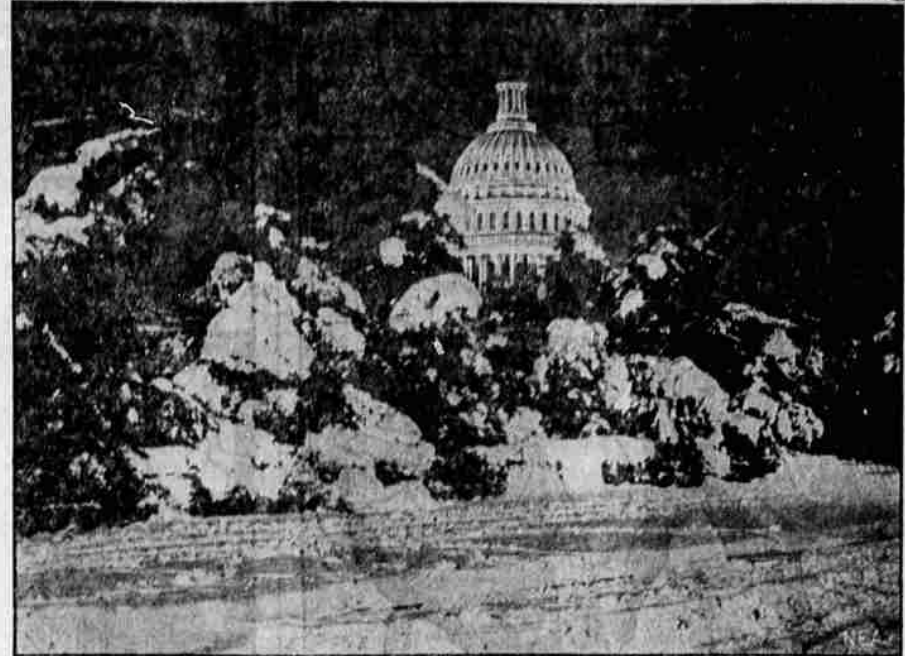
The Quality Delicatessen will continue to carry a complete line of fresh fish, imported cheeses, appetizers, etc., and will maintain a delivery service at all times.

PLANS PROGRESS FOR CHURCH EVENT

The pioneer dinner, to take place on Friday evening, February 16, at the First Presbyterian church, this year will register a marked departure in the matter of program from those held heretofore. While recognition of the pioneers will, of course, be made, emphasis is to be given to the anniversary feature of the celebration.

Fifty years ago in February, 1884, a little group of devoted Christians met in what was known as the "Smith Hall," near the Link River bridge and were definitely organized into the Presbyterian church of Linkville, the first religious organization in the history of Klamath county, at that time known as a part of Jackson county.

The charter members were Mr. and Mrs. William A. Wright, father and mother of Dr. George I. Wright; Mrs. Hattie Roberts, mother of Mr. Charley Roberts; Mr. R. T. Baldwin, honored names in the business life of Klamath Falls, Mr. and Mrs. Boughton, and Mrs. Robert McLean, wife of the first pastor. Preceding this, of course, had been the Sunday school, started by Mr. A. W. Wright in a building just back of what is now the Oregon bank building.

None of the charter members are now living. Mrs. John Schallack was the first member to be received into the church following this, of course. Mrs. Rosa McCornack is the oldest living member. Mrs. Burge Mason and Mrs. Marion Hanks were among the early members and workers in this church.

This year the program committee for the pioneer-anniversary dinner consists of Paul T. Jackson, chairman; Dr. George I. Wright, A. M. Worden, A. G. Goehring and Fred Fleet.

Mrs. Earl D. Gilbert is chairman of the publicity and ticket committee, and can be reached over telephone 1752-3. Tickets also can be obtained at the Sunset grocery, Crumbly's Public market, and the Wilson Abstract company. Inasmuch as only 200 can be accommodated in the dining room of the church, it is necessary that reservations be made by actual purchase of tickets. This can be done over the telephone and tickets will be delivered. Places at the tables will be reserved until 7 p. m., after which time the reservations will be lost.

Crop Reductions by Law Is Forced In Both Houses

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7. (UP)—A move to force crop reductions by law instead of negotiating limitations by voluntary agreement is being pressed in both houses of congress, apparently with administration backing.

Like previous agriculture experiments, this is to be applied first to cotton. Bills sponsored by the Brothers Bankhead of Alabama, one of whom is a senator and one a representative, seek to establish a 9,000,000-bale limit on the 1934-35 cotton crop, enforcing this by a prohibitive tax of 13 cents a pound on excess production.

Though the Bankheads did not appear as administration spokesmen they made it clear that they would not be pressing their joint bills if they were not confident of administration support.

Rep. Bankhead introduced his bill in the house today. Senator Bankhead's, introduced earlier, was reported favorably today by the agriculture committee.

Deputy Collector in Klamath Falls

David C. Nelson of Pendleton, deputy collector of the internal revenue service of the treasury department, arrived in Klamath Falls Wednesday and will be here for ten days. Nelson will assist Klamath county residents in their tax problems.

He will be in his federal building office each afternoon. Nelson, who covers the entire second district, is assigned to flour and processing taxes for field corn, hogs, tobacco, paper and jutes.
