

Pelican Basketball Record

Klamath Team Wins Eleven Out of Twelve Games. Ashland Only Team Scoring Victory. Team Appears Headed for Salem Tournament at Salem Next Month.

Twelve times this season the Klamath Pelicans, Dwight French's contenders for the state championship, have started intercollegiate basketball contests. Eleven times those young athletes have come through with victories.

There has been one defeat and many narrow escapes, but the Pelican record for nearly a full schedule of play stands second to none in Southern and Central Oregon.

That should make a team to be considered at the Salem tournament.

Ashland, one of the strongest teams in the west-of-the-mountains area, was the only combination to mar the Klamath showing. Ashland turned aside the Pelicans in the first of a four-game series. The score of this game, played in the valley, was 30 to 24.

Klamath rallied the following night and won 21 to 20, and then walked off with the two closing games.

Little Yreka of Northern California presented an early season threat, after being smothered in the opening game, held Klamath to a 20-to-19 score.

Bend, strongest rival in this district, had no show against Klamath in two games.

Dunsmuir, Medford, Grants Pass and Lakeview were downed impressively.

The present strength of the team should make it an outstanding contender. Several of the players have had tournament experience, and the misfortune of stage fright shouldn't be theirs if they get to Salem.

Two previous Pelican teams managing to find a place in the tournament were beaten in the opening rounds, and then lost their first and only consolation contests.

This third prospective championship team might be the one to lead the state.

Touchdowns in the classroom were scored by four Washington State varsity football players during the semester just closed. Henry Bendole, veteran fullback, led the scholastic offensive with 12½ hours of "A" and five of "B," giving him an honor of credit.

George Blean, senior tackle, and Frank Strack, regular guard, both won places on the all-college honor roll with fine records. Frank Ingram, center and captain last fall, ranked high on the scholarship lists with no grade below "B."

A schedule of freshmen telegraphic track competition similar to the one inaugurated last year will be held this spring among the members of the northern division of the Pacific Coast conference, according to Earl V. Foster, Washington State graduate manager, who drew up the plans.

Two sets of dual meets will be staged, followed by a conference meet of all six northern institutions. The dual meets will be held on May 12 and May 19, with the conference tournament May 26. Last year the Cougar frosh won the conference meet. Each school will meet four opponents in the dual clashes.

The negro forced Miss Vida Jenkins, 34, to write threatening notes to her employer, who is hard of hearing. One of the notes, followed by a signal at the window, said that "our men surround the place" and "we have a time bomb under the corner of this building."

TIGERS READY FOR INVASION

Medford Team Hopes to Resist Pelicans Tonight.

Medford high school, somewhat alarmed over the rise in the football fortunes of the Klamath Pelicans, plans a sturdy resistance for its east-of-the-mountains foe tonight.

The Pelicans, holding the edge over the Tigers for two years in succession, move into the valley tonight for the second game of the year. The Pelicans skipped through to a victory in the first game here, 23 to 13.

Dwight French, Pelican coach, used eight men to subdue the Tigers in the earlier game and probably will send in a full quota of reserves tonight.

Only one man in the original lineup, Wayne Perry, guard, will be absent. Perry, completed his eligibility at the close of the last school semester.

Carl Egehoff and Johnny Pastega, forwards when the Medford team invaded Klamath Falls, are scheduled to be in at the first tip-off. Darrell Miller will resume his regular center post and Scroggin and Giovaldi will start at guards.

Brown, Stewart or Glinaky will be the Tiger forwards. Hammon will start at center and White, Luman or Harris will be selected as guards.

The Pelicans will be back in Klamath Falls Saturday to meet Lakeview here Saturday night. This will be the closing home contest on the regular schedule.

Harvard Coach to Rely Upon Outside Aides

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Feb. 16, (AP)—Eddie Casey is going to rely entirely on outside aid in running Harvard's football team next season.

None of his three 1934 assistants is a Harvard man, something of a departure in Crimson football tactics. Casey will have Adam Walsh, former Notre Dame player, as line coach; Myles Lane, who learned his football at Dartmouth, as backfield coach; and Wesley Foster, former Ohio State star, as end coach. Their selection was announced yesterday.

The appointment of Walsh, who served as line coach at Yale for the last five seasons, was almost as surprising as that of Lane, head coach at Boston University in 1933. Foster came to Harvard last September as head basketball coach and helped out last season in football.

Stagg Predicts Brilliant Year in Grid World

STAGG PREDICTS—18 SPTS.—PITTSBURGH, Feb. 16, (AP)—Amos Alonzo Stagg, the divinity student who became dean of America's football coaches, is as enthusiastic for the next football season as a sub with varsity ambitions.

Stagg, who has devoted his lifetime to the gridiron sport, coaching University of Chicago teams for 40 years and then going to the College of the Pacific as athletic director, displayed the rest of a youth as he lauded the recent rule changes, predicting they'll "open up" the game.

He said he has always favored the changes made at the Atlanta meeting—the lifting of penalties on end zone passes and on two incomplete passes—and added:

"We are going to see plenty of scoring and some fine goal line stands as well. The changes place a premium on good quarterbacking."

Seattle Hawks Down Portland

SEATTLE, Feb. 16, (AP)—Scoring a 3 to 1 victory here last night the Seattle Seahawks hoped to make it two in a row over Portland in the Rose City tonight and climb into a tie for third place with Vancouver in the Northwestern Hockey league.

Rolling up three goals in five minutes, one at the end of the second period, and the other two in the opening minutes of the final stanza, the Hawks moved up within one game of the Vancouver Lions and into a better position for a chance in the playoff.

The championship will be decided with the second and third place teams meeting for the right to play the league leaders for the title.

Tonight's Portland game is the last contest of the season between the Buckaroos and the Hawks.

Australian Challenges Prestige of Young Texan.

Al Schnell, a big man from the Antipodes, moves against Leslie Wolfe, young athlete of Texas, in the main event wrestling match at the Legion hall, tonight.

Schnell, heavier than Wolfe and powerful, will be making his first appearance in Klamath Falls. Wolfe, however, has become one of the most familiar and popular matmen to work the main events here, and has been listed as a popular favorite.

The Australian wrestling system will be given a trial by Mack Lillard, promoter. The main event men will tackle each other in six 10 minute periods with a rest between each round.

Wolfe has not been defeated here recently. The young fellow with the hook scissors held dangerous Al Karasick of Portland to a draw two weeks ago.

The five-round semi-windup rivals the main event in attractiveness. Two experienced heavies, Ted Thye, Portland veteran, and Jack Hogut of Montreal, will oppose each other. Neither Thye nor Hogut has wrestled here for several weeks, but their ability is recalled with enthusiasm.

Freddie Steele Wins in North

TACOMA, Feb. 16, (AP)—Five months lay-off hadn't dulled Freddie Steele's flat ability and the state welterweight champion pounded out a decisive win here last night over Leonard Bennett, of Detroit, in an eight-round bout. Steele weighed 150½ and Bennett, 145½.

Fighting Bennett in close, he gave Bennett a terrific beating about the body, and blocked so skillfully that he felt hardly a damaging punch in the encounter.

In the semi-final, Arthur (Pinky) Shull, 170½, Tacoma, knocked out Dick Gordon, 165½, Bellingham, in the first round of a scheduled six-rounder.
