National and Local Markets

CUBE BUTTER PRICES MOVE AHEAD AGAIN

PORTLAND, Feb. 8, (AP)—All cube butter prices were up a half cent for the day, following a belated session of the produce exchange where prices are following other markets fully a day late on account of the late hour of the session. Butterfat was firm to higher in spots.

Trading in the egg market was holding up quite well and at generally sustained values for better quality offerings. Storage operations were getting under way in the Pacific Northwest.

Spots higher prices were being offered and paid for live chickens as a result of the short supply in sight. Some killers were quoting more for fowls to retailers but not offering more to the producer.

Liberal call continued in the market for dressed turkeys with occasional sale at a further fractional advance. Shipping call continued chiefly for large toms to go into stores.

Price on country killed lambs has reached up to 15c in a small way locally with further strengthening of the market on veal, hogs and mutton. Beef was fully steady.

Market Improves

Few sales of onions were reported in the blanch section with growers asking and receiving \$1.50 top for a limited number of cars. These were moving chiefly to the southern states.

Better trading conditions were showing in the broccoli market with Roseburg now shipping carloads. Local demand was improving with some slight gains in the resale price here recently.

Walla Walla spinach was firmer and up a nickel in spots.

Tomato market was firmer and higher on the track for Mexicans. There was no competition.

Household rubarb sales were liberal with the low prices continued.

Another carload of Texas spinach was due Saturday.

CHICAGO, Feb. 8, (U.P.)—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Hogs: Receipts 17,000; moderately active, strong to 10c higher, 170-200 lbs., \$4.75-\$5.00; top, \$4.85; sows, \$3.20-\$3.40.

Active and strong to 15c higher; but higher than early top yearlings, \$7.10 with \$7.25 bid; best bullocks, \$5.50; steers, \$5.00; 1000 lbs. brings substantial premium over weighty offerings comparable grade; cows higher; bulls steady; vealers firm and active at \$6.00-7.00; choice to \$7.50.

SHEEP: Receipts 10,000. Fat lambs slow, sellers asking 15-25c and more higher but buyers resisting; choice woolled lambs held above \$9.50, but most bids below \$9.50.
