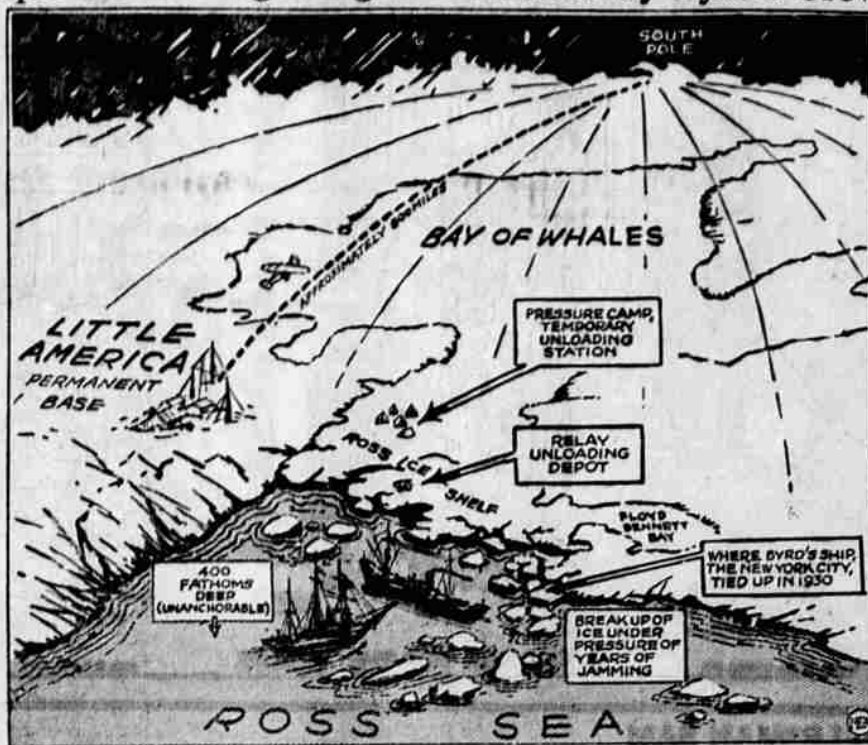

## Epic Battle Waged Against Disaster by Byrd's Crew



This sketch depicts the region in which the epic struggle is being waged by members of the Byrd Antarctic expedition to save their supplies and avert death in the crumbling ice fields. Their flagship, the Jacob Ruppert, has been joined by The Bear of Oakland, supply ship, but the vessels drift about in the Bay of Whales, unable to aid the 44 men marooned on shore. Racing against time, the crew is endeavoring to rush supplies from Pressure Camp, where they were taken when unloaded from the Ruppert, to the Little America base, over a hardship-beast trail three miles long.

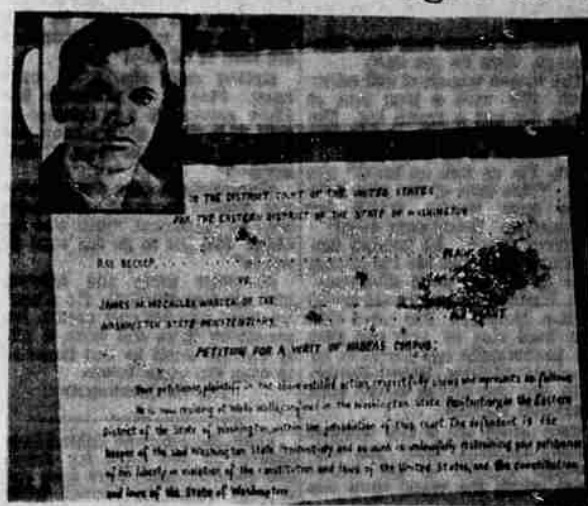
