

Beavers Relinquish Title

Vandal Victory Upsets O. S. C. Hopes for Another Coast Championship. Washington Secure for Northern Honors. Gene Vidal Subject of Article in Prominent Magazine.

Oregon State's defense of the Pacific Coast conference basketball championship is permanently shattered for the 1934 season. The Vandals of Idaho, trailing along some place in the lower ranks of the northern division standings, overcame the tantalizing Beaver zone system and scored an upsetting 34 to 22 victory.

The amazing reversal is typical of basketball. The Beavers, confident after stopping the title-bound Huskies in two contests last week, were unanimous favorites to crush Idaho. Oregon State carried out expectations Monday night by holding the Idaho combination to 14 points while the Beavers themselves ran up an overwhelming total of 45. It was the largest-margin victory of the season up here in the north.

Oregon State now has lost five games, sufficient to shove the strongest of teams out of the running. Oregon won one, Idaho two and Washington one, two. Washington is more secure than ever with its ten victories and two defeats. The Huskies could lose two more games to Oregon State, and still continue unmoored to ward the championship.

The Beavers must play four more games. Two, of course, are with Washington. The others are with Oregon, Billy Reinhardt's dangerous combination.

Washington, besides the Oregon State series, has two games with Washington State. The Huskies could lose three of the next four games and come out with at least a tie. No one will predict a complete collapse of the Huskies.

IDAHO WRECKS O.S.C. CHANGES

Vandals Capture Contest At Corvallis Tuesday, 34-22.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 14 (AP)—A vandal is one who wilfully destroys.

That's just what the University of Idaho Vandals did to Oregon State's basketball championship hopes in last night's decisive 34 to 22 upset here. The night before the Beavers almost tripled the score on the downtrodden vandals.

Huskies Safe
Nothing but the wildest of upsets can now keep University of Washington from returning to the coast conference north division pedestal. The Huskies have lost but two games and have only four left to play. The second place Beavers have lost five and have four of their toughest games ahead.

Big Howard Grenier led the Vandals in the first half and Sophomore Norman Iversen scored four rapid-fire goals at the outset of the second half to put Oregon State in a hopeless maze.

Vandals Mace Oregon
Grenier scored 11 points in the game and Iversen nine. Iversen's floor work was even more prominent than the giant Grenier's work under the baskets. Idaho led 15 to 12 at half-time. It was Idaho's first victory of a four-game schedule in Oregon the past five days. It dropped the first two games to University of Oregon.

Oregon State, the one conference team which has defeated Washington this season, will meet the Huskies in Seattle Friday and Saturday nights of this week.

Jack Curtiss Downs Perkins

HAMAS BEATS EX-CHAMPION

Ex-Football Star Gains Decision Over Max Schmeling.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 14, (AP)—The black Uhlan of the prize ring, Max Schmeling, was the forgotten man of boxing today. He has forgotten how to fight.

He started last night on his comeback trail, a former heavyweight champion of the world, and he stumbled down to the end of twelve rounds, still trying, still grinning, still brave as any man who ever pulled on leather—but beaten and torn by the gloved fists of Steve Hamas.

Hamas Beat Loughran
Hamas is the 26-year-old youngster from Passaic, N. J., who made his first athletic name half a dozen years ago as a full-back at Penn State. He came out of college, took up boxing. He once knocked out Tommy Loughran in two rounds. He has lost two decisions to the former light heavyweight champion.

Last night Schmeling was cannon fodder for a boy who would have been fortunate to have acted as his sparring partner back in the days when he was tough and hungry.

Max Falls
A crowd of 15,000, the largest to see a fight in Philadelphia since Gene Tunney won the heavyweight title from Jack Dempsey in the Sesqui Centennial stadium in 1926, saw Schmeling hesitate, fumble, try and fail against the rugged, clean-cut youngster. That crowd paid \$35,000 to see Schmeling fall as completely as he did last summer, when Max Baer knocked him out in ten rounds in the Yankee stadium in New York.

Hamas stabbed him with left jabs, and the Schmeling who used to brush them aside and shuffle in with right hand chops to the head, strength-sapping left hooks to the body, stood and took them. Hamas slugged him with both hands, and the Schmeling who once revelled in that kind of going, stood there helpless, and blinked.

Schmeling Cut
Schmeling's left eyebrow was slashed deeply in the ninth round that three stitches were required to close the wound today, but the courage of the teuton from the black forest remained undimmed. He fought on through a bloody haze, trying, plugging, leaving a right hand that has lost its sting.

With the last punch of the eleventh round, a right hand smash, he broke Hamas' nose and the blood from the two of them crimsoned them to the waist. Favoring the twelfth, the final round, they fought head to head like a pair of wounded, falling horses, horns locked in a death struggle.

At the end, Schmeling, only 28, was the stronger of the two. The decision of Referee Spud Murphy and two judges was unanimous.

Hamas Has Big Lead
Schmeling won only three rounds, the second, fourth and twelfth on most of the experts' cards. Hamas won the other nine.

Despite the defeat the Teuton, who left here a wealthy man after his knockout by Baer to marry Anna Ondry, motion picture star, was not discouraged.

San Francisco Seals Make Offer to Sultan of Swat

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 14, (AP)—Pacific Coast League club owners were anxiously awaiting word from the owners of the San Francisco Seals as to whether it will be necessary to reinforce fences of their stadium this season against the hitting of Babe Ruth. George Herman Ruth, king of swat, has been asked to cavort in the Pacific Coast League next season by Charles Graham, business manager and co-manager of the San Francisco Seals, who was informed that the slugging Yankee outfielder is in bad health and that his doctor recommended a change of climate.

Graham is willing to provide Babe the change of climate. He suggested to Colonel Jacob Ruppert, head man of the Yankees, that Ruth come to the Pacific coast, join the San Francisco Seals, travel with the club and play occasionally.

Graham points out that Mark Koenig did just that, his health returned and now he is battering down fences in the American league.

The Seal owner, in his brainchild, would take over the responsibility of paying the Yankee's salary, which amounts to some \$35,000 this season. Graham believes the addition of Ruth to the Seals would add new life to the league and the "name" of Ruth would pack 'em in Saturdays, Sundays and holidays.

All that Graham needs is Ruppert's and Babe's consent.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 14 (AP)—Young Peter Jackson, 137, Los Angeles, outstanding coast lightweight, easily disposed of Lou Jallo, 138, Cleveland, scoring a technical knockout 40 seconds after the opening of the second round.

Jackson, who is seeking a bout with Lightweight Champion Barney Ross, began jabbing and punching from the opening bell. Twice during the first round he dropped Jallo for short counts. When the second round began he dashed across the ring and sent a hard right to the face, which sent Jallo to the canvas. Referee Fred Gilmore stopped the bout.

FLORIDA TITLE FIGHT DELAYED

Carnera to Defend Crown Against Loughran, February 28.

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 14, (AP)—A new note in prizefight promotion was struck today when a heavyweight championship bout was postponed because of a horse show and a couple of other winter resort functions.

Only a few hours after matchmaker James Joy Johnston had announced an audited advance sale of \$20,000 for the Primo Carnera-Tommy Loughran bout, managers of the boxers and officials of Madison Square Garden decided to postpone the show.

The postponement from February 22 to February 28 came as a surprise. Although it has been scheduled for months, Garden officials suddenly discovered that the Miami Biltmore horse show would be under way on the same date.

They began counting up and found, in addition to the horse show, a dog derby, the Helen Lee Doherty milk fund ball, a horse show ball, and the annual Washington birthday ball at nearby Palm Beach. So they decided to put off their attraction and applied to Louis K. Macynolds, chairman of the Miami boxing commission, for the later date. He approved the change.

All activity at Carnera's camp at Miami Beach and at Loughran's plant in West Palm Beach was suspended today. Loughran planned to go sailing with Enzo Piermonte but cancelled the jaunt because of cold weather. Both of the boxers will resume training on Thursday or Friday.
