Mural Chopped From Wall of RCA Building
NEW YORK, Feb. 13 (UP)—A storm of protest tonight followed announcement by the Rockefeller interests that a mural by Diego Rivera in Radio City which was the subject of a bitter controversy last spring had been destroyed.

The mural was chopped off the wall by workmen last Saturday. It was understood, and apparently no announcement was to have been made.

Today however the news had leaked out and the following statement was issued at Rockefeller center:

"The Rivera mural has been removed from the walls of the RCA building and the place replaced. The removal involved the destruction of the mural."

National and Local Markets

NO CHANGES ON PORTLAND BUTTER MARKET

PORTLAND, Feb. 13, (AP)—Being a semi-holiday there was no change during the week's initial session for butter on the produce exchange. The market appeared fully steady, even though underpinned was not quite as good as it was a week ago.

Butterfat buying prices were held mostly at the high point locally with country prices still erratic.

No Change Noted

There was again a lack of general change in the egg market price and situation for the day. Storage operations were slowly getting under way, but the general movement was not due to start until next week.

Shortage of chickens continued pronounced in the local trade with all prices held firm with an occasional fractional premium suggested as paid by operators who were short.

There was still a good shipping call for dressed turkeys out of the Pacific Northwest, with Southern California now the leading seeker for supplies. Prices were firm but unchanged.

Prices Sustained

All country meats showed well sustained prices for the day with a continued acute shortage suggested in old mutton and lambs. No spring lamb have been reported.

With former buyers more or less determined to cleanup and take their loss on speculation, the market for onions was practically stagnant at Oregon primary points. Local jobbing trade was slow.

Prices were being fairly well held for potatoes here, but little activity was suggested at Oregon, Idaho and Washington sources, although relatively speaking the best business is in the Deschutes. Considerable activity was showing for spinach here, with both Walla Walla and Texas contributing. Prices were generally held steady. Local offerings were of limited volume.

Rhubarb trade was active with chief demand for choice.

Sugar prices were tightening up somewhat.

Columbia river smelt were in greater offering and lower price. Cauliflower-Broccoli was firm held for Roseburg stock.

Hothouse mushrooms were easy at 30c to 35c per lb. carton generally.

Apple trading continued chiefly of the sorts selling around 50c per box.

S. F. POTATO MARKET WEAKER

Six hundred and twenty-four cars of potatoes were loaded in the United States yesterday Oregon shipped 2, Washington 2 and Idaho 25. Maine shipped 13 cars. Total loadings of old potatoes to date amount to a little over 147,000 cars, which is about 24,900 more than on the corresponding date last year. 259 cars of new potatoes have been shipped so far this season, which compares with 113 on the corresponding date last year.

The market at Presque Isle was steady. Haulings were fairly heavy, demand and wire in inquiry moderate. No. 1 Great Mountains brought mostly \$1.5 a hundred, sacked, in carload F.O.B. shipping point.

At Idaho Falls demand was limited and the market weaker. No. 1 Russets brought mostly \$1.25 to \$1.30 a hundred, sack ed, in carloads F.O.B. cash track.

In the Twin Falls Burley district, demand was slow and the market weaker. A few sales of No. 1 Russets were reported on the basis of \$1.25 to \$1.30 a hundred, sacked, in carloads F.O.B. cash track.

At Yakima demand was high and the market about steady. No. 1 Russets brought mostly around \$2 a ton, sacked, in carloads F.O.B. cash track.

At Chicago supplies were heavy, demand and trading slow and the market dull. No. 1 Idaho Russets brought \$2.05 to \$2.12 1/2 a hundred, sacked, trade sales carlots overweight.

The San Francisco potato market was reported weaker. Big prices were light, demand and trading slow. No. 1 Klamath Gems brought \$1.25 to \$2.00 a hundred, sacked, street sales. No. 1 Yakima Russets were quoted at \$1.65 to \$1.90 a hundred.
