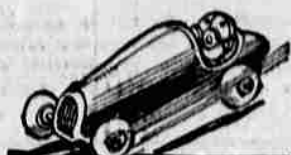

Londos Retains Mat Honors In Marshall Bout

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 10. (AP)—Jim Londos, St. Louis wrestler who is recognized by Pennsylvania and several other states as world's heavyweight champion, defended his title today with his crown still securely on his head after more than three hours of jolting and jarring by Everett Marshall, of La Junta, Colo.

Londos, using a crotch hold and a body slam to finish off his opponent after a grueling battle, won the match in 2:04:45. It was the longest match ever fought in this city.

Capone's Brother Ready to Leave McNeil Island

M'NEIL ISLAND, Wash., Feb. 10. (UP)—Ralph Capone, brother of Scarface Al, Chicago gangster, is slated for freedom by Feb. 27, provided he can pay his \$10,000 fine in connection with his violation of income tax laws.

Capone, who was sentenced to three years, becomes eligible for freedom this month, due to time off for good behavior.

Warden Finch R. Archer said today there will be some delay carrying Ralph Capone to a pauper's oath, adding the fine would hold good as long as Capone lives, should he ever acquire any property.

It is reported Ralph plans to live in Stickney, a suburb southwest of Chicago, which was once a stronghold of his brother's gangsters.

While Ralph is ready to quit McNeil Island prison, his brother Al must remain in Atlanta until 1939.

Aggressive Playing Spirit Demanded by Major Leagues

NEW YORK, Feb. 10. (AP)—Major league baseball is due for some brisk, if not actually warlike action on the diamonds this year, providing the athletes carry out on the field with the conviction of their bosses, the club owners, that the game needs more aggressive playing spirit and less fraternizing to attract increased public interest.

No special call to arms has been or will be sounded, but it is a fact that the magnates of the National League have endorsed the initiative already taken by their chief executive, John A. Heydler, in promoting more inter-club rivalry and that the American league owners are of similar mind.

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OREGON WINS FROM VANDALS

Webfoot Combination in 43 to 29 Victory At Eugene.

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 10. (AP)—The University of Oregon basketball team jumped from the cellar into a tie for third place by defeating University of Idaho 43 to 29 here last night.

It marked the beginning of Oregon's second-half schedule and also one more victory than gained all last season.

More spirited play was shown by the Webfoots than in any previous home game this season. Pass interceptions and feeder work of Olinger, Webfoot guard, was largely responsible for the win. He made seven assists in addition to scoring four goals.

Idaho was off its shooting form, else its ball monopolizing on rebounds under the baskets might have made a much closer game.

Scoring honors were shared by W. Jones of Oregon and Naslund of Idaho. The two teams played here tonight and then Idaho moves to Corvallis to play the second-place Oregon State Beavers Monday and Tuesday nights.

ROOKS' TRIUMPH CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 10. (AP)—The Oregon State College Rook basketball team, now beginning to function as a team unit, defeated Salem high 45 to 24 here last night.

Earlier in the season Salem beat the Rooks 25 to 22 in an overtime game at the capital city. Rudy Kappel, formerly of Belknap high, led the scoring with 12 points. Wintermute scored eight points for Salem and Salstrom contributed six. The Rooks led 21 to 14 at half-time.

Applications Filed for Oregon Permits

Application under the Oregon Liquor Act to sell beer, light wines and soft drinks, has been filed by M. P. Lavenik and Paul W. Hilton, local poolhall operators, according to records at city hall.

These applications must be notarized, accompanied by a certified check of \$100 and it is also necessary that applicants must post bonds of \$1,000.

Those places desiring to sell light liquors under the Oregon control act must be approved by the mayor and common council of the city when inside the city limits, and by the county court when outside.

Bids Called for Washington Liquor

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 10. (UP)—In an effort to give opponents a chance to attack legality of the Steele liquor act in the courts, the state liquor control board said today it would call for bids on \$1,500,000 worth of liquor revenue bonds Feb. 15.

It is expected opponents will bring an injunction suit in Thurston county superior court before that time to stop the board from accepting the bids.

Husky Swimmer Bests Record At Corvallis

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 10. (AP)—Jack Medina of University of Washington has done his part to set another world swimming speed record and it now remains to the international swimming federation to rule whether his time of 4:48.6 for the 440-yard free style swim will be accepted.

In 1927 Johnny Weissmuller set the old mark of 4:52. Medina's performance was the feature of the dual swimming meet here last night which Oregon State college won from the Huskies, 43 to 42.

The meet ended in a tie and the Beavers were awarded an extra point for having won the free-style relay.

Timing officials and judges guarded against errors in timing Medina's race. Only last week he received official recognition for a new 500 and 1000 meter free style marks set last summer. Several more of his record-breaking times have been submitted.

Pete Dix of Washington lowered a tank record in winning the 100-yard backstroke event in 1:09. Ed Ralston of Oregon State set the old record of 2:01 in 1931.

FOREST GROVE, Ore., Feb. 10. (AP)—Short-haired Max "Doc" Allen was hitting long shots merrily as Oregon Normal halted the winning streak of Pacific university's basketball team with a 35 to 22 victory here last night.

After running the local team ragged in the first quarter of play the Lithians failed to keep the pace and found themselves on the short end of a 23 to 15 score when the game ended.

All the play centered around the Klamath basket during the first quarter. The score at the end of the first frenzied quarter was Ashland 7, Klamath 3.

Lolling under the trees of his Cocoonut Palm Grove back of his training quarters, Loughran Friday described the strategy he intends to employ against Carnera at Miami.

"It may sound strange," he said, "but I'm convinced a big man like Carnera does more to hurt himself by swinging and missing than by absorbing his opponent's blows."

"I know I'll be able to get Primo to swinging and I know enough about myself and my own power to know he's going to miss and miss plenty and every one of those lunges is going to take something out of him."

Young Italian Whips Levinsky In Garden Fight

NEW YORK, Feb. 10. (AP)—The heavyweights have a new sky-right out of Madison Square Garden's plans for a heavyweight title fight between the Chicago Kingfish and Primo Carnera in June. Unofficially he convinced the experts, and a slim crowd of 3,500 that Levinsky had been beaten, that the Kingfish would be as title challenging material.

KARASICK WINS LEGION MATCH

Russian Lion Defeats Fred Mortensen in Main Event

Fred Mortensen of Pasadena, veteran heavyweight wrestler, turned out to be just another athlete who tried and failed to defeat Al Karasick of Portland.

Karasick continued his uninterrupted string of Legion hall victories by taking two falls out of three in the main event.

The Russian Lion was a long way under his customary form and lost the first fall in 16 minutes and 35 seconds. Mortensen took this advantage with a Russian head lock and body press after he had hauled the Lion inside the ropes.

The second fall went to Karasick in 20 minutes and 15 seconds with his favorite hold, the Boston Crab.

Not more than three minutes of wrestling had elapsed in the third period, when the Russian picked up his opponent and captured the deciding fall with a body slam.

The match was billed as a nothing-barred event, but its caliber was considerably below the usual Legion hall class.

Frank Clemens, Cherokee Indian, turned out to be the outstanding wrestler of the program when he defeated Leo Milo of Pasadena in the semi-final.

Clemens took two straight falls. The first came in 14 minutes with an Indian paralyzer and the second in six minutes with an Indian dead lock.

Ray Frieble of Medford, substituting for Okanagan Charlie, drew with Pete Belcastro in a rough half hour curtain raiser. Frieble then refereed the remainder of the card.

Clair Mortensen presented an exhibition with his father before the windup event.

The selections committee awarded Clemens the Web Kennet prize for the best performance.
