

Malin's Teams Undeclared

Roland Parks Leads County School Thru Football and Basketball Without Suffering Loss. Frankie Monroe Top Light-weight in Northwest. Freshmen From Oregon Would Like to Meet E. elephants Here.

Roland Parks, a newcomer to the Klamath county coaches, has set up an out-of-the-ordinary record in his brief tenure at Malin high school. Malin hasn't lost a single athletic contest since Parks came there last fall.

This school down in the south end of the county fought its way through the "B" football schedule last autumn to win the county championship. All opponents, including the usually strong Klamath high school Wildcats, fell, and Malin went into the championship game with Bonanza with an undefeated record. Bonanza and Malin, scoring one touchdown apiece, played in the mud and rain to a tie.

Parks, finding his chief forte in basketball, took his handful of candidates and turned them into one of the strongest teams in the county. They stand at the top of the "B" league today without a loss.

The finest achievement of the season came last Friday night when Parks' first and second teams defeated Chiloquin in two games. Chiloquin ruled the county league last year and was unbeaten this season until it went against Malin.

The victory was particularly impressive because Chiloquin, with a number of players returning from the title-winning team of last season, holds the "B" pennant for southern Oregon. The title was won in the tournament a year ago sponsored by Southern Oregon Normal school at Ashland.

When the tournament rolls around this season Malin will be one of the distinct favorites. Parks' combination probably will take precedence over Chiloquin and Bonanza, champion and runner-up respectively in 1933.

Malin probably will enter the southern Oregon tournament in the valley in March. This tournament organized by Howard Hobson, brings together the outstanding "B" teams of the region. The competition is exceptionally fast and the event has been recognized as one of the major basketball elimination contests in the state.

It is an excellent thing, for it gives these little recognized "B" schools an opportunity to seek a place in the sun. Next year there will be a special state championship class for these secondary schools, and if the character of the teams improves much more, they will become noteworthy rivals for the "A" members.

Parks came to Malin from the University of Oregon where he was a member of Billy Reinhart's Webfoot squad. He employs the Reinhart system, but has added his own variations to make it more effective against the particular style of play used by each of the Klamath county schools.

Tex Skelton, fight promoter and handler at Portland, writes that Frankie Monroe, Klamath county lightweight, is the sensation of the northwest. Monroe is the most demanded pugilist in Portland and Seattle and has so many offers he can't quite handle them all.

He has been fighting every week as a main event, and has won a surprising number of his matches. The only difficulty has been his inability to obtain opponents of sufficiently high calibre.

Tom Stoddard, assistant graduate manager at the University of Oregon, is willing to bring the Webfoot freshman basketball team to Klamath Falls. Stoddard would like to see the yearlings meet Southern Oregon normal.

There have been more major basketball games in Klamath Falls this year than ever before. It is a compliment to Klamath's drawing ability.

The elephants came over from Ashland to meet Waldorf and then returned the following week for a two-games series with Multnomah club.

Waldorf's game again. Mikulak's all-stars was an outstanding event. A fourth major battle will take place Wednesday night at Henley when the Henley town team tackles the House of David from Chicago.

If the freshmen play here it will be a fitting climax to an exceptionally active hoop season.

SCARRED HUSKY MEETS OREGON

Twice Beaten Washington Tackles Ambitious Webfoot Five.

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 5. (AP)—Bearing battle marks and some aging clippings about eight consecutive wins, the University of Washington basketball team meets University of Oregon here tonight and tomorrow night.

Eight victories will not win the coast conference north division championship, no matter if they were scored in a row. The Huskies were lashed when Oregon State defeated them Friday. Seemingly more nearly described the plight after Saturday's shelling.

Webfoots See Chance Will take 11 or 12 victories to win the championship, possibly a playoff to boot.

It will be a battle of ambitions tonight, with the Webfoots striving to avenge their previous defeat and remain in the championship swim by defeating the leaders. Oregon has won two games and lost four, but looked good, sometimes dangerous, doing it.

Robertson and Willie Jones may receive the needed inspiration for a scoring sortie from a friendly home crowd. With the Huskies' winning spell broken, they are just another ball club.

Saturday night's game Oregon State led all the way to defeat Washington 28 to 18. Coach Statts Gill's men have finally commenced playing as a team unit. Their stand and effective whittling of the Huskies' lead are reminiscent of last year when the industrious Beavers rallied after they had lost four, and swept to the championship.

Bobby Galer, Washington high-scoring forward, was the bright light for his team, scoring 10 points, which with his nine previous night give him 105 in 10 games. He leads the league by good margin.

Meanwhile, on Saturday night, the University of Idaho Vandals won their second out of two games played this year with Washington State, 33 to 27, on their home floor, to move into a tie with Oregon in the league standings for third place.

Chicago Bears Defeat Stars at San Diego

SAN DIEGO, Feb. 5. (AP)—The Chicago Bears, professional football champions, have yet to find a team on the Pacific Coast that can take their measure.

The Bears played the All-Stars of San Francisco, former half-back star of the University of Southern California, here Sunday, and won, 7-0. Though the All-Stars lost, they had the satisfaction of holding the Bears to the smallest score rolled up by the professional champions in the coast tour.

As a matter of fact, the game came very nearly being a tie. It was only in the last 10 minutes of play that the Bears scored and the touchdown came on a pass. Cliff Battles, left half, started one of those intricate aerial formations for which the Bears are famous, firing the ball from the All-Star 25-yard line to Bill Karr, right end. Karr heaved the ball laterally for Bill Hewitt, at other end, and he rammed 15 yards to the goal line.

Manders, fullback, placed-kicked the extra point.

Malin Tackles Wildcats Here Next Friday

Malin, undefeated leader of the county "B" league basketball team, will meet the Klamath Wildcats here next Friday. The Malin combination slipped into the lead last week by downing the heretofore unbeaten Chiloquin five.

In other county games next Friday Bonanza will play Butte Valley at Dorris, Chiloquin will play at Merrill, and Tulelake will move up to Henley.

Henley and Keno are scheduled to play Monday night.

Transient Bureau Handles 497 Cases

The Klamath Transient Relief bureau handled 497 individuals in January, according to a report compiled by W. H. Ballew, director.

Of this number, 414 cases were closed. Eighty-nine men went to the camp at Talent, a last contingent leaving Saturday. Meals served totaled 5,849. Beds were provided 1,945 times for nights of sleep for transient visitors.

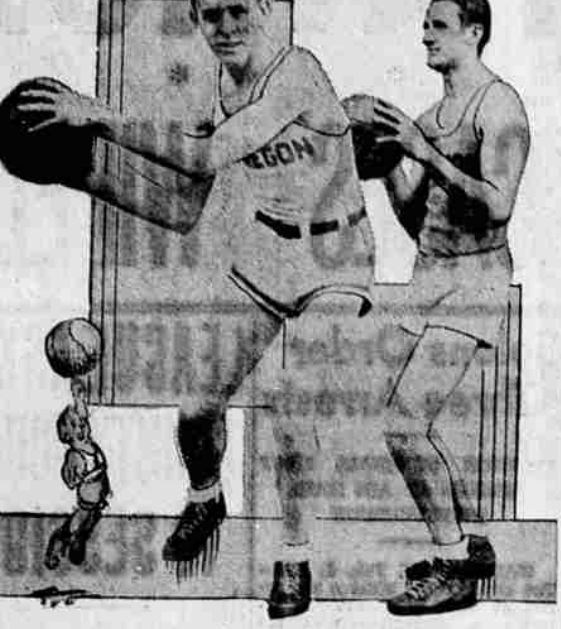

Football Coaches Satisfied With Present College Rules

NEW YORK, Feb. 5. (AP)—The football coaches rules committee, which acts as an advisory body of the football rules committee, met Saturday and decided that it was "satisfied with the present college game of football."

Only eight minor suggestions were made covering classification and amplification of several rules. Outstanding among this group were:

1. Amplification of rules on a blocked punt.
 2. Elimination of penalties for successive incomplete forward passes.
 3. Amplification of men eligible to receive forward passes. The committee, composed of some 25 coaches headed by Lou Little of Columbia, issued the following statement:
- "The special committee of the Football Coaches' association wishes to go on record as being satisfied with the present college game of football. The rules have proved satisfactory as regards interest and safety.
- "The committee does wish to draw attention to several rules that need clarification and amplification for the benefit of coaches, officials and safety of players.
- In addition to the three recommendations, the following five were also included on the list:
1. A suggestion for coaches to further investigate equipment with a view to preventing injuries.
 2. Notification of time out so that everyone—coaches, players and officials—may know exactly how many times out each team has had.
 3. Amplify the duties of field judges on a dead ball.
 4. Protection of forward passers in a similar manner as the kicker now is protected.
 5. Amplification of the position of all officials on all plays.
- The drastic recommendations which had been expected to be made—making incomplete passes over the goal line merely incomplete and not touchbacks, allowing forward passes from any point behind the line of scrimmage, increasing the sideline zone from 10 to 15 yards, returning the goal-posts to their original position on the goal line and discarding the dead ball rule under which a runner is stopped the moment any part of his body except his hands or feet touches the ground—came up for discussion but did not muster enough strength to be adopted.

Lion Remains On Mainland To Meet Mortensen Friday

Failure of wrestling promoters in the Hawaiian Islands to post a satisfactory guarantee will keep Al Karasick, Portland mat star, on the mainland indefinitely, according to Mack Lillard, Klamath Falls matchmaker. Lillard said Karasick would wrestle Fred Mortensen of Pasadena here Friday night in a one-hour main event.

Mortensen, who introduced himself from the ring last Friday, will be making his debut at the Legion hall. He is known in the south as the "Terrible Dane" and has a reputation for both skill and roughness.

Lillard said the two athletes had tentatively agreed to wrestling "nothing barred."

STARS DEFEAT WALDORF FIVE

Mikulak's Men Triumph 29-27 Over Klamath Quintet

Mike Mikulak's all stars from the University of Oregon Saturday night demonstrated exceptional basketball ability in subduing a strongly resisting Waldorf team of Klamath Falls, 29 to 27. The former coast conference football luminaries came out from behind a one point lead in the closing moments to protect an advantage they held throughout the major part of an exciting struggle.

Six hundred persons filled the bleachers and were scattered through the high school auditorium to witness the stars shoot their way to victory.

Waldorf Scores First The Waldorf team took command of the contest in the first minute of play with a field goal. The stars, led by Mike Mikulak himself, quickly reversed the situation and were leading 19 to 16 at the end of the half.

Ray Allen, Waldorf center, placed his team in the lead near the close of the game with a field goal, bringing the score to 26-25.

Bree Cuppeltti, ex-football guard who is as broad as he is long, aided the stars in recapturing the lead with a looping shot from mid-floor. Mikulak assured his combination of victory with the closing field goal of the game.

Bankers Press Sacramento Club

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Feb. 5. (AP)—Low Moreing's ownership of the Sacramento Senators, Pacific Coast league baseball club, was threatened today when San Francisco bankers met here to discuss payment of a loan, said to total \$125,000.

Moreing was given until February 12 to take up the loan, which is guaranteed by common stock of the club. The banking group holds the stock as security for the loan.

Following the conference, the bankers indicated that in event Moreing is unable to meet the obligation on February 12, they will take over the ball club and place Earl McNeely, present manager, in complete charge.

Liquor Law In California Is Investigated

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Feb. 5. (AP)—California's confused liquor law enforcement took a definite turn late Saturday when the state board of equalization, empowered with enforcing the law, announced temporary suspension of 128 liquor licenses and ultimate suspension of an additional 100.

Most of the licenses suspended or facing suspension were in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Oakland and Fresno.

At the same time the board, meeting here in an attempt to revise the regulations after the Mendocino county court ruled Friday that sale of liquor by the glass or wine and beer without meals was in violation of the law, decided to deny 181 applications for licenses.

The board said an additional 100 applications would be held up until board officials could conduct an investigation.

Whiffy Cox Wins Golf Tournament at Agua Caliente

AGUA CALIENTE, B. C., Mexico, Feb. 5. (AP)—Whiffy Cox, the Brooklyn Terror, more formally known as Wilfred, proved that consistency is a jewel, and winning the annual \$7,500 Agua Caliente golf tournament here Saturday.

Cox proved to be by far the steadiest of the field over the gruelling four-day tournament, by equalling, or cutting under, par, three of the four days, for a total of 283, and bettering by two strokes the previous tournament mark of 284 set by Morrison of Pasadena.

Hunter Presses Cox was pressed, and hard, by Willie Hunter, the Los Angeles veteran, who was just one stroke behind the Brooklyn player at the start of today's play. They finished the first nine with Hunter one up, but both wound up the day with cards of 72, one over par.

Hunter's mental hazard might have disrupted the play of any other competitor, but he played his strokes nicely and sailed home winner of second place, two strokes ahead of Denmore Shute of Miami, British open champion.

Ky. Laffoon of Denver was firmly in fourth place by virtue of a fine 69 on the last round.

New Record Set Tied for fifth were Leo Diegel of Philadelphia, Olin Dutra, the Santa Monica Giant, Horton Smith of Oak Park, Ill., Art Bell of Honolulu, who has played only so-so golf in winter tournaments here, won the low amateur prize with a card of 295. Johnny Dawson, the perennial star of Chicago, was a stroke behind him, with Charles Seaver, Los Angeles youngster, taking third low amateur score.

The speed of the course was shown when five players set a new record of 67 during the tournament. Frank Walsh of Chicago, equalled the new mark today, but he got too late to place high in the money.

The duel between Cox and Hunter was one of steadiness. Cox once nursed his bare one-stroke lead throughout the day, knowing Hunter was playing in a three-hole just behind him and was appraised of the score of each hole.

Cox's total, two under par for this difficult and sporty course, was one of the greatest four rounds in recent west coast competition.

The Davids compose one of the strongest basketball teams in the country. Their heavy crop of whalers have made them an attraction where ever they have played, and their basketball ability has brought in a majority of victories.

But the whalers aren't the only qualifications of the House of Davids. All of their players are huskies with plenty of basketball ability. Ted Tvedell, center, is six feet six inches tall, weighs 195 pounds and formerly was a star at Eureka college. Mark Harper, forward, is another six-foot four-inch giant, while "Tony" Wapp, guard, towers into the air six-foot five inches. All are clever ball handlers, crack shots and fast on the floor.

Have Good Record During the last basketball season the House of Davids won 85 games and lost but 20. In the 1931-32 season they won 67 and lost only 15, beating many of the country's outstanding independent clubs.

The Davids are in good shape and "Pansy" Ratslaff, flashy forward, who suffered a minor injury in the Oklahoma City game, is ready to go. He will team with Walt Henrich, the new forward sensation of the Renos, at forward with Ad Dietzel, the high scoring star, at center. Guards will be selected from Toews, Ragland and Vanek. Elmer "Boots" Johnson, hotshot forward, also will be ready.

Henley Staggered Henley has been plugging all season with a rapidly improving combination. They have assembled some of the outstanding independent talent in the county and will be in top form for the House of David game.

SEATTLE, Feb. 5. (AP)—Three Norwegian riders of the hickory staves, the class of the field, held most of the honors today from the Seattle ski club's annual tourney, held over the weekend in rugged Snoqualmie Pass, with Tom Mohrsten of Vancouver, B. C., the all-round champion.

Henry Solvsted, also of Vancouver, the youngest of the trio, was the class A jumping champion, with less of 163 and 157 feet. Nordal Kaldahl of Seattle, was close behind the other two, with jumps of 161 and 160 feet, but his form was not as good, the judges ruled.

Mohrsten, although jumping only 150 and 153 feet and finishing third in that event yesterday, with 215.7 points, had won the 10-mile cross country race the day before, compiling 240 points. His total of 455.7 points for the two events was the best of the field.
