in Austrian affairs as unsatisfactory. The communique said that Germany has not appreciated Austria's desire for a direct settlement and that Austria must now pursue the way necessitated by Germany's conditions.
